N the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and superior education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington, of such a character as has been indicated. The Commissioners further stated that "They were of opinion that it will be necessary for the Government, either to select out of lands at its disposal suitable sites for College buildings at Auckland and Wellington, or to acquire such sites, and that two grants of £12,500 each should be made for the building of the two Colleges and for fittings and apparatus," and went on to say, "Although these sums are not equal to those expended for like purposes in Dunedin and Christchurch, we think they will be found sufficient for present requirements."

For the annual maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart

for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and as the present endowments may be presumed to be inadequate, the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate income to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; and if that is not practicable, the deficit in each case, until such income is realised, be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said, "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand," and provision was made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment, and though certain members of the Council were appointed, nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897 the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon. P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act; an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the 22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six Scholarships each year called "Queen's Scholarships," to persons of either sex under the age of 14

years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. In 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. Since 1905 the College has received from Parliament an annual grant of £2,000 for specialisation in Law and Science. The Act of 1897 further sets apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumaru Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appointment of four Professors for the Chairs of English Language and Literature, Classics, Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and Chemistry, and the following were appointed :- Classics, J. Brown, M.A. St. Andrews and Oxford; English Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A. St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A. Cambridge, Ph.D. Wurzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D. Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun. Having no College buildings the Council arranged for the use of rooms in the Girls' High School and in the Technical School Buildings belonging to the Education Board. In addition to the four Professors first appointed, G. W. von Zedlitz, M.A., Oxford, was appointed Professor of Modern Languages in December, 1901, H. B. Kirk, M.A., N.Z. was appointed Professor of Biology in March, 1903, and J. W. Salmond, M.A., N.Z., LL.B., London, Fellow of University College, London, was appointed Professor of Law in December, 1905, and M. W. Richmond, B.Sc., London, LL.B., N.Z., was appointed Professor of English and New Zealand Law in 1906; and there are also Lecturers on Mental Science, Economics,

and Education. The College was by the Senate of the New Zealand University admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, containing six acres, and the Government has provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings has been erected, the foundation stone having been laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904.

REGULATIONS.

TERMS.

There shall be two Terms in each year. The First Term shall begin on the first Tuesday in April, and end on the last day in June. The Second Term shall begin three clear weeks from the first day of July, and shall end in the last week of October.

KEEPING OF TERMS.

Students shall be considered to have kept a year's terms who shall have attended three-fourths of the Lectures in the subjects which they select, and passed the annual examination in those subjects. Terms may be kept in the following subjects:-

1. Latin.

All Students are expected to do the regular work of the classes which they attend, and to sit for the annual College examination unless leave of absence has been obtained from the Professor.

* Exempted students not resident in Wellington may substitute English History for either Jurisprudence or Constitutional History.

REGULATIONS AS TO SUBJECTS.

(a) First year students may keep Terms by passing in two subjects.

(b) In the second year students must pass in three subjects in order to keep Terms.

REGULATIONS.

(c) Students keeping third year Terms must pass in three subjects unless they have passed in four subjects either in the College Examination at the end of their second year or in the first section of the University Examination. No student shall keep Third Years Terms in any subject in which he has kept Second Years Terms or passed in the first section of the University Examination. A subject repeated in accordance with the New Zealand University Statute B.A. Degree counts as a fresh subject.

(d) Graduates in Arts proceeding to a Degree in Science, or Bachelors of Science proceeding to a Degree in Arts, must keep terms by attending lectures (unless exempted) and passing the College Examination in those subjects in which they are to be examined by the University for their new Degree.

(e) All students must send to the Registrar, on or before the fifteenth day of August, notice of the subjects in which they wish to be examined. Students repeating a subject under Regulation (c) must notify the same.

(f) These rules shall apply equally to exempted students, and in all cases the examination for exempted students shall be the same as that for those not exempted. Students availing themselves of the exemption clause in any subject are exempted students, and must pay exempted students' fees for all subjects in which they are examined.

(g) The fee for the Annual Examination of any student exempted from attendance at lectures shall be three guineas, if he is examined at any other place than Wellington; or half-a-guinea for each subject if examined in Wellington.

N.B.—In and after 1907 certificates will be issued by the Registrar to students who have kept terms in the College Annual Examination.

REGULATIONS

FEES FOR LECTURES.

Fees may be paid to the Registrar in two instalments, half each Term. All fees are to be paid within fourteen days of the beginning of each term, and an additional charge or fine of 2/6 is to be imposed for each class fee remaining unpaid after this time. Students who have not paid their fees within one month of the commencement of term shall be debarred from further attendance at classes until their fees are paid or some satisfactory explanation of the non-payment is given. Students who begin to attend Lectures at a period subsquent to the date above mentioned, must pay the full fees when they begin to attend. Fees for Lectures are as follows:—

SUGGESTIONS TO STUDENTS

(a) Intending students are advised to map out their course as far as possible at the beginning of their College career so as to avoid clashing in their classes.

(b) Students who are taking an Arts Degree are recommended to take during their first two years such subjects as they have already studied at school, and to reserve for the second part of their course the more philosophical subjects.

(c) The Professorial Board wishes to discourage the idea that any student is likely to pass his Degree Examination in any subject in Arts or Science on one year's work, unless he has had some previous acquaintance with the subject in question.

(d) The Chairman of the Professorial Board or any Professor will be glad to advise students with regard to their work.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

SIR GEORGE GREY SCHOLARSHIP.

A Scholarship shall be awarded subject to the granting of a vote by Parliament.

REGULATIONS.

1. The Scholarship shall be open to undergraduates whose academic standing does not exceed three years.

2. The subjects of examination shall be chosen from the following:

(a) HEAT, SOUND AND LIGHT.

(b) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM.

(c) ASTRONOMY.

(d) GEOLOGY.

(e) PURE MATHEMATICS.

(f) MECHANICS AND HYDROSTATICS.

(q) CHEMISTRY.

(h) BOTANY.

(i) ZOOLOGY.

Of these a candidate may choose any three, which must include one at least of the subjects a. b, c, d.

3. The Scholarship will be awarded on the result of the College Annual Examination, with a special practical examination in Natural Science, Chemistry, and Physics, and a special paper in Astronomy.

4. Out of the nine possible subjects at least two must be taken and not more than three. In awarding the Scholarship the Professorial Board will prefer special distinction in a single subject to a fair knowledge of the two or three subjects selected.

5. The award of the Scholarship will be announced soon after the College Annual Examination.

6. The Scholarship will not be tenable with any other Scholarship or Exhibition.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

7. The Scholar must attend such a course of lectures and do such practical work as shall be approved by the Professorial Board.

8. The Scholar must not during the tenure of his Scholarship undertake any duties that in the opinion of the Professorial Board will prevent him from prosecuting his studies satisfactorily.

The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable for one year.

JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

By a munificent bequest of the late Mr Jacob Joseph, two Scholarships have been founded, to be called the "Jacob Joseph Scholarships," each of the value of £60.

REGULATIONS.

The two Scholarships will be awarded annually among students qualified under paragraph (d) hereof on the results of the Honours Examination of the New Zealand University in either Law Science, or Arts; ceteris paribus, preference will be given to Law and Science. (For the purposes of this condition Mathematics, Mental Science, and Political Science shall be regarded as Arts subjects).

No Scholarship shall be awarded to a candidate who fails to get Second Class Honours at least, or their equivalent, conferred on him or her by the New Zealand University.

Provided also-

- (a) That the amount of the Scholarships be paid in two equal portions on the 1st August and 1st November.
- (b) That they be not paid until the Council has been assured by the Professorial Board of their own knowledge, or upon

inquiry, that the Scholarship winner has continued to do substantial work in the subject in which he or she gained honours.

- (c) That the holding of any other Scholarship either tenable at this University or any other, shall not debar any successful candidate from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.
- (d) That every applicant shall have kept the whole of his Terms at Victoria College, and shall have attended lectures during the year at the end of which such applicant shall have sat for his Honours examination.
- (e) No one shall be entitled to the Scholarship unless he has obtained Honours, in the case of an Arts or Science Student, within five years of his matriculation; and in the case of a Law Student, within six years of his matriculation.

RHODES SCHOLARSHIP.

The Professorial Board of the Victoria College has power to nominate one candidate annually for the Rhodes Scholarship.

Notice of intended elections will be given from time to time.

Candidates must apply for nomination to the Professorial Board not later than the 27th October.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

(Professor Mackenzie.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

This class meets three hours a week—Tuesdays 5 to 7 p.m., and Thursdays 6 to 7 p.m. Lectures will be delivered on Anglo-Saxon, Middle English, Historical English Grammar, and English Composition. A general knowledge of the history of English Literature from 1625 to 1688, or, as an alternative, the "set books" for the Senior English Class (for the year) form part of the work for First Year's Terms.

SENIOR CLASS.

This Class meets three hours a week—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays 8 to 9 p.m.

Two lectures will be delivered every week on the literature of the period—1625 to 1688—and one on the set books.

The following are the set books:-

Burke's Reflections on the French Revolution. Macaulay's Essays on Bacon and Walpole.

Shakespeare's Hamlet and Romeo and Juliet.

Masterman's Age of Milton and Garnett's Age of Dryden are recommended as text books on the literature of the period.

ENGLISH AS A ONE-YEAR'S COURSE.

Students taking English as a one-year's course are required to take Junior and Senior English together.

INTERMEDIATE ENGLISH.

A series of more advanced lectures on Early and Middle English and on the literature of the period will be delivered to students, who are familiar with the work of the Junior and Senior Classes, and who are taking English as a "repeated" subject in their Degree course, or who contemplate taking the Honours course later. Unless this Class can be taken with the Honours Class the hours of meeting will be arranged, as far as possible, to suit the convenience of students.

HONOURS CLASS.

Period of Literature:-1625-1688.

Set Books:—Burke's Reflections on the French Revolution and Speeches on American Taxation and E

Conciliation with America; Macaulay's Essays on Bacon and Walpole; Shakespeare's Hamlet, Othello, Romeo and Juliet, and Sonnets.

Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Reader (8/6), Morris and Skeat's Specimens, Vol. I. (9/-) are also prescribed. Pages 175 to 201 of the Anglo-Saxon Reader (7th Edition) are to be omitted.

The lectures will cover the ground prescribed for Honours. The Class will meet on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 6 to 8 p.m.

Beowulf and the Christ of Cynewulf (Ginn & Co.) will be used for practice in "unprescribed" Anglo-Saxon.

The following books (in addition to those prescribed for Senior English) are recommended:—

Lounsbury's Historical English.

Earle's Philology of the English Tongue.

Skeat's Principles of English Etymology (First and Second Series).

Oliphant's "The New English," 2 Vols.

N.B.—A considerable first-hand acquaintance with the works of the chief men of letters of the period is indispensable.

EDUCATION.—(William Gray, M.A., B.Sc.)

The class will meet on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, from 4 p.m. till 5 p.m.

The work will be mainly along the lines prescribed for the B.A. Degree.

Text Books.—Physical Nature of the Child (Rowe) 4/6; Talks on Psychology (James) 4/6; Talks on Pedagogics (Parker) 7/6; Educational Reformers (Quick) 6/-; Elements of General Method (McMurray) 4/6.

MENTAL SCIENCE.

(T. A. Hunter, M.A., M.Sc.)

PRELIMINARY CLASS.

The object of this Class is to make students familiar with the main outlines of the subject. All students beginning the subject are recommended to commence with this Class. The Class meets three times a week. Weekly exercises will be done in all branches, and time given to the discusion of questions and to practical work on the nervous system.

Text Books — Ryland's Logic; Ryland's Ethics; Ryland's Psychology.

DEGREE CLASS.

This Class has its work determined by the requirements for the B.A. and B.Sc. Degrees. The Class meets three times a week. Weekly exercises will be done in all branches; time will be given to the discussion of questions and to experimental Psychology. Students intending to take Mental Science as a subject for Degree, must keep terms in this course.

Text Book:—Mellone's Logic, Stout's Manual of Psychology or Dewey's Psychology, Muirhead's or Mackenzie's Ethics.

Exempted students are invited to communicate with the Lecturer with reference to the lines upon which they should read.

Any students desirous of taking Honours in Mental Science should confer with the Lecturer before beginning their University course.

LATIN.-(Professor Rankine Brown).

ADVANCED CLASS.

This Class meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m. The work in the class is conditioned mainly by the books set for the

University Honours Examination, but is not confined to these. The work on Tuesday and Thursday is mainly sight translation, and students repeating Latin must attend these classes. The special books for Honours are read on Mondays and Fridays. If circumstances permit an extra hour will be given on Saturdays. Courses of Lectures are given in successive years on Literature, History and Philology; and weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose (Ramsay Vol. II. 4/6), unseen translation and Latin Grammar.

SENIOR CLASS.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m. During 1907 the books read will be Cicero Pro Milone, Horace Odes III., IV. Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose (Ramsay, vol. ii., 4/6) and Grammar, and lectures are delivered at intervals. A voluntary class is held on Saturdays, 8.45 to 9.45 a.m. for sight translation. All students ought to endeavour to attend at this hour. Dies Romani (Arnold) and Liddell's Grammar Papers will be used.

JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays 7 to 8 p.m. It is intended for first year students, and the work is of a more elementary nature than that of the Senior Class. Special attention is paid to Latin Prose (Ramsay, vol. i., 4/6), and Grammar. The books read during 1907 will be Cicero Pro Milone, Chap. i-xxxiii, and Horace Odes III, IV, omitting in III. Odes 6, 10, 15, 16, 18, 19, 20, 22, 26, 28, and in Odes IV, Odes 6, 10, 11, 13. All students are expected to take this Class, unless exempted for special reasons by the Professor. Members of the Junior Class may attend the sight translation class on Saturdays—8.45 to 9.45 a.m.

Exempted students keeping the first year's terms will be examined on the work of the Junior Class.

ADVANCED CLASS.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Honours or repeating Greek. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

SENIOR CLASS.

The work of this Class is arranged to suit students who are reading for the B.A. Examination. It will meet at least three hours per week at such times as may best suit students, providing that they can come before 5 p.m. The books prescribed for 1907 are Demosthenes Philippics, Sophocles, Philocetees. For Greek Prose, Arnold (3/6) and Sidgwick (5/-) will be used. Goodwin's Greek Grammar (6/-) is recommended.

JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class is intended for students who have just begun or are beginning Greek. It will meet probably three hours per week before 5 p.m., at an hour to suit students. The following books will be used:—Smith's Initia Graeca, part i. (3/6) Arnold's Greek Prose (3/6); Selections from Xenophon (Phillpotts and Jerram, 3/6.

FRENCH.—(Professor von Zedlitz.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 7 to 8 p.m., and on Saturdays, 10 to 11 a.m. The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. Examination of 1907. Regular exercises will be done in French Prose and Grammar (V. Spiers' Rapid French Exercises 2/-); the Grammar recommended for students is Eve and de Baudiss' Wellington College French Grammar. Lectures will be given on Literature as prescribed for the B.A. Examination. Weekly Lectures will be given on the pronunciation and oral use of the language, at a time to be subsequently arranged.

In connection with the requirements of the University, an oral examination will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Candidates are advised to take this examination when sit-

ting for their First Year's Terms. The examination will include dictation, sight reading, and reading of a short passage taken from the Fourth Act of Scribe's Verre d'Eau.

Students not already provided with a satisfactory dictionary may obtain Edgren & Burnett's Word-Book (7/6); for careful or advanced study the Dictionnaire General of Hatzfeld Darmesteter & Thomas (32/-) is most valuable. Saintsbury's Primer of French Literature (2/-) is a good introduction to the subject.

SENIOR CLASS.

A class will be formed for the benefit of those taking French for Senior Scholarships or for Honours in Arts.

The following books are recommended:— Toynbee's Historical French Grammar 6 0 Spiers' Historical French Grammar 5 0 Fasnacht's Specimen's of French Authors 7 6 Dowden's History of French Literature 6 0

GERMAN.—(Professor von Zedlitz.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

The Class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m.. Lectures will be given on literature and on the books prescribed for the B.A. Examination 1907, and compositions will be done.

An elementary class will be formed if required, also one for more advanced students which will read the Honours Course prescribed for 1907.

Students beginning German will use:—Siepmann's Public School Primer; Eve's First German Exercises; Hauff, Das Wirtshaus im Spessart.

More advanced students will require:—Eve's Second German Exercises; Eve's Grammar; Schiller, Selected Lyrics; Robertson, Selected Correspondence between Goethe and Schiller.

In connection with the requirements of the University an oral examination will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Candidates are advised to take this examination when sitting for their First Year's Terms. The examination will include dictation, sight reading, and reading of a short passage taken from Act I. of Egmont.

ITALIAN AND SPANISH.—(Professor von Zedlitz.)

Classes in Italian and Spanish will be formed if desired; the work done will depend on the requirements of students, but elementary work is not excluded.

MATHEMATICS.—(Professor Maclaurin).

A.—PURE MATHEMATICS.

A course of lectures on the Pure Mathematics prescribed for the B.A. and B.Sc. Degrees will be given during the session. Students attending this course should be familiar with the Mathematics required for the Matriculation Examination.

Text Books :---

Algebra—The Intermediate Algebra Tutorial Series. Geometry—Barnard and Child's Geometry.

Trigonometry—Pendlebury's Elementary Trigonometry (4/6).

Hours of lectures-Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 5 to 6 p.m.

On Saturday mornings from 9.45 to 10.45 a.m. a tutorial class will be held for those having special difficulties to overcome.

B.—APPLIED MATHEMATICS.

A course of lectures on the Applied Mathematics prescribed for the B.A. and B.Sc. Degrees will be given during the session. Students attending

CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS.—Professor Easterfield).

I.—GENERAL COURSE.

This course consists of three lectures weekly throughout the session, and serves as a general introduction to the study of chemistry; it also meets the requirements of candidates for the pass Degrees of the University of New Zealand.

Part I. treats of the non-metallic elements and their important compounds, the laws of chemical combination and elementary chemical theory.

Part II. deals with the metals, their occurrence and the methods of extraction from their ores, their detection and quantitative estimation.

Part III. is devoted to organic chemistry, and includes organic analysis, general methods of purification, identification and relationships of typical organic compounds.

Intending students should consult Professor Easterfield before purchasing text books.

2.—Organic Chemistry (Elementary).

The class meets twice weekly, at hours to be arranged. A knowledge of general inorganic chemistry will be pre-supposed. The course will be fully illustrated experimentally, and will meet the requirements of medical students, and of those who propose to take the advanced course in a subsequent year.

3.-Advanced Course.

During the session 1907 Organic and Physical Chemistry will mainly be studied in this course.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

The Victoria College laboratories afford unusual facilities for the study of experimental chemistry. To each student a separate bench is allotted, furnished with gas, water, and reagents. A charge of ten shillings is made for materials, but unusual breakages must be made good. Special encouragement is given to those who, having obtained a sound training in practical chemistry, propose to carry out original investigations in organic, physical, or technological chemistry.

Students who wish to take up chemistry as a profession are advised to work in the laboratory not less than eighteen hours weekly, and to attend the lectures in physics, mathematics, and German.

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All students are required to keep a systematic record of their laboratory work.

1.—PRELIMINARY COURSE.

This course meets the requirements of students preparing for the pass Degrees of the University. The Class meets twice weekly for purposes of demonstration, but the laboratory will be open at other specified times to suit the convenience of students. A minimum attendance of five hours weekly is required from Degree candidates.

Subjects treated.—Simple inorganic preparations, elementary quantitative measurement, qualitative analysis.

2. Advanced Course.

This is intended for those who wish to obtain a useful knowledge of practical chemistry, such as is required by Honours students, professional chemists, or teachers of the subject. Demonstrations will be arranged at hours to suit the students, and special attention will be paid to quantitative analysis, determination of physico-chemical constants, the preparation and systematic examination of organic and inorganic compounds. The full course will extend over three years.

PHYSICS LECTURES.

General Course.

A Class will meet twice weekly for lectures, and once for physical calculations. The fundamental principles of mechanics, heat, light, sound, electricity and magnetism will be discussed and illustrated from the experimental standpoint, with the object of directing and assisting students in their reading; during the present session the chief attention will be paid to Heat, Light and Sound.

1. PRELIMINARY COURSE.

(Mr Rudman.)

This course meets the requirements of candidates for the Medical Intermediate and Senior Civil Service Examinations. The class meets on Mondays and Fridays at 6 o'clock.

During the present session Electricity and Magnetism will form the chief subject of study.

PHYSICAL LABORATORY.

The object of the laboratory course is to familiarise students with the accurate measurement of physical quantities, and with the construction and manipulation of apparatus. A minimum attendance of four hours weekly is expected from candidates for pass Degrees. The hours will be arranged to suit the convenience of the students.

BIOLOGY.—(Professor Kirk).

GENERAL BIOLOGY.

Note.—Students are advised to take Biology whether they choose Botany or Zoology, as a one year's subject. If any students find it necessary to do so, they should communicate with the Professor at the beginning of their course.

One lecture a week during first year; two during second; laboratory work during both years.

Lectures :---

The consideration of typical organisms, both animals and plants, selected with regard to the lists prescribed in the University statutes, but not confined to those lists; the general principles of biology as illustrated by these and other types; classification, etc.

In the first year the work will deal mainly with the types, with classification and with morphology; in the second with physiology, and with the prescribed orders.

The first year's work will deal with the Invertebrata, the second mainly with the Chordata.

These consitute a single subject in the course for the degrees of Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Arts. A course of three lectures a week will be delivered throughout the session, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 5 p.m. Candidates for a degree in Arts or Law are advised to attend this class during two sessions.

QUEEN'S SCHOLARSHIPS

For the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Nelson, Westland, Marlborough, Hawke's Bay and Tapanaki.

The Junior Queen's Scholarships are awarded upon the papers set for the National Scholarships.

REGULATIONS FOR THE SENIOR QUEEN'S SCHOLARSHIPS.

1. The four Senior Queen's Scholarships to be offered annually shall be awarded on the results of the examination held for Junior University Scholarships.

2. No candidate shall be awarded a Scholarship whose name does not appear on the Credit List. Provided that: If the number of candidates appearing in the Credit List does not equal the number of Scholarships to be awarded in any one year, any candidate who has qualified for matriculation on the Junior Scholarship examination, and has obtained 70 per cent. of the possible marks in any one language, or in mathematics, or in science, shall be eligible for a Scholarship.

The following clauses of "The Victoria College Act, 1905" contain the regulations for the Queen's Scholarships:—

35 For the purpose of bringing higher education within the reach of deserving scholars, there are hereby established in connection with the Victoria College, and out of its funds, junior and senior scholarships to be called "Queen's Scholarships," and with respect thereto the following provisions shall apply:—-

> (a) (i.) Six junior scholarships shall be awarded annually on the results of an

examination to be conducted in the prescribed manner by the Council.

(ii.) The examination shall be open to all persons of either sex who are not over fourteen years of age on the first day of the month in which the examination is held, and reside within any of the Wellington, Nelson, Westland, Marlborough, Hawke's Bay, and Taranaki Provincial Districts; but not more than two scholarships shall be awarded in any year to the scholars from any one school, nor more than four scholarships to the scholars from any one education district.

(iii.) The term of each junior scholarship shall be three years if the holder so long faithfully fulfils the prescribed conditions: Provided that the Council may at its discretion extend any junior scholarship for one year longer.

(iv.) The holder of any junior scholarship shall be required to prosecute his studies diligently, to the satisfaction of the Inspector-General of Schools, at a school approved in each case by the Council, such school being either a secondary school or its equivalent within the said provincial districts.

(b) (v.) In and after the year one thousand nine hundred and six not less than four senior scholarships shall be offered annually, which shall be awarded on the results of such examination as the Council, subject to the approval of the Minister of Education, may prescribe (vi.) The examination shall be open to all persons of either sex under nineteen

years of age and who reside within any of the said provincial districts.

(vii.) The term of each senior scholarship shall be three years if the holder so long faithfully fulfils the prescribed conditions.

(vii.) The holder of a senior scholarship shall be required forthwith thereafter to enter himself on the books of the College, to attend the College lectures, and to prosecute his studies diligently to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.

(ix.) The holder of a senior scholarship shall whilst attending the College be exempt from the payment of lecture fees.

- (c) The holder of a junior scholarship shall receive, in addition to the amount of the tuition fees (if any) payable by him at a secondary school, as defined by "The Education Act, 1904," or at a District High School, the sum of ten pounds per annum.
- (d) The holder of a senior scholarship shall receive the sum of twenty pounds per annum.
- (e) Where the holder of a junior or senior scholarship is obliged to live away from home in order to prosecute his studies, there shall be paid to him an additional sum of thirty pounds per annum.
- (f) The scholarships shall be paid by quarterly instalments, and upon satisfactory evidence being in the prescribed manner furnished to the Council that the holder has fulfilled the prescribed conditions up to the date of the instalment.

- (g) A Queen's Scholarship shall not be held by any one who is at the same time the holder of any other scholarship.
- (h) Not more than one Queen's Scholarship shall be held by the same person at the same time, and when the holder of a junior scholarship is awarded a senior scholarship he shall thereon resign his junior scholarship.
- (i) If the holder fails to qualify for any quarterly instalment of his scholarship the scholarship shall be forfeited, unless the Council, having regard to the special circumstances of the case, waives such forfeiture: Provided that such failure shall not be waived more than once.
- (*j*) If the holder of any scholarship forfeits or resigns his scholarship, or dies during the currency of the scholarship, then at the next examination the Council shall offer such additional scholarships (if necessary) as will make the total number of scholarships current during the ensuing year not less than thirty.

36. (1) The Council may with the consent of the Minister of Education, extend the term during which any of the Queen's Scholarships awarded before the eighteenth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and three (being the date of the passing of "The Queen's Scholarships Act, 1903"), are held at a secondary school or its equivalent, provided that the whole term during which any scholarship is held at a secondary school or its equivalent does not exceed four years, and may modify the prescribed conditions of the principal Act accordingly.

(2) Except as provided by this section, nothing in this Act shall affect any Scholarship granted before the above mentioned date.
