NOTICE TO STUDENTS

The Professorial Board supervises the courses of all new students. Before enrolment in classes a record of the proposed course of study, signed by the Chairman of the Professorial Board, or by the Chairman of one of the Faculties (of Arts, Science, or Law), must be in the hands of the Registrar. In the case of a student proceeding to one of the University degrees, this record shall state the complete course of study proposed for that degree; and subsequent departures (if any) from such proposed course will have to be similarly recorded.

New students should send in to the Registrar, preferably before the beginning of term, either

- (1) notification of the courses they have provisionally determined upon, or
- (2) request for advice upon their courses, accompanied by such relevant facts as may be available.

In case of (1) the matter will normally be dealt with by instructions posted on the College notice board. In case of (2) appointments will be made.

In planning provisional courses the Terms Regulations and the Timetable of classes must be carefully regarded.

TERMS REGULATIONS

1. The College year shall consist of two Terms: the First Term to begin towards the end of March and to end towards the end of June; the Second Term to begin about three weeks from the first day of July and to end in the last week of October.

2. The following are the subjects recognised in this College for keeping Terms:—(1) Latin, (2) Greek, (3) English, (4) French, (5) German, (6) Philosophy, (7) Education, (8) Economics, (9) Constitutional History and Jurisprudence,* (10) English History, (11) Pure Mathematics, (12) Applied Mathematics, (13) Physics, (14) Chemistry, (15) Biology, (16) Geology, (17) Geography (B.Com. only), (18) Law.†

3. To pass in any subject a student (unless exempted—see below) must attend the Lectures in that subject, must do the regular work of the class to the satisfaction of the professor (or lecturer), and must pass the prescribed examinations. A student shall not be considered to have fulfilled the attendance requirement in a subject if he has been absent from more than one-tenth of the lectures in the subject.

4. The Examinations prescribed for the keeping of Terms may be passed in the same or in different years.

5. (a) To keep First Year Terms a student must pass the College Examination in two subjects.

No student, unless qualified to sit for the First Section of a Degree after First Year Terms have been kept, shall be allowed to take the College Examination at the end of his first year in more than two subjects at the standard equivalent to that of the Pass Examination.

(b) To keep Second Year Terms a student must have kept First Year Terms and must pass the College Examinations in the subjects he is offering for a Section of a Degree at a stage corresponding to that of the University Examination.

NOTE.—The New Zealand University Statutes provide that a student presenting himself for a University Examination for which the keeping of Terms is required must have passed the subjects he offers at a stage corresponding to that of the University Examination.

*Jurisprudence and Constitutional History count as a single subject in the Faculty of Arts, but as two separate subjects in the Faculty of Law. First Year Terms in Law may be kept by passing in either of these subjects together with one other subject. For Second Year Terms, Jurisprudence and Constitutional History must be passed at the same examination.

†Terms may be kept in Law subjects only, by Scholars, but all LL.B. students must pass the Terms Examination in all the subjects of the First Division of the examination for LL.B.

(c) To keep Third Year Terms a student must have kept Second Year Terms and must pass the College Examinations in the remaining subjects required for the Degree of B.A., or B.Sc., at a standard corresponding to that of the University Examination.

6. A holder of a Junior University or a Senior National Scholarship who, after keeping First Year Terms, has passed a Section of the B.A., or B.Sc., Examination;

(a) To keep Second Year Terms *either* must pass the College Examination in the remaining subjects required for the Degree (one of which must be a *repeated subject), *or* must produce a certificate of having made substantial progress in his repeated subject;

(b) To keep Third Year Terms must have kept Second Year Terms, must pass in the remaining subjects required for the Degree, *and* must produce a certificate of having made substantial progress in his repeated subject.

7. A Graduate in Arts or Science proceeding to qualify for a Degree in Science or Arts in the manner provided for Graduates who have had the Degree of B.A., or B.Sc., conferred on them before the end of 1915 must, to keep Fourth Year Terms, pass the College Examination in such further subjects as are required at a stage corresponding to that of the University Examination; and a Graduate proceeding to qualify under the regulations which require the keeping of Terms for two years;

(a) To keep Fourth Year Terms must pass the College Examination in two of the subjects required for the second degree at a standard corresponding to that of the University Examination;

(b) To keep Fifth Year Terms must have kept Fourth Year Terms and must pass the College Examination in the remaining subjects required for the Degree at a stage corresponding to that of the University Examination.

8. For keeping Terms in Science the Practical Examination or performance of a practical course to the satisfaction of the instructor shall be deemed to be a part of the College Examination; and, unless specially exempted by the Science Faculty, a student presenting himself for a College Examination in a Science subject for the purpose of keeping Terms must do the practical work in that subject in the year in which he so presents himself.

9. Students must notify to the Registrar, on or before the fifteenth day of August, the subjects in which they wish to keep terms; a "repeated" subject must be notified as such.

10. (a) Exemption from lectures is provided for under certain conditions.

(b) To keep terms, exempted students must pass the Annual College Examination in the requisite number of subjects, and all the above regulations shall apply to them except that of paragraph 3.

(c) The fee for the Annual Examination of any student exempted from attendance at lectures shall be one guinea for each subject in which he is examined, and if fully exempted a further fee of one guinea.

N.B.—In no case shall a fee be refunded. But if a candidate be prevented by sickness, or other sufficient cause, from taking the examination, the fee shall be credited to him for a future examination: provided that such credit shall not extend for more than two years. If, after payment of a fee, the candidate be removed to another College district, the fee shall be transferred to his credit at that College.

NOTE.—The foregoing regulations as to terms, which came into force at the College examinations of October, 1916, are not retrospective.

*A subject "repeated" in accordance with the New Zealand University B.A. or B.Sc. Degree Statute counts as a separate subject for keeping terms.

FEES

COLLEGE FEE:—Every student is required to pay a College Fee of ten shillings and sixpence per annum for general tuition.

Class fees may be paid in two instalments, one at the beginning of each term. Enrolment in a class shall be regarded as rendering the student liable for both instalments, provided that the second instalment may be remitted on application to the Council on the recommendation of the Professorial Board, in the case of a student who ceases to attend the lectures. Attendance at a class will be debarred if fees have not been paid after two weeks' lectures. Provided that a student may, with the consent of the Professor (or Lecturer), join a class for the first time at any stage of the year's work, on payment of the full fee (or first instalment thereof) in case of joining in the First Term, half fee in case of joining in the Second Term.

For class fees, see special class announcements.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS.

1. In the case of disorderly conduct or any breach of the regulations the Librarian may and in serious cases shall report the person so offending to the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Any person so reported, if found guilty of any breach of the Regulations, shall be reprimanded and may be excluded from the use of the Library or dealt with in such other way as the Professorial Board may direct.

HOURS.

2. During the Session the Library shall be open to readers from 10 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. on all week days except Saturdays, when it shall be open from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

3. The Library shall be closed on Sundays, on public holidays, and at such other times as the Professorial Board may direct.

4. Regulations will be issued from time to time for the use of the Library during recess.

ADMISSION FOR READING PURPOSES.

5. The following persons shall be entitled to use the Library for reading purposes:—

(a) Members of the College Council.

(b) Members of the Teaching Staff.

(c) Students who have paid the College fee for the current year.

(d) Graduates of any University, and persons engaged in Research work, to whom permission shall have been specially granted by the Library Committee of the Professorial Board.

NOTE.—Persons entitled under (c) and (d) using the Library for the first time must report themselves to the Librarian.

CONDUCT OF READERS IN THE LIBRARY.

6. The use of pens and ink in the Library is strictly prohibited except at tables provided for the purpose.

7. No books are to be removed from the Library except as provided in Regulations 10, 11 and 12.

8. Books removed from the shelves by readers must be left on the tables in the reading rooms, except Law reports, which shall be replaced on the shelves.

9. Readers are particularly cautioned against injuring books belonging to the Library by writing in the margin, marking or turning down the leaves, or otherwise disfiguring them.

BORROWING BOOKS.

10. Members of the College Council and the Professors and Lecturers of the College may borrow any volumes provided:

(a) That entry of each volume so borrowed be made, dated, and signed, by the borrower, in the Ledger provided for the purpose.

(b) That volumes specified in Regulation 13 be retained by borrowers not longer than one week, and that no volume be retained for more than two months except during the long vacation.

11. Any other member of the Staff may borrow volumes except those volumes specified in Regulation 13, provided:

(a) That entry be made as in Regulation 10.

(b) That not more than 5 volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than one month except during the long vacation.

12. Any other person privileged under Regulation 5 for reading purposes may on application to the Librarian borrow books at hours notified on the Library notice-board, provided.

(a) That a deposit of One Guinea be made with the Librarian which shall be returned to the depositor when he ceases to avail himself of the privilege of borrowing books provided he has returned undamaged all books borrowed by him: provided that a Professor's written voucher shall be accepted in lieu of a deposit of One Guinea.

(b) That not more than two volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than 14 days: provided that on the written request of a Professor or of an Independent Lecturer any Honours or Research student or student doing advanced work may take out five volumes at one time, no volume to be retained for more than one month.

13. Save as provided in Regulation 10, encyclopædias, dictionaries, law reports, prose translations of the classics, books containing valuable engravings, works with loose plates or maps, periodicals which have been less than a fortnight in the Library, may not be borrowed from the Library. Provided, always without prejudice to Regulation 10, that text-books prescribed for the current year, and books listed as specially in demand, may be withheld, lent, or recalled by the Librarian. A book so recalled must be returned within 3 days.

14. A Request Book shall be provided in which the names of those wishing to obtain books in circulation, the titles of the books and the date of request may be entered. Any book which has been entered in the request book shall be returned on the demand of the Librarian within three days.

15. The borrower shall be liable for any damage a book may have sustained whilst in his keeping.

16. No book belonging to the Library shall be privately lent by any borrower.

17. All books and publications of every kind belonging to the Library must be returned on or before February 1st in each year, so as to be in the Library during the 8 days immediately following during which the Library will be closed.

NOTE.—Reciprocal arrangements have been made with the Wellington Philosophical Society, whereby Students of the College can visit the library of that Society and consult books and periodicals, on production of a card from the College Librarian.

Current numbers of *Mind*, *Psychological Bulletin and Review*, *International Journal of Ethics* and *Journal of Educational Psychology* should be consulted at the Public Library.

UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS AND PRIZES.

For the list of National Research Scholarships and University Scholarships and Prizes open to Students of Victoria University College, see the Calendar of the University of New Zealand.

NOTE.—Rhodes Scholarship. Applications for this Scholarship for which the Professorial Board has the right to nominate one candidate annually must be lodged with the College Registrar, not later than the first Friday in the Second Term.

VICTORIA COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

SIR GEORGE GREY SCHOLARSHIP.

(Subject to the granting of a vote by Parliament).

REGULATIONS.

1. The Scholarship shall be open to undergraduates whose academic standing does not exceed three years.

2. The subjects of examination shall be chosen from the following:—
(a) HEAT, SOUND AND LIGHT; (b) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM; (c) ASTRONOMY; (d) GEOLOGY; (e) PURE MATHEMATICS; (f) MECHANICS AND HYDROSTATICS; (g) CHEMISTRY; (h) BOTANY; (i) ZOOLOGY.

3. Out of the nine possible subjects at least two must be taken and not more than three; and one at least must be taken from the four subjects (a), (b), (c), (d). In awarding the Scholarship the Professorial Board will prefer special distinction in a single subject to a fair knowledge of the two or three subjects selected.

4. The Scholarship will be awarded on the result of the College Annual Examination, with a special practical examination in Natural Science, Chemistry, and Physics, and a special paper in Astronomy.

5. The award of the Scholarship will be announced soon after the College Annual Examination.

6. The Scholarship will not be tenable with any other Scholarship or Exhibition.

7. The Scholar must attend such a course of lectures and do such practical work as shall be approved by the Professorial Board.

8. The Scholar must not during the tenure of his Scholarship undertake any duties that in the opinion of the Professorial Board will prevent him from prosecuting his studies satisfactorily.

9. The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable for one year.

NOTE.—Candidates must give in their names to the Registrar not later than the 20th of September.

JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

The late Mr. Jacob Joseph bequeathed a sum of £3,000 to Victoria College, in the year 1905, for the foundation of Scholarships. On this foundation two Scholarships of £60, tenable for one year, are open for award annually, under the following regulations:—

1. The Scholarships shall be open to students (either men or women):
 - (i.) Whose year of matriculation is not more than five years prior to the year of the award—except in the case of Law students, for whom the corresponding interval shall be seven years:
 - (ii.) Who have studied at Victoria College for at least two years, and have completed an Honours course thereat to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board:
 - (iii.) Who have been certified by the University of New Zealand to have attained to the standard of Honours.
2. Preference, *ceteris paribus*, shall be shown to students of Law and Experimental Science (including Mental Science, provided that evidence of sufficient Laboratory work be forthcoming).
3. The Scholarships shall be awarded on evidence of capacity to undertake original work.
4. The tenure of the Scholarships shall be subject to the following conditions:—
 - (i.) A scholar shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.
 - (ii.) He shall submit to the Professorial Board a thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that thesis, and specifically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a printed or type-written copy of this thesis for the College Library.
5. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first on August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled, but the second instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award. Payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Professorial Board.
6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by March 15th.
7. The holding of another scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.
8. In the event of no scholarship or only one scholarship being awarded in any year, additional scholarships may be awarded in any subsequent year.

LATIN

ADVANCED CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m., and Saturdays 8.45 a.m. The work in the class is conditioned by the books set for the University Honours Examination, but is not confined to these. The books set for Repeated Latin are read on Mondays and Tuesdays and students repeating Latin must attend at these hours.

The special books for Honours are read on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Courses of Lectures are given on Syntax, Literature and History; and weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation.

SENIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 6 to 7 p.m., and Wednesdays, 7 to 8 p.m. Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation, and lectures are delivered at intervals.

JUNIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays 6 to 7 p.m. It is intended for first year students, and the work is of a more elementary nature than that of the Senior Class. Special attention is paid to Latin Prose (Ramsay, vol. I, 4/6), and Grammar. The books read during 1917 will be Cicero, *In Verrem* IV. (*De Signis*), Virgil, *Aeneid* IV. All students are expected to take this class, unless exempted for special reasons by the Professor.

TUTORIAL CLASSES.

A class is held on Saturday (9-10) for Sight Translation. All students who can do so are advised to attend this class.

ADVANCED CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Honours or Repeating Greek. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

SENIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The work of this Class is arranged to suit students who are reading for the B.A. Examination. It will meet at least three hours per week at such times as may best suit students, provided that they can come before 5 p.m. For Greek Prose, Arnold (3/6) and Sidgwick (5/-) will be used. Goodwin's Greek Grammar (6/-) is recommended. For Sight Translation, Florilegium Tironis Graecum (Burrows and Walters) will be used.

JUNIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class is intended for students who have just begun or are beginning Greek. It will meet probably three hours per week before 5 p.m., at an hour to suit students. FRENCH

1. JUNIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This class is intended principally for first year students, and meets on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 to 8 p.m.

The books read will be *L'Ancien Régime*, *De Tocqueville*; *Tartuffe*, *Molière*; *La Terre qui meurt*, *Bazin*. Regular exercises will be done in French Composition, Grammar, and Pronunciation. Text Books: *Rey's French Composition and Idioms*, and the *Wellington College French Grammar*. *Dictionnaire of Gase* (12/6).

2. SENIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5 to 6 p.m., and on Fridays from 7 to 8 p.m. The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. Examination 1917. The class will use *E. le François*, *French Test Papers*, for Composition and Unseen Translation. Instruction in French Pronunciation will be given. Lectures on French Literature 1845-1885 will be delivered.

A voluntary hour on Saturday morning, open to students of all classes, will be devoted to reading French aloud.

3. SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The work of this class will be in part the same as that of the Senior class, but special lectures will be delivered forming the first half of a two years' honours course. The times for these lectures will be arranged to suit the convenience of students; provisionally 4 to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays has been reserved for them. Students in this class may attend the lectures on French Literature 1845-1885 delivered to the Senior Class.

4. HONOURS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This class will probably meet from 4 to 5 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The Dictionary recommended is the Dictionnaire Général of Hatzfeld Darmesteter and Thomas (32/-).

The Best French Historical Grammar is that of Nyrop, 4 vols., 40/-).

5. COMMERCIAL CLASS.

Fee £2 2s.

This class will be provided if required. The time of Lectures will be arranged to suit the convenience of students.

ORAL EXAMINATION.

In connection with the requirements of the University an oral examination in French reading and dictation will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Candidates are advised to take this examination when sitting for the First Year's Terms.

GERMAN

Senior Scholarship and Honours classes in German will be formed as required, at such hours as may suit the requirements of students. There will also be an elementary class for absolute beginners, if required.

Exempted students are invited to communicate with the Lecturer with reference to their reading.

Any students desirous of reading for Honours in Economics should confer with the Lecturer at the beginning of their University course.

ADVANCED CLASS.

This class meets the requirements of those who are reading for Senior Scholarship or are repeating Economics. The class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m.

Books recommended:—Gide: Principles of Political Economy; Marshall: Principles; Keynes: Scope and Method; Armitage-Smith: Principles and Methods of Taxation; Bowley: Elementary Manual of Statistics; Bastable: International Trade.

HONOURS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This class meets the requirements of students reading for Honours. The class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 4 to 5 p.m.

Books recommended:—Keynes: Scope and Method; Nicholson: Principles; Marshall: Principles; Bowley: Elements of Statistics; Bowley: Elementary Manual of Statistics; Withers: The Meaning of Money; Fisher: The Purchasing Power of Money.

HISTORY

Mr. Wilson.

PASS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This class, which covers the work for the B.A. Degree, meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays, from 7 to 8 p.m.

The course will deal with the development of the Great powers in the Nineteenth Century, and with the Outlines of English History.

Text-Books:—Oman: History of England; Oman: England in the 19th Century; Hawkesworth: The Last Century in Europe.

REPEAT CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The work covered in the lectures for this class will be the outlines of European History and the History of the British Colonies. Hours will be fixed at the beginning of the Session.

HONOURS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

Lectures will be given on English and European History on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 4 to 5 p.m. Reading will be recommended during the course.

B.COM. DEGREE.

Fee £1 11s. 6d. for each of (c), (d), (e).

The Lecturer in Economics will also deliver courses of Lectures covering the work prescribed for the B.Com. Degree in the following subjects:—

(a) and (b) Economics and European History, as for B.A. Pass; (c) Economic Geography; (d) Statistical Method; (e) Currency and Banking.

MATHEMATICS, PURE AND APPLIED.

PURE MATHEMATICS.

In both Pure and Applied Mathematics the complete Honours course extends over at least two years. The Advanced Classes (II.) form the first part of the Honours course, and also prepare students for Senior Scholarships and for Repetition.

Tutorial Classes are held in so far as they can be arranged.

A student before taking the Advanced Class in Pure Mathematics is advised to read the elements of co-ordinate geometry as in Briggs and Bryan's Right Line and Circle, or Gibson and Pinkerton's Analytical Geometry, and to acquire a knowledge of the elementary processes of differentiation and integration.

PHYSICS.

Professor Marsden, Mr. P. W. Burbidge.

Fee £3 3s.

1.—PASS CLASS.

The course for this class covers the work prescribed for the Pass B.Sc. and B.A., Medical Intermediate and Engineering Preliminary Syllabuses. Students are advised to take two years over their study of the course but it may in special cases be taken in one year.

FIRST YEAR COURSE.

Three lectures weekly for two terms on General Physics, Properties of Matter, Sound and Light; Mondays and Wednesdays 7-8 p.m. and at another hour to be arranged.

SECOND YEAR COURSE.

Three lectures weekly on Heat, Electricity and Magnetism; Tuesdays and Thursdays 6-7 p.m. and at another hour to be arranged.

Text-Books:—Watson's Intermediate Physics or Aldous' Physics or Kimball's Physics; Stewart's Light or Edser's Light; Hadley's Electricity and Magnetism; Poynting and Thomson's Sound; Wagstaff's Properties of Matter; Draper's Heat.

2.—REPEAT AND SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CLASSES.

Two courses (a) and (b), at times to be arranged.

(a) Lectures twice weekly on General Physics, Properties of Matter, Heat, Sound and Light.

(b) Lectures twice weekly on General Physics, Properties of Matter, Electricity and Magnetism.

Text-Books:—(a) and (b) Wagstaff's or Poynting and Thomson's Properties of Matter.

(a) Edser's or Poynting and Thomson's Heat; Barton's Sound; Schuster's Optics; Wood's Physical Optics.

(b) Starling's or Foster and Porter's Electricity and Magnetism; J. J. Thomson's Electricity and Magnetism; Thomälen's Electrical Engineering.

3.—HONOURS CLASSES.

Times and books will be arranged.

PRACTICAL PHYSICS

Laboratory Fee £3 3s.

1.—PASS CLASS.

The Demonstrator is in attendance at times arranged on Monday and Wednesday evenings, Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and Saturday mornings. Each student is expected to complete the course of experiments set for each year but the student's work need not be exclusively confined to the set course.

All students will be required to keep concise but adequate notes of their experimental work; these will be marked at the completion of each experiment.

Text-Books:—Allen & Moore's Practical Physics, Kaye & Laby's Tables.

2.—REPEAT AND SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CLASSES.

Students of these classes are recommended to do at least seven hours practical work per week.

Text-Book:—Watson's Practical Physics.

3.—HONOURS CLASS.

Students will be encouraged to undertake an original investigation during their fourth year.

4.—RESEARCH.

Every facility possible will be afforded to those who undertake research work.

CHEMISTRY*Professor Easterfield.*

Fee £3 3s.

1. GENERAL COURSE.

Candidates for pass degrees are advised to take this course. Medical Students should also take the course in Organic Chemistry.

The Class meets Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5 p.m., Saturdays, 9 a.m., Fridays, 7 p.m. (revision).

Text Books:—Mellor: Modern Inorganic Chemistry (7/6); or Smith Introduction to Inorganic Chemistry (10/-); Tilden: Chemical Philosophy (4/6); Ramsay: Modern Chemistry (2/6); Remsen: Organic Chemistry (6/6).

2. ORGANIC CHEMISTRY.

Wednesdays and Fridays at 5 p.m.

Text Books:—Remsen: Organic Chemistry (6/6); or Cohen: Organic Chemistry.

3. ADVANCED COURSE.

Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 4 p.m.

Text Books:—Walker: Physical Chemistry (10/6); Wade: Organic Chemistry (6/-); Mendeléeff: Principles of Chemistry (31/6).

4. HONOURS COURSE.

Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 9 a.m.

A special course of reading will be recommended for each student.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

£3 13s. 6.

The Chemical Laboratory is well equipped for all ordinary chemical operations. Students intending to take up Chemistry as a profession should work in the laboratory not less than eighteen hours weekly and study Mathematics, Physics, French and German.

A minimum attendance of 5 hours weekly is required from candidates for a Pass Degree in Chemistry.

Text Books:—1st Year—Fenton: Qualitative Analysis (6/-); or Perkin: Qualitative Analysis (4/-). 2nd Year—Clowes and Colman: Quantitative Analysis (10/-); Sudborough: Practical Organic Chemistry (5/-). 3rd Year—Findlay: Practical Physical Chemistry (5/-).

Students are encouraged in their 3rd and 4th years to take up research work in Inorganic, Organic, Physical or Technological Chemistry.

BOTANY AND ZOOLOGY.

Professor Kirk.

Fee for each subject £3 3s.; Laboratory Fee and Material £3 8s.

NOTE.—Students are advised not to take Botany or Zoology as a one year's subject. If any student finds it necessary to do so, he should communicate with the Professor at the beginning of his course.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus. It is to be remembered always that lectures do not make a liberal amount of reading unnecessary.

General Text Books:—Parker's Lessons in Elementary Biology (10/6); Marshall's Frog (5/-); Romanes, Darwin and after Darwin, (Longmans) (26/-); Dendy's Evolutionary Biology, (Constable and Co.) (12/6); Hewitt, House-flies and how they spread disease, Lamb, University Press (1/3).

Two Years' Course.

BOTANY.

In the first year the work will deal mainly with the types, with classification, and with morphology; in the second with physiology, with classification and with general questions.

Text Books:—Practical Botany for beginners, (Bower & Vaughan) (3/6); Dendy and Lucas's Introduction to the Study of Botany (4/6); Cockayne, New Zealand Plants and their Story, Government Printing Office (4/-); or A Class Book of Botany, (Mudge and Maslem), (Arnold) (7/6); or Miss A. S. M. Johnston's Botany (Allman and Co.) (7/6); Strasburger's Text Book of Botany, third English edition) (21/-).

Students should supply themselves with the following appliances:—A note-book and a drawing-book, (the latter with alternate pages ruled for notes), two pencils, a pair of forceps, two mounted needles, a razor, and a pocket magnifying-glass. At least four hours a week are to be spent at practical work.

Students of Botany, whether formally attached to the College or not, may obtain from the Professor permission to refer to the late Mr. T. Kirk's herbarium of New Zealand Flowering Plants, and to the late Dr. Knight's herbarium of Lichens (presented to the College by Mrs. Knight).

Two Years' Course.

ZOOLOGY.

The first year's work will deal with the Invertebrata, the second mainly with the Chordata.

Practical Work:—Dissection and examination of typical animals, field work, and observation.

Text Books:—Marshall and Hurst's Practical Zoology (fifth edition) (10/6); Thomson's Outlines of Zoology (10/6).

Students should supply themselves with the following appliances:—A note-book and a drawing book. Two pencils—one hard and one soft. Dissecting instruments—scissors, forceps, scalpels (2), anatomical blow-pipe, mounted needles, seeker, razor with straight edge (better not hollow-ground), pocket magnifying-glass. Duster and hand-towel.

Students will be required to spend at least four hours a week at practical work.

GEOLOGY

Dr. Cotton.

Lectures in Geology will be arranged at hours to meet Students.

Fee for each class £3 3s.; Laboratory Fee £3 3s.

The Course for B.A. or B.Sc. Degree pass may be taken, if necessary, in one year, but students are advised, if possible, to spread the work over two years.

FIRST YEAR (*Physical Geology*).

This course will serve as an introduction to the subject, and will prepare for paper (a) of the B.A. examination.

Two lectures a week will be given, at hours to be arranged to suit students, and at least three hours a week should be spent at practical work.

Text Books:—Geology for Beginners (Watts) (2/6); Rocks and Their Origins (Cole) (1/3); Mineralogy (Hatch) (5/-); Geology of New Zealand (Marshall) (4/-); Practical Exercises in Physical Geography (Davis) (3/6).

SECOND YEAR (*Palaeontology and Stratigraphical Geology*).

Special attention will be paid to New Zealand Stratigraphical Geology.

Two lectures a week will be given, at hours to be arranged to suit students, and at least three hours a week should be spent at practical work.

Text Books:—Principles of Stratigraphical Geology (Marr) (6/-); Palaeontology (Woods) (6/-); New Zealand and Adjacent Islands (Marshall) (4/-).

ADVANCED COURSE.

Courses will be arranged for students preparing for the Repeat and Honours examinations. The lectures during one term in each year will deal with the Stratigraphical Geology of New Zealand. Six hours a week should be spent at practical work. Students repeating Geology or working for Senior Scholarship must do advanced work for one year; and Honours Students for two years.

Text Books:—Chamberlin and Salisbury's Geology Vol. I. (25/-); Petrology for Students (Harker) (7/6); Minerals in Rock Sections (Luquer) (9/-).

Field excursions will be arranged, which may be attended by students in all classes.

LAW

1. JURISPRUDENCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY.

Fee £1 11s. 6d. for each subject.

Professor Adamson.

A course of three lectures a week will be delivered on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at 8 a.m., during the First Term on Jurisprudence, and during the Second on Constitutional History. Candidates for a degree in Arts or Law are advised to attend this class during two sessions.

Text Books:—Salmond's Jurisprudence; Taswell Langmead's Constitutional History of England.

2. ROMAN LAW.—*Professor Adamson.*

Fee £3 3s.

A course of three lectures a week will be given on the history of Roman Law and the Institutes of Justinian.

This class meets on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays at 8 a.m.

ACCOUNTANCY, AUDITING AND COMMERCIAL LAW

The following subjects, comprising the Third and Fourth Divisions of the B.Com. Degree Examination, are recognised as constituting also the professional examination of the N.Z. Society of Accountants.

ACCOUNTANCY AND AUDITING.—*Mr. Barton.*

BOOKKEEPING (Elementary).

Fee £1 11s. 6d.

This class meets at Accountants' Chambers, Johnston street on Mondays and Wednesdays during the first term, and on Mondays only during the second term. Hours, 5.15 to 6.30.

Students taking this course are expected to have mastered previously the principles of double-entry book-keeping, and to have a knowledge of the nature and uses of ordinary commercial books of account, to be able to make all usual balance day adjustments, and prepare a profit and loss account and balance-sheet.

The lectures will be illustrated by blackboard work, and by forms of accounts supplied to students. Problems in practical accounting will be supplied, and the lecturer will meet students by appointment to discuss and correct their solutions of these problems.

Books recommended:—Twentieth Century Commerce and Book-keeping (Barton); Book-keeping and Accounts (Spicer and Pegler).

Students are recommended to obtain also the published accounts of the A.M.P. Society.

AUDITING (Elementary).

Fee £1 11s. 6d.

This class meets during the second term only, on Wednesday, from 5.15 to 6.45. Test questions, on points dealt with in the lectures, will be supplied to students, and the lecturer will meet students by appointment to discuss this work with them.

Books recommended:—Auditing (Spicer and Pegler); Audits (Cutforth).

BOOK-KEEPING (Advanced).

Fee £1 11s. 6d.

This class meets on Friday evenings from 5.15 to 6.45.

The methods adopted for illustrating the lectures and testing students' work will be similar to those described in connection with the intermediate lectures.
