

# HISTORICAL NOTICE.

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N the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and higher education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington, of such a character as has been indicated. The Commissioners further stated that "They were of opinion that it will be necessary for the Government, either to select out of lands at its disposal suitable sites for College buildings at Auckland and Wellington, or to acquire such sites, and that two grants of £12,500 each should be made for the building of the two Colleges and for fittings and apparatus," and went on to say, "Although these sums are not equal to those expended for like purposes in Dunedin and Christchurch, we think they will be found sufficient for present requirements."

For the annual maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart

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for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and as the present endowments may be presumed to be inadequate, the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate income to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; and if that is not practicable, the deficit in each case, until such income is realised, be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said, "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand," and provision was made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment, and though certain members of the Council were appointed, nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897 the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon, P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act; an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the 22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six Scholarships each year called "Queen's Scholarships," to persons of either sex under the age of 14 years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. By the Education Act Amendment Act 1907, the Queen's Scholarships were Since 1905 the College has received abolished. annual grant of £2,000 from Parliament an for specialisation in Law and Science. The Act of 1897 further sets apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumaru Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment

for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appointment of four Professors for the Chairs of English Language and Literature, Classics, Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and Chemistry, and the following were appointed:—Classics, J. R. Brown, M.A., St. Andrews and Oxford; English Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A. St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A. Cambridge, Ph.D. Wurzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D. Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun. Lectureships in French, German, Mental Science, Economics, Constitutional History and Jurisprudence, Law, Geology and Education were established. As the funds of the College permitted, Chairs in Modern Languages, Biology, Law, Mental Science and Physics were founded.

The College was by the Senate of the New Zealand University admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, six acres in extent, and the Government provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings has been erected, the foundation stone having been laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904. They were opened by His Excellency Lord Plunket on the 30th March, 1906.

In March, 1910, a further portion of the buildings was completed, forming a wing at the rear of the Arts Building. This wing contains two large class-rooms, and in the basement a men's robing-room, a women's common-room, and a large, well-lighted tea-room, open to students every day throughout the session.

# REGULATIONS.

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1. The College year shall consist of two Terms: the First Term to begin towards the end of March and to end towards the end of June; the Second Term to begin about three weeks from the first day of July and to end in the last week of October.

3. To pass in any subject a student (unless exempted—see below) must attend the Lectures in that subject, must do the regular work of the class to the satisfaction of the professor (or lecturer), and must pass such examinations as are prescribed in that subject. A student shall not be considered to have fulfilled the attendance requirement in a subject if he has been absent from more than one-tenth of the lectures in the subject.

<sup>\*</sup> For the purposes of the Degree of Bachelor of Laws, Jurisprudence and Constitutional History shall be deemed to be two subjects, but no student can keep First Year Terms in those two alone.

<sup>†</sup>Terms may be kept in Law subjects only by scholars as provided in paragraph 5 (b).

- 4. The following shall be the general regulations for keeping terms: —
- (a) To keep First Year Terms, a student must pass in two subjects.
- (b) To keep Second Year Terms, the student must pass in three subjects. (The standard of pass is higher for Second and Third Year Terms than for First Year Terms.)

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- (c) Students keeping Third Year Terms must pass in three subjects unless they have passed in four subjects either in the College Examination at the end of their second year or in the first section of the University Examination. No student shall keep Third Year Terms in any subject in which he has kept Second Year Terms or passed in the first section of the University Examination, except in those subjects in which two distinct courses are recognised. A subject repeated in accordance with the New Zealand University Statute B.A. or B.Sc. Degree counts as a fresh subject.
- 5. Holders of Junior University and Senior National Scholarships may take a section of the University Examination for B.A., B.Sc., or LL.B., after keeping First Year Terms. To such scholars as intend to avail themselves of this privilege, the following special regulations shall apply:—
- (a) To keep First Year Terms such a scholar must pass in three subjects (equivalent to the above requirement for Second Year Terms).
- (b) To keep Second Year Terms for B.A. or B.Sc., such a scholar must pass in three subjects other than those in which he has kept First Year Terms, and one of them must be a repeated subject. To keep Second Year Terms for LL.B., such a scholar must pass in three subjects other than those

in which he has kept First Year Terms and these

may be all Law subjects.

(c) To keep Third Year Terms for B.A. or B.Sc., such a scholar must produce a certificate of substantial progress in the subject of his special study.

- 6. Graduates in Arts or Science proceeding to qualify for a degree in Science or Arts, must keep terms in such further subjects as they require for that degree.
- 7. Students must notify to the Registrar, on or before the fifteenth day of August, the subjects in which they wish to keep terms. Students repeating a subject must notify the same.
- 8. (a) Exemption from lectures is provided for under certain conditions [Univ. Cal., p. 65, par. III.].
- (b) To keep terms, exempted students must pass the Annual College Examination in the requisite number of subjects, and all the above regulations shall apply to them except that of paragraph 3.
- (c) The fee for the Annual Examination of any student exempted from attendance at lectures shall be three guineas, if he is examined at any other place than Wellington; or half a guinea for each subject if examined in Wellington.

N.B.—In no case shall such fee be refunded. But if a candidate be prevented by sickness, or other sufficient cause, from taking the examination, the fee shall be credited to him for a future examination: provided that such credit shall not extend for more than two years. If, after payment of the fee, the candidate be removed to another College district, the fee shall be transferred to his credit at that College.

Fees may be paid to the Registrar in two instalments, half each Term. All fees are to be paid within fourteen days of the beginning of each term. and an additional charge or fine of 2/6 is to be imposed for each class fee remaining unpaid after this time. Students who have not paid their fees within one month of the commencement of term shall be debarred from further attendance at classes until their fees are paid or some satisfactory explanation of the non-payment is given. Students who begin to attend Lectures at a period subsequent to the date above mentioned, must pay the full fees when they begin to attend.

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# ADVICE TO STUDENTS.

(a) Students should, as far as possible, map out complete courses of study. It is the experience of the Professorial Board that this cannot in general be wisely done by students for themselves; and the Board is desirous of giving the fullest possible guidance in this respect. All students ought to consult with members of the Board before deciding upon their courses.

Students proposing to read for Honours should in all cases consult the professor of their Honours subject.

(b) One year's study is not to be regarded as sufficient for a degree course in an Arts or Science subject, unless the student has a good previous knowledge of the subject.

(c) Such subjects as a student has previously studied (at school or elsewhere) and desires to

pursue further, should as a rule be taken at the beginning of the course.

(d) Care must be taken in the arrangement of the course in order to avoid clashing in the hours of lectures.

# THE COLLEGE LIBRARY.

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In 1911 the number of volumes in the Library reached 9200. Of these, more than 1300 were added during the year, largely owing to benefactions by the late H. W. Eve, Esq., J. W. Joynt, Esq., the late Sir Jas. Hector, Mr. Justice Cooper, and Percy Buller, Esq.

Some fifty different periodicals, representative of all the faculties, are regularly taken.

## LIBRARY REGULATIONS.

- 1. The ordinary management of the Library is entrusted to the Librarian and his assistants.
- 2. Members of the College Council and the Teaching Staff of the College shall enjoy the full privileges of the Library, but the full titles of any volumes borrowed by them must be entered in a ledger kept for the purpose and duly signed.
- 3. The Library shall be open during the session to any student whose name is on the books of the College. Those whose names are no longer on the books of the College must obtain permission from the Professorial Board before using the Library.
- 4. Readers shall not be allowed to take books from the Library to any other part of the College buildings.
- 5. Any student who desires to borrow books from the Library must deposit the sum of one guinea with

the Librarian; but no student can be in possession of more than one volume at a time. The guinea shall be returned to the "depositors" when they cease to avail themselves of the privilege of borrowing books, provided they have returned all books undamaged.

6. Students working for Honours, may, upon the written request of a Professor, have more than one volume in their possession, but the Professor making such request shall be held responsible for the return

of any volume or volumes thus borrowed.

7. No books shall be given out of the Library except to the borrowers in person, or to some one having written authority from them; and books belonging to the Library must not be privately lent by one reader to another.

8. Encyclopaedias, dictionaries, transactions of learned societies, law reports, prose translations of the Classics, books containing valuable engravings, works with loose plates, maps, books and periodicals unbound, text-books prescribed for the current year, and books marked "Reference" may not be borrowed from the Library.

9. In the event of any books being lost or damaged, while in the possession of persons entitled to the use of the Library, such persons shall either replace the same or pay such a fine as may be imposed by the

Professorial Board.

10. Readers are particularly cautioned against injuring books belonging to the Library by writing on the margin, marking or turning down the leaves, or otherwise disfiguring them. The Librarian is instructed to report any damage or disfigurement of books to the Professorial Board.

11. Books removed from the shelves by readers must be left on the tables in the reading-rooms.

12. The Librarian shall enter the full titles (or careful descriptions) of all books borrowed, the date

of borrowing, the names and addresses of borrowers in a ledger provided for the purpose.

- 13. When a volume is returned the date of return must be entered in the column assigned for the purpose in the ledger.
- 14. A request book shall be provided in which the names of students wishing to obtain books in circulation, together with the titles of the books and the date of request are to be entered.
- 15. Students may not retain borrowed volumes for more than seven days, but they may re-borrow them for a further period of seven days unless they are entered in the request book as "Wanted."
- 16. Permission may be given by the Professorial Board (with the consent of the Chairman of the Council) to graduates of the University of New Zealand, to members of others Universities, and to persons engaged in research work, to use the Library under such conditions as may be deemed expedient.
- 17. During Term the Library shall be open to readers from 10 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. on all week days, except Saturday, when it shall be open from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.
- 18. The hours at which books will be lent out or exchanged will be notified in the Library.
- 19. Any person guilty of a breach of the above Regulations shall be denied the use of the Library.
- 20. Regulations will be issued from time to time for the use of the Library during the recess.

#### THE BOWEN PRIZE.

Offered every alternate year to undergraduates for the best essay on a prescribed subject.

Essays must be sent in by 31st December, 1913. Subject will be announced in March, 1912. (Univ. Calendar p. 67.)

# THE MACMILLAN-BROWN MEMORIAL PRIZE.

Offered every alternate year to undergraduates for the best imaginative composition in verse or prose on a prescribed subject.

Essays must be sent in by 31st December, 1912. Subject: "The Centenary of the Battle of Vittoria."

(Univ. Calendar, p. 68.)

## THE HAYDON PRIZE.

Offered every year to undergraduates for the best essay on a prescribed subject.

Essays must be sent in by 31st December.

Subject for the year will be announced in March.

(Univ. Calendar, p. 69.)

#### COOK MEMORIAL PRIZE.

Offered yearly to graduates taking Honours in Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and awarded on the Honours papers.

(Univ. Calendar p. 70.)

#### THE HABENS PRIZE.

For the best essay on a prescribed subject. Offered every alternate year to students of the Training Colleges who are matriculated students of not more than three years' standing.

Essays must be sent in by 31st December, 1913. Subject will be announced in March, 1912. (Univ. Calendar, p. 71.)

## FREE PASSAGES.

Two first-class return passages between Australia and England are offered yearly by the Orient Steamship Co. The Union Steamship Co. and Huddart Parker Co. supplement this by extending a similar concession between New Zealand and Australia to the graduates selected.

Open to graduates of the University who are proceeding to Europe for the purpose of further study, and who require assistance to enable them to do so.

Applications must be in by March 15th.

# VICTORIA COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS.

# SIR GEORGE GREY SCHOLARSHIP.

A Scholarship shall be awarded subject to the granting of a vote by Parliament.

### REGULATIONS.

- 1. The Scholarship shall be open to undergraduates whose academic standing does not exceed three years.
- 2. The subjects of examination shall be chosen from the following:—
  - (a) HEAT, SOUND AND LIGHT.
  - (b) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM.
  - (c) ASTRONOMY.
  - (d) GEOLOGY.

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- (e) PURE MATHEMATICS.
- (f) MECHANICS AND HYDROSTATICS.
- (g) CHEMISTRY.
- (h) BOTANY.
- (i) ZOOLOGY.

Of these a candidate may choose any three, which must include one at least of the subjects a, b, c, d.

- 3. The Scholarship will be awarded on the result of the College Annual Examination, with a special practical examination in Natural Science, Chemistry, and Physics, and a special paper in Astronomy.
- 4. Out of the nine possible subjects at least two must be taken and not more than three. In awarding the Scholarship the Professorial Board will prefer special distinction in a single subject to a fair knowledge of the two or three subjects selected.

5. The award of the Scholarship will be announced soon after the College Annual Examination.

6. The Scholarship will not be tenable with any

other Scholarship or Exhibition.

7. The Scholar must attend such a course of lectures and do such practical work as shall be approved by the Professorial Board.

8. The Scholar must not during the tenure of his Scholarship undertake any duties that in the opinion of the Professorial Board will prevent him from prosecuting his studies satisfactorily.

The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable

for one year.

### JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

By a munificent bequest of the late Mr. Jacob Joseph, two Scholarships have been founded, to be called the "Jacob Joseph Scholarships," each of the value of £60.

## REGULATIONS.

1. The two Scholarships will be awarded annually among students qualified under paragraph (c) hereof on the results of the Honours Examination of the New Zealand University in either Law, Science, or Arts; ceteris paribus, preference shall be given to Law and Science (including Mental Science), provided that the candidate proves to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board that he has done substantial laboratory work. (For the purposes of this condition, Mathematics and Political Science shall be regarded as Arts subjects.)

2. No Scholarship shall be awarded to a candidate who fails to get Second Class Honours at least or their equivalent conferred on him by the New Zealand

University.

#### Provided also-

(a) No one shall be entitled to the Scholarship unless he has obtained Honours, in the case of an Arts or Science student, within five years of his matriculation; and in the case of a Law Student, within seven years of his matriculation.

(b) The holding of any other Scholarship shall not debar any successful candidate from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.

(c) Every applicant shall fulfill the following conditions:—

1. His name shall be on the Books of Victoria College at the time he takes his pass Degree.

2. He shall pursue his studies at Victoria College to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board during the year in which he sits for his Honours or the equivalent examination.

3. He shall during the year in which he holds the Scholarship do at Victoria College substantial and original work in the subjects in which he gained Honours or in some cognate subject to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.

4. Such work shall be evidenced by thesis or dissertation accompanied by a synopsis of the bibliography of the topic of the thesis or dissertation. Such thesis or dissertation shall be handed to the Chairman of the Professorial Board for perusal and preservation in the records of the College Library.

- 3. The amount of the Scholarship shall be paid in two equal portions. The first shall be paid on the 1st August and the last after the receipt of the thesis or dissertation by the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Neither portion shall be paid until the Council has been assured by the Professorial Board that the Scholarship winner has continued to do substantial and original work in the subject in which he gained Honours, or in some cognate subject. The last portion shall not be paid until the Council has also been assured by the Professorial Board that the said thesis or dissertation is of some value as a contribution to the knowledge of the subject on which it treats.
- 4. Words importing the masculine gender include females.

## NEW ZEALAND RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIP.

- 1. One Research Scholarship shall be offered each year for each of the four University Colleges affiliated with the University of New Zealand.
- 2. Any holder of the degree of Bachelor of Science, or Bachelor of Engineering, or Bachelor of Agriculture, or Bachelor of Medicine, or Bachelor of Veterinary Science, or any other graduate of the University of New Zealand, who has satisfied the requirements for a certificate of proficiency in physics, chemistry, biology, geology, or physiology, shall be eligible for the scholarship, provided in any case that he has given evidence of his power to carry on original work.
- 3. The Research Scholarship Board (hereinafter called "the Board") for each University College shall consist of the Professors of Natural Science and Applied Science at such College, together with

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co ex th the Inspector-General of Schools. As soon as any person is elected to a Research Scholarship the Minister of Education (hereinafter called "the Minister") shall nominate an expert in the particular branch of research concerned to be a member of the Board for the purpose of assisting in its supervision of the work of the scholar.

- 4. Between the 1st March and the 31st May in each year the Board shall forward to the Minister the name of the candidate (if any) whom it recommends for election to the scholarship together with the proposed subject of research; and, as soon as the Minister has signified his approval of such recommendation, the said candidate shall be deemed to be elected.
- 5. At its first meeting in each year the Board shall elect a Chairman, who shall keep the minutes of the business of the Board, and shall communicate with the Minister of Education as occasion may arise. At every meeting of the Board the number to be fixed by each Board shall form a quorum.
- 6. Each scholarship shall be of the value of £100 per annum, together with the College Laboratory fees, the cost of special apparatus or special books required for the purpose of the research, and the actual travelling-fares or cost of transit while the holder is engaged on the work of research. All such expenditure in addition to the allowance of £100 per annum must be previously approved by the Board and the Minister.
- 7. Each scholarship shall be tenable for two years if the holder shall so long fulfil the prescribed conditions, but the tenure of the scholarship may be extended to a third year on the recommendation of the Board, approved by the Minister.

- 8. The holder of the scholarship shall enrol his name at the College in connection with which the scholarship is held, and shall begin his work within a period to be named by the Board, but in no case later than six months after his election to the scholarship.
- 9. With such exceptions as may be previously approved by the Board and the Minister, the holder shall be required to devote his whole time during the tenure of the scholarship to the work of research in a subject or subjects to be selected by him at the time of application from an approved list of subjects in which research is likely to be of economic value to the industries of the Dominion. The research shall be conducted under the supervision of the Board, which, however, may delegate its powers of supervision to one or more of its members.
- 10. The Minister shall pay the amount of the scholarship to the holder in quarterly instalments, each instalment being paid at the end of the quarter on receipt of a satisfactory report from the Board signed by the Chairman and one other member of the Board.
- 11. The holder shall each year send to the Board a report on the progress of the research being carried on by him, and the Board shall forward the report to the Minister, with any comments it may see fit to make thereon.
- 12. (a) All the results of the research carried on by any holder of the scholarship in accordance with the terms of his scholarship shall be the property of the Government of New Zealand.
- (b) The holder shall embody an account of the results of his research in a detailed report which shall be sent to the Board, and by it to the Minister,

who shall, if he sees fit, cause it to be published in suitable form.

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- (c) No publication of the results of the research shall be made by the candidate unless the Minister gives his consent thereto.
- (d) The final instalment of the scholarship shall not be payable until the detailed report of the result has been made in a form approved by the Board and the Minister.

#### ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

Professor Mackenzie.

JUNIOR CLASS.

(Work for keeping First Year's Terms.)

This class meets three hours a week—Tuesdays 5 to 7 p.m., and Thursdays 6 to 7 p.m. Lectures will be delivered on Anglo-Saxon, Middle English, Historical English and on Rhetoric and English Composition. A general knowledge of the history of the literature of the period (1625 to 1688) prescribed for the B.A. and LL.B. section in English, or, as an alternative, the set books for the same section of the degree, will form part of the work for first year's terms. Junior students may attend any of the Senior Class lectures dealing with the period or set books. Training College students can keep First Year's Terms on the work prescribed for the "C" certificate.

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Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer and Morris and Skeat's "Specimens of Early English," Vol. II. (chapters 2, 14 and 17 of the "Specimens" to be omitted), are prescribed for Anglo-Saxon and Middle English.

Morris' "Historical Outlines of English Accidence" will be used for Historical English Grammar.

Period of Literature: 1625 to 1688.

Text Books recommended:—

Set Books:-

Shakespeare—Romeo and Juliet, Hamlet.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

This Class meets three hours a week—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 8 to 9 p.m. Students can, however, subject to the Professor's approval, take the work prescribed for the Senior Class with the Honours Students from 7 to 8 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Three lectures will be delivered every week on the Literature of the period (1625—1688) and for part of the Term on the Set Books.

For Terms (Second or Third Year's) students will be examined on the work prescribed for the B.A. and LL.B., which comprises all the ground covered in the Junior and Senior Classes.

Period: 1625 to 1688.

Special attention must be paid to Milton, Dryden, Herrick, Butler, Taylor, Bunyan and Browne; but, the other authors in the Period are not to be neglected. The literary movements and their leaders, the current types and forms of literature and their representatives, as well as the influence of the ancient classics and of the leading Continental literatures on the English literature of the period, must also be examined.

# ENGLISH AS A ONE-YEAR'S COURSE.

Students taking English as a one-year's course are required to take Junior and Senior English together.

# SCHOLARSHIP AND REPEATED ENGLISH.

A series of more advanced lectures on Early and Middle English and on the literature of the period will be delivered to students, who are familiar with the work of the Junior and Senior Classes, and who are working for a Scholarship or are taking English as a "repeated" subject in their

Degree course. Unless this class can be taken with the Honours Class, the hours of meeting will be arranged, as far as possible, to meet the convenience of students.

The work prescribed for Senior Scholarship and Repeated English is as follows:—

Period and Set Books as for B.A. and LL.B. Anglo-Saxon, Middle English and Historical Grammar as for Honours.

### HONOURS CLASS.

Period of Literature: 1625 to 1688.

Special attention must be paid to Milton, Dryden, Herrick, Butler, Taylor, Bunyan, Browne; but the other authors are not to be neglected. The literary movements and their leaders, the current types and forms of literature and their representatives, as well as the influence of the ancient classics and of the leading Continental literatures on the English Literature of the Period must also be examined.

The lectures will cover the ground prescribed for Honours. The Class will meet on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, from 6 to 8 p.m., or at such other hours as may suit the convenience of students.

Beowulf and the Christ of Cynewulf (Ginn & Co.) will be used for practice in "unprescribed" Anglo-Saxon.

The following books (in addition to those prescribed for Senior English) are recommended:—

## LATIN.—Professor Rankine Brown.

## ADVANCED CLASS.

This Class meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m., and Saturdays 8.45 a.m. The work in the class is conditioned by the books set for the University Honours Examination, but is not confined to these. The work on Tuesday and Thursday is mainly sight translation, and students repeating Latin must attend these classes.

CLASSES 53

The Books read at these hours in 1912 will be Tacitus, Annals XIV., XV.; Select Letters of Cicero (Pritchard and Bernard); Martialis Epigrammata Selecta—VII.—XII (Clarendon Press); Terence, Phormio; and students repeating Latin will be expected to show some knowledge of these books in the examination for Terms. The special books for Honours are read on Mondays and Fridays. These for 1912 are Livy, XXIV.—XXVI., and Horace, Odes and Epodes. Courses of Lectures are given on Syntax, Literature and History; and weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m. During 1912 the books read will be Livy, XXIV., Horace Odes I.-II. Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Grammar (Stedman's Grammar Papers), and lectures are delivered at intervals.

### JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays 7 to 8 p.m. It is intended for first year students, and the work is of a more elementary nature than that of the Senior Class. Special attention is paid to Latin Prose (Ramsay, vol. i., 4/6), and Grammar. The books read during 1912 will be Livy, XXIV., Horace Odes I.-II. All students are expected to take this Class, unless exempted for special reasons by the Professor.

## TUTORIAL CLASSES.

A class is held on Saturday (9-10) for Sight Translation, and on Thursdays (5-6) for Latin Prose and Grammar. All students who can do so are advised to attend these classes.

# GREEK .- Professor Rankine Brown.

### ADVANCED CLASS.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Honours or Repeating Greek. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

The work of this Class is arranged to suit students who are reading for the B.A. Examination. It will meet at least three hours per week at such times as may best suit students, provided that they can come before 5 p.m. The books prescribed for 1912 are Xenophon, Cyropaedia I. and II.;

Sophocles, Oedipus Rex. For Greek Prose, Arnold (3/6) and Sidgwick (5/-) will be used. Goodwin's Greek Grammar (6/-) is recommended. For Sight Translation, Florilegium Tironis Graecum (Burrows and Walters) will be used.

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class is intended for students who have just begun or are beginning Greek. It will meet probably three hours per week before 5 p.m., at an hour to suit students. The following books will be used:—Smith's Initia Graeca, part i (3/6); Arnold's Greek Prose (3/6); Greek War of Independence (Sonneschein).

# FRENCH.—Professor von Zedlitz.

There will be five classes in this subject:

- 1. Junior Class for B.A. degree work.
- 2. Senior Class for B.A. degree work.
- 3. Senior Scholarship class.
- 4. Honours Class.

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5. Commercial Class.

# 1. JUNIOR CLASS.

This class is intended principally for first-year students. The work will constitute the first half of a two years' course in preparation for the B.A. exami-

nation. The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 7 p.m.

The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. examination of 1912. Regular exercises will be done in French Prose (Rey's French Composition and Idioms) and in Grammar (Spiers' Rapid French Exercises; Wellington College French Grammar).

#### 2. SENIOR CLASS.

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This class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 to 8 p.m. The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. examination 1912. Regular exercises will be done in French Composition, Grammar, and Unseen Translation. The class will use E. le François, French Test Papers, and Massé, French Spare Moments (8d.). Lectures will be given on Literature as prescribed for the B.A. examination.

The following edition of the set books for 1912 is recommended:—

Tocqueville, Ancien Régime: Headlam, Clarendon Press.

Students who have not already arranged their plans for Vacation Reading are requested to communicate with Prof. von Zedlitz without delay. Students are reminded that the Vacation may advantageously be devoted to reading some of the works of the principal authors of the prescribed period of Literature.

# 3. SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CLASS.

The work of this class will be in part the same as that of the Senior class, but special lectures will be delivered forming the first half of a two years' honours course. The times for these lectures will

be arranged to suit the convenience of students; provisionally 4 to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays has been reserved for them.

#### 4. Honours Class.

This class will probably meet from 4 to 5 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Intending students are requested to communicate with Professor von Zedlitz without delay. The Dictionary recommended is the Dictionnaire Général of Hatzfeld Darmesteter and Thomas (32/-).

The Best French Historical Grammar is that of Nyrop (3 vols., 30/-).

#### 5. COMMERCIAL CLASS.

This class will be provided if required. The time of Lectures will probably be either from 6 to 7 p.m. or from 7 to 8 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

## ORAL EXAMINATION.

In connection with the requirements of the University, an oral examination will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Candidates are advised to take this examination when sitting for their First Year's Terms. The examination will include dictation, and reading of a short passage taken from the Second Act of Bourgeois Gentilhomme.

## GERMAN. - Professor von Zedlitz.

There will be four classes in this subject:—

- 1. Junior Class for B.A. degree work.
- 2. Senior Class for B.A. degree work.
- 3. Senior Scholarship Class.
- 4. Honours Class.

In addition to these an elementary class for absolute beginners may be formed if required, also a class in Commercial German.

#### 1. JUNIOR CLASS.

This class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5 to 6 p.m., or at such other time as may suit. The work will constitute the first half of a two years' course in preparation for the B.A. examination. The books read will be: Hauff, Wirtshaus im Spessart, Schiller, Selected Lyrics, Goethe, Lyrical Poems. The class will also use Eve's Grammar, Eve's Second German Exercises, and Morich's Grammar Papers.

#### 2. SENIOR CLASS.

This class will meet on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 5 to 6 p.m. Lectures will be given on literature and on the books prescribed for the B.A. examination 1912. The class will use Eve's Grammar, and Morich's Grammar Papers. The most suitable History of German Literature is that of Francke (10/-).

## 3. SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CLASS.

The work of this class will be in part the same as that of the Senior Class, but special lectures will be delivered forming the first half of a two years' honours course. The times for these lectures will be arranged to suit the convenience of students; provisionally 2.30 to 4 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays has been reserved for them.

### 4. Honours Class.

This class will probably meet from 2.30 to 4 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Intending

students are requested to communicate with Professor von Zedlitz without delay. The Dictionary recommended is Muret-Sanders smaller dictionary (18/-).

The best German Grammar is that of Blatz (2 vols., 16/-).

#### 5. ELEMENTARY CLASS.

The times for this class will be arranged to suit the convenience of students. Siepmann's Public School Primer will be used.

In connection with the requirements of the University an oral examination will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Candidates are advised to take this examination when sitting for First Year's Terms. The examination will include dictation, and reading of a short passage taken from the Fourth Act of Egmont.

## MENTAL SCIENCE.

Professor Hunter.

The work of this department covers the following subjects:—

Logic: Deductive and Inductive. Psychology. Experimental Psychology. Ethics and the History of Ethics. History of Philosophy.

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The classes are arranged as follows:-

# (A.) JUNIOR CLASS.

The object of this class is to make students familiar with the outlines of Logic and Psychology. All beginners are recommended to commence with this course. The class meets on Monday, Wednes-

day and Friday, at 6 p.m., Psychology being taken in the first term and Logic in the second. Weekly exercises are set, and time is given to the discussion of questions. Students of this class will attend the course (B) in Experimental Psychology.

Text Books :-

Russell: An Elementary Logic. Titchener: A Primer of Psychology.

Seashore: Elementary Experiments in Psychology.

Any students desirous of reading for Honours in Mental Science should confer with the Professor bebefore beginning their University course.

# (B.) Experimental Psychology.

This course, which can be taken by itself, includes:—

- (a) The lectures on Psychology in Course (A). These are delivered throughout the first term on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6 p.m.
- (b) A course in the laboratory, covering an outline of the methods of psychological experimentation. Students will perform a series of typical experiments in sensation, perception, sense-illusions, memory and association, reactions, etc.

This course meets the requirements of teachers who desire to become acquainted with modern methods in Psychology.

# (C.) SENIOR CLASS.

Students are advised to take course (A) before joining the Senior Class. The class meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 7 p.m., Logic being taken in the first term and Psychology in the second. Weekly exercises are set, and time is given to the discussion of questions. Students of this class may attend the course (B) in Experimental Psychology.

On the special period, 1640-1702, Bright's Personal Monarchy and Bright's Constitutional Monarchy will be used, and on general English History, Oman's History of England. Green's Short History should also be read.

One-half of the course will be devoted to the set period, and the remainder to general English History.

Students reading for Honours in 1912 should consult the Lecturer at once as to their reading. The hours at which the Honours Class will meet will be fixed at the beginning of the session.

## B.Com. Degree.

The Lecturer in Economics will also deliver courses of Lectures covering the work prescribed for the B.Com. Degree in the following subjects, in addi-

tion to Economics: Economic Geography, General History, Statistical Method, Currency and Banking, and Industrial History.

Hours will be arranged at the beginning of the session. Students in these subjects should communicate with the Lecturer as to text-books.

# CHEMISTRY.—Professor Easterfield.

#### I.—GENERAL COURSE.

This course consists of three lectures weekly throughout the session, and serves as a general introduction to the study of chemistry. Candidates for the pass Degrees of the University of New Zealand are advised to take this course together with the class in Organic Chemistry.

Part I. treats of the non-metallic elements and their important compounds, the laws of chemical combination and elementary chemical theory.

Part II. deals with the metals, their occurrence and the methods of extraction from their ores, their detection and quantitative estimation.

Part III. is devoted to organic chemistry, and includes organic analysis, general methods of purification, identification and relationships of typical organic compounds.

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Intending students should consult Professor Easterfield before purchasing text books.

# 2.—Organic Chemistry (Elementary).

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The Class meets twice weekly, at hours to be arranged. A knowledge of general inorganic chemistry will be pre-supposed. The course will be fully illustrated experimentally, and will meet the requirements of medical students, and of those who propose to take the advanced course in a subsequent year.

Text Book—Remsen's Organic Chemistry, or Perkin and Kipping's Organic Chemistry.

## 3.—ADVANCED COURSE.

During the session 1912 Organic and Physical Chemistry will mainly be studied in this course.

A Class for advanced students will meet three times weekly at hours to be arranged to suit the students.

# PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

The Victoria College laboratories afford excellent opportunities for the study of experimental chemistry. To each student a separate bench is allotted, furnished with gas, water, and reagents. A charge of ten shillings is made for materials, but unusual breakages must be made good. Special encouragement is given to those who, having obtained a sound training in practical chemistry, propose to carry out original investigations in organic, physical, or technological chemistry.

Students who wish to take up chemistry as a profession are advised to work in the laboratory not

less than eighteen hours weekly, and to attend the lectures in physics, mathematics, and German.

All students are required to keep a systematic record of their laboratory work.

## 1.—Preliminary Course.

This course meets the requirements of students preparing for the pass Degrees of the University. The Class meets three times weekly for purposes of demonstration, but the laboratory will be open at other specified times to suit the convenience of students. A minimum attendance of five hours weekly is required from Degree candidates.

Subjects treated.—Simple inorganic preparations, elementary quantitative measurement, qualitative analysis.

## 2. ADVANCED COURSE.

This is intended for those who wish to obtain a useful knowledge of practical chemistry, such as is required by Honours students, professional chemists, or teachers of the subject. Demonstrations will be arranged at hours to suit the students, and special attention will be paid to quantitative analysis, determination of physico-chemical constants, and the preparation and systematic examination of organic and inorganic compounds. The full course will extend over three years.

## PRACTICAL PHYSICS.

PASS B.Sc., AND B.A., MEDICAL AND ENGINEERING.

The Practical Class meets for four hours weekly during three terms, for experimental work on the subjects of the lectures.

## SENIOR SCHOLARSHIPS.

Candidates for these Scholarships are recommended to do at least 6 hours practical work per week.

## HONOURS IN SCIENCE AND ARTS.

Students will be encouraged to undertake an original investigation during their fourth year.

## RECORD OF EXPERIMENTAL WORK.

All students will be required to keep concise, but adequate, notes of their experimental work, which will be marked at the completion of each experiment. A satisfactory record of work in this form, and the exhibition of some experimental skill will ordinarily exempt a student from a practical examination. Compulsory questions on the theory of the experiments of the course and physical instruments will be set in the examination papers at the end of the year.

## RESEARCH.

Every facility possible will be afforded to those who undertake research work.

## BIOLOGY.—Professor Kirk.

## GENERAL BIOLOGY.

To be taken by all students whether they choose Botany or Zoology.

Note.—Students are advised not to take Biology, whether they choose Botany or Zoology, as a one year's subject. If any student finds it necessary to do so, he should communicate with the Professor at the beginning of his course.

One lecture a week during first year; two during second; laboratory work during both years.

Lectures:-

The consideration of typical organisms, both animals and plants, selected with regard to the lists prescribed in the University statutes, but not confined to those lists; the general principles of biology as illustrated by these and other types; classification, etc.

The second year's course will consist of lectures on the general questions of Biology, such as evolution, distribution, heredity, etc., and on Physiology and the anatomy of the Frog. Although the Frog will be the subject of most of the practical work, the lectures will be so framed as to aim at establishing a working knowledge of the elementary physiology of the higher animals; and this course can, if necesary, be taken by students who wish to gain such a knowledge, although they may not have taken the first year's course. Students wishing to take the subject at the degree examinations must take both courses, and should spend two years in doing so.

Practical Work:-

Microscopical manipulation, the use of dissecting instruments, method; the dissection of typical organisms and the study of their life history.

Facilities will be afforded to persons, not preparing for examination, to learn the use of the microscope and to acquire a knowledge of biological method.

A list of the more important works of reference is posted on the Notice Board in the Laboratory.

## Two Years Course

#### BOTANY.

Two lectures a week during first year; one during second; laboratory work during both years.

#### Lectures:-

The structure, life history, physiology, etc., of the prescribed types and of others, consideration of the groups to which the types belong, especial attention being given to the prescribed natural orders; classification, etc.

In the first year the work will deal mainly with the types, with classification and with morphology; in the second with physiology, and with the prescribed orders.

## Practical Work:-

Dissection and examination of typical plants. physiology, field work, and observation.

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Students should supply themselves with the following appliances:—A note-book and a drawing-book, two pencils, a pair of forceps, two mounted

needles, a razor, and a pocket magnifying-glass. At least four hours a week should be spent at practical work.

Students of Botany, whether formally attached to the College or not, may obtain from the Professor permission to refer to the late Mr. T. Kirk's herbarium of New Zealand Flowering Plants, and to the late Dr. Knight's herbarium of Lichens (presented to the College by Mrs. Knight).

## Two Years Course.

## ZOOLOGY.

Two lectures a week during first year; one during second; laboratory work during both years.

Lectures :-

The anatomy, physiology, classification, etc., of animals, with special regard to the types prescribed by the University statutes for the pass degree examination, but not to these types exclusively.

The first year's work will deal with the Invertebrata, the second mainly with the Chordata.

Practical Work: -

Dissection and examination of typical animals, field work, and observation.

Students will be required to spend at least four hours a week at practical work.

Geology.-Lecturer: C. A. Cotton, M.Sc.

The Course for B.A. or B.Sc. Degree work will normally occupy two years.

FIRST YEAR (Physical Geology).

This course will serve as an introduction to the subject, and will prepare for paper (a) of the B.A. examination, but is not limited to the requirements of the examination.

Two lectures a week will be given, and at least three hours a week should be spent at practical work.

## ELEMENTARY COURSE.

Throughout the session, 1912, this class will meet two hours per week. Lectures will be given on General Geology, and some time will be allowed for handing round and discussion of specimens. Physiography and Physical Geology will be dealt with more fully than other branches, in order to meet the requirements of school teachers who wish to acquire the rudiments of Geology as an aid to the teaching of Geography. The course will also suit other beginners who are not preparing for the University examinations. The class will not count for "keeping terms," Hours not definitely arranged, but possibly Mondays, 6 to 7 p.m., and Saturdays, 9 to 10 a.m.

## LAW.

Professor of Law and Dean of the Faculty of Law— Professor Adamson. Professor of English and New Zealand Law—Professor Garrow.

Courses of lectures are given during each session on all subjects required for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, and for the Professional Examinations in Law. Courses of lectures in the subjects of the course for the degree of Master of Laws are given when required.

# 1. Jurisprudence and Constitutional History. (Professor Adamson.)

These constitute two subjects in the course for the degree of Bachelor of Laws and a single subject for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. A course of three lectures a week will be delivered on Mondays. Wednesdays, and Fridays at 5 p.m. during the First Term on Constitutional History, and during the Second on Jurisprudence. Candidates for a degree in Arts or Law are advised to attend this class during two sessions. Text Books:-
