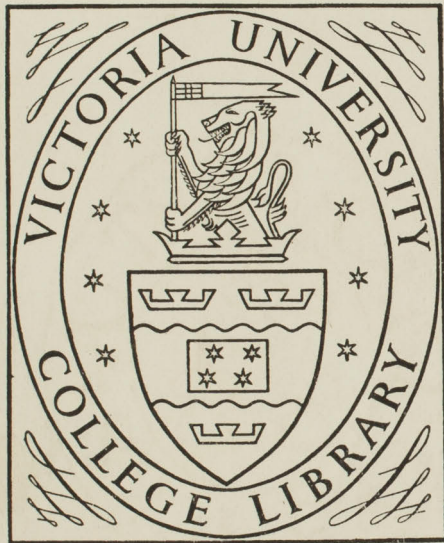

### HISTORICAL NOTICE.

On the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and higher education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things, recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature to make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington.

For the maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and that the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate income to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; that, if this were not practicable, the deficit in each case should be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand"; and provision was made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment. Certain members of the Council were appointed, but nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897, the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon, P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act; an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the

22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six scholarships each year called "Queen's Scholarships," to persons of either sex under the age of 14 years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. In 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. By the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907, the Queen's Scholarships were abolished. The Act of 1897 further set apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumarū Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appointment of four Professors for the Chairs of Classics, English Language and Literature, Chemistry and Physics, and Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and the following were appointed:— Classics, J. R. Brown, M.A., St. Andrews and Oxford; English Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A., St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A., Cambridge, Ph.D., Würzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D., Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun.

The Staff has since been increased by the foundation of Chairs in Modern Languages, Biology, Roman Law etc., English and New Zealand Law, Mental and Moral Philosophy, and Physics, and by the institution of Lectureships in History, Geology, Education, and Economics.

The College was admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

#### SITE AND BUILDINGS.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, six acres in extent, and the Government provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings was erected, the foundation stone being laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904. They were opened by His Excellency Lord Plunket on the 30th March, 1906.

In March, 1910, a further portion of the buildings was

completed, forming a wing at the rear of the Arts Building. This wing contains two large class-rooms, and in the basement a men's cloak room, a women's common-room, and a large room in which light meals may be obtained during the College session.

In 1919, the Government made the College a grant for the completion of the north wing, the building of which is at present in progress. This wing will provide ample accommodation for the Library and the new School of Economics, besides private rooms for Professors, a new Women's Common Room and a new Tea Room. Space will thus be freed in the Arts Building, which will provide for a Men's Common Room, an extension of the office and extensions of the Geology, Biology and Physics Departments.

#### COLLEGE LIBRARY.

The College Library is maintained by an annual grant of £400 out of the College funds. At present it contains about 12,000 volumes, and subscribes for rather more than sixty periodicals.

WORKERS' EDUCATIONAL CLASSES.

In 1915, the Council, in co-operation with the Workers' Educational Association, established three classes in Wellington. The movement has now grown considerably, and in 1919 fifteen classes were being conducted in different parts of the Victoria University district.

In 1905, the College received from Parliament an additional annual grant of £2,000 for specialisation in Law and Science.

In 1914, the Victoria College Amendment Act was passed, by which it was enacted that the name of the College should in future be the Victoria University College. Changes were made in the constitution of the Council and of the Professorial Board. In the same year by an amendment to the New Zealand University Act an increase of £3,000 was made in the annual grant, and all the grants from the Government were consolidated into one annual grant of £9,000; further, the College was allotted a share of the National Endowment grant, part of which (amounting in 1919 to £1,880) comes direct from the Government, while a second part (amounting in 1919 to £940) is paid through the New Zealand University. Of this last sum £300 is set apart for Workers' Educational Classes.

In 1919, an amending Act to the New Zealand University Act was passed, in which it was enacted that from April 1st, 1920, the annual grant to this College should be increased by £2,500.

In 1915, the Trustees of the late T. G. Macarthy made a grant of £10,000, for the purpose of establishing a School of Economics, to be called "The T. G. Macarthy School of Economics." The foundation of the Chair was, however, delayed owing to the war. The Council is at present calling for applications, and the Chair will be filled in time for the 1920 session.

In the same year, under the will of the late Sarah Anne Rhodes, the sum of £10,000 was left to the Council for the education of women. Owing to the absence of one of the Trustees, it has not been found possible so far to utilize any of this sum.

## COLLEGE REGULATIONS.

The College year shall consist of three Terms: the First Term to begin about March 22nd and to end about May 15th; the Second Term to begin about May 31st and to end about August 21st; the Third Term to begin about September 6th and to end about the end of October.

The College examinations to begin about October 15th.

### SUBJECTS OF INSTRUCTION.

The following are the subjects taught in this College:—(1) Latin, (2) Greek, (3) English, (4) French, (5) German, (6) Philosophy, (7) Education, (8) Economics, (9) Constitutional History and Jurisprudence, (10) English History, (11) Pure Mathematics, (12) Applied Mathematics, (13) Physics, (14) Chemistry, (15) Biology, (16) Geology, (17) Geography (B.Com. only), (18) Roman Law, (19) International Law, (20) Conflict of Laws, (21) Law of Contract, (22) Law of Property, Part I., (23) Law of Torts, (24) Criminal Law, (25) Law of Property, Part II., (26) Law of Evidence, (27) Law of Procedure.

### MATRICULATION.

To matriculate a student must pass the Matriculation Examination and make the following declaration:—“I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Statutes of the University, so far as they apply to me, and I hereby declare that I believe myself to have attained the age of sixteen years.”

No examination passed by any student before he has made this declaration can count towards the keeping of terms or the qualifying for a Degree.

The last day for making the Declaration is June 1st.

### TERMS.

Any student who is matriculated to the University, whose name is on the books of an affiliated College, who has attended the prescribed courses in any subject and has passed the Examination prescribed in these courses at a standard corresponding to the University Examination, shall be deemed to have kept terms in that subject.

For keeping Terms in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, or Geology the Practical Examination or performance of a practical course to the satisfaction of the instructor shall be deemed to be a part of the College Examination; and, unless specially exempted by the Science Faculty, a student presenting himself for an Examination in any of these subjects for the purpose of keeping Terms must do the practical work in that subject in the year in which he so presents himself.

The subjects in which the keeping of terms is necessary are:—All subjects for B.A., B.Sc., and LL.B. Degrees, all the subjects of the First and Second Divisions of B.Com., all the subjects of Engineering Entrance.

### ATTENDANCE.

To fulfil the attendance requirement in a subject a student must, except in cases approved of by the Professorial Board, attend not less than 90% of the lectures in that subject.

### EXEMPTION FROM LECTURES.

Exemption from lectures is provided for under certain conditions (see Calendar, N.Z. University, 1919-20, p. 12).

To keep terms in a subject an exempted student must pass in that subject at the annual College Examinations.

### SUPERVISION OF COURSES.

The Professorial Board supervises the courses of all new students. Before enrolment in classes a record of the proposed course of study, signed by the Chairman of the Professorial Board, or by the Chairman of one of

the Faculties (of Arts, Science, or Law), must be in the hands of the Registrar. In the case of a student proceeding to one of the University degrees, this record shall state the complete course of study proposed for that degree; and subsequent departures (if any) from such proposed course will have to be similarly recorded.

#### COLLEGE EXAMINATIONS.

Students, whether exempted or not, must notify to the Registrar on or before the First day of May, the subjects in which they wish to keep terms; an "advanced" subject must be notified as such.

#### ACADEMIC YEARS.

A student may sit for a section of a degree at the end of his first year but may not sit for his final examination until he has completed at least three years work to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.

#### FEES FOR EXEMPTED STUDENTS.

The fee for the Annual Examination of any student exempted from attendance at lectures shall be one guinea for each subject in which he is examined, and if fully exempted a further fee of one guinea.

N.B.—In no case shall a fee be refunded. But if a candidate be prevented by sickness, or other sufficient cause, from taking the examination, the fee shall be credited to him for a future examination: provided that such credit shall not extend for more than two years. If, after payment of a fee, the candidate be removed to another College district, the fee shall be transferred to his credit at that College.

### FEES

COLLEGE FEE—Every student is required to pay a College Fee of ten shillings and sixpence per annum for general tuition.

NOTE.—Enrolment in a class shall be regarded as rendering the student liable for full fees. Attendance at a class will be debarred if fees have not been paid after two weeks' lectures. Except in special cases, of which the Registrar shall be judge, the full year's fees must be paid not later than the second week of the first term.

### LIBRARY REGULATIONS.

1. In the case of disorderly conduct or any breach of the regulations the Librarian may and in serious cases shall report the person so offending to the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Any person so reported, if found guilty of any breach of the Regulations, shall be reprimanded and may be excluded from the use of the Library or dealt with in such other way as the Professorial Board may direct.

#### HOURS.

2. During the Session the Library shall be open to readers from 10 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. on all week days except Saturdays, when it shall be open from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

3. The Library shall be closed on Sundays, on public holidays, and at such other times as the Professorial Board may direct.

4. Regulations will be issued from time to time for the use of the Library during recess.

#### ADMISSION FOR READING PURPOSES.

5. The following persons shall be entitled to use the Library for reading purposes:—

(a) Members of the College Council.

(b) Members of the Teaching Staff.

(c) Students who have paid the College fee for the current year.

(d) Graduates of any University, and persons engaged in Research work, and any other persons; provided that in every case permission shall have been granted by the Library Committee of the Professorial Board.

Note.—Persons using the Library under (c) and (d) shall every session first present to the Librarian a Library card for the current year, to be obtained from the Registrar.

#### CONDUCT OF READERS IN THE LIBRARY.

6. The use of pens and ink in the Library is strictly prohibited except at tables provided for the purpose.

7. No books are to be removed from the Library except as provided in Regulations 10, 11 and 12.

8. Books removed from the shelves by readers must be left on the tables in the reading rooms, except Law reports, which shall be replaced on the shelves.

9. Readers are particularly cautioned against injuring books belonging to the Library by writing in the margin, marking or turning down the leaves, or otherwise disfiguring them.

#### BORROWING BOOKS.

10. Members of the College Council and the Professors and Lecturers of the College may borrow any volumes provided:

(a) That entry of each volume so borrowed be made, dated, and signed, by the borrower, in the Ledger provided for the purpose.

(b) That volumes specified in Regulation 13 be retained by borrowers not longer than one week, and that no volume be retained for more than two months except during the long vacation.

11. Any other member of the Staff may borrow volumes except those volumes specified in Regulation 13, provided:

(a) That entry be made as in Regulation 10.

(b) That not more than 5 volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than one month except during the long vacation.

12. Any other person privileged under Regulation 5 for reading purposes may on **application to the Librarian** borrow books at hours notified on the Library notice-board, provided:

(a) That a deposit of One Guinea be made with the Librarian which shall be returned to the depositor when he ceases to avail himself of the privilege of borrowing books provided he has returned undamaged all books borrowed by him: provided that a Professor's written voucher shall be accepted in lieu of a deposit of One Guinea.

(b) That not more than two volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than 14 days: provided that on the written request of a Professor or of an Independent Lecturer any Honours or Research student or student doing advanced work may take out five volumes at one time, no volume to be retained for more than one month.

13. Save as provided in Regulation 10, encyclopædias, dictionaries, law reports, prose translations of the classics, books containing valuable engravings, works with loose plates or maps, periodicals which have been less than a fortnight in the Library, may not be borrowed from the Library. Provided, always without prejudice to Regulation 10, that text-books prescribed for the current year, and books listed as specially in demand, may be withheld, lent, or recalled by the Librarian. A book so recalled must be returned within 3 days.

14. A Request Book shall be provided in which the names of those wishing to obtain books in circulation, the titles of the books and the date of request may be entered. Any book which has been entered in the request book shall be returned on the demand of the Librarian within three days.

15. The borrower shall be liable for any damage a book may have sustained whilst in his keeping.

16. No book belonging to the Library shall be privately lent by any borrower, except those specified in Regulation 10.

17. All books and publications of every kind shall be returned on or before February 1st in each year, and during the eight days immediately following the Library shall be closed; provided that members of the staff who desire to retain books in their possession during this period may do so on furnishing a list of such books to the Librarian on or before February 1st, and that members of the staff may also borrow books during the same period on application to the Librarian.

NOTE.—Reciprocal arrangements have been made with the Wellington Philosophical Society, whereby Students of the College can visit the library of that Society and consult books and periodicals, on production of a card from the College Librarian.

Current numbers of *Mind*, *Psychological Bulletin and Review*, *International Journal of Ethics* and *Journal of Educational Psychology* should be consulted at the Public Library.

### SIR GEORGE GREY SCHOLARSHIP.

(*Subject to the granting of a vote by Parliament*).

#### REGULATIONS.

1. The Scholarship shall be open to undergraduates whose academic standing does not exceed three years.
  2. The subjects of examination shall be chosen from the following:—  
(a) HEAT, SOUND AND LIGHT; (b) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM; (c) ASTRONOMY; (d) GEOLOGY; (e) PURE MATHEMATICS; (f) MECHANICS AND HYDROSTATICS; (g) CHEMISTRY; (h) BOTANY; (i) ZOOLOGY.
  3. Out of the nine possible subjects at least two must be taken and not more than three; and one at least must be taken from the four subjects (a), (b), (c), (d). In awarding the Scholarship the Professorial Board will prefer special distinction in a single subject to a fair knowledge of the two or three subjects selected.
  4. The Scholarship will be awarded on the result of the College Annual Examination, with a special practical examination in Natural Science, Chemistry, and Physics, and a special paper in Astronomy.
  5. The award of the Scholarship will be announced soon after the College Annual Examination.
  6. The Scholarship will not be tenable with any other Scholarship or Exhibition.
  7. The Scholar must attend such a course of lectures and do such practical work as shall be approved by the Professorial Board.
  8. The Scholar must not during the tenure of his Scholarship undertake any duties that in the opinion of the Professorial Board will prevent him from prosecuting his studies satisfactorily.
  9. The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable for one year.
- NOTE.—Candidates must give in their names to the Registrar not later than the 20th of September.

#### JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

The late Mr. Jacob Joseph bequeathed a sum of £3,000 to Victoria College, in the year 1905, for the foundation of Scholarships. On this foundation two Scholarships of £60, tenable for one year, are open for award annually, under the following regulations:—

1. The Scholarships shall be open to students (either men or women):
  - (i.) Whose year of matriculation is not more than five years prior to the year of the award—except in the case of Law students, for whom the corresponding interval shall be seven years;
  - (ii.) Who have studied at Victoria College for at least two years, and have completed an Honours course thereat to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board;
  - (iii.) Who have been certified by the University of New Zealand to have attained to the standard of Honours.
2. Preference, *ceteris paribus*, shall be shown to students of Law and Experimental Science (including Mental Science, provided that evidence of sufficient Laboratory work be forthcoming).

3. The Scholarships shall be awarded on evidence of capacity to undertake original work.

4. The tenure of the Scholarships shall be subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) A scholar shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.

(ii.) He shall submit to the Professorial Board a thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that thesis, and specifically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a copy of this thesis for the College Library.

5. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first on August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled, but the second instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award. Payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Professorial Board.

6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by March 15th.

7. The holding of another scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.

8. In the event of no scholarship or only one scholarship being awarded in any year, additional scholarships may be awarded in any subsequent year.

**JUNIOR CLASS.**

N.B.—This Class is discontinued.

**PASS CLASS.**

*A one-year's course.*

Hours of meeting:—Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, 5 to 6, and Tuesday, 7 to 8 (tutorial).

Text-books recommended: For the Period of Literature: Herford's Age of Wordsworth, Skeat's Primer of English Etymology, and Lounsbury's History of the English Language.

N.B.—Students who are unable to overtake the work as a one-year's course must attend the class a second year.

**ADVANCED CLASS.**

This Class is intended for candidates for "Advanced" English and Senior Scholarships in English. The work of this class will in future extend over two years. Hours of meeting:—Tuesdays and Thursdays 6 to 7, and Wednesdays 7 to 8.

Text-books recommended as for the Pass Class and in addition Wyld's Historical Study of the Mother Tongue.

**HONOURS CLASS.**

Hours of meeting of this Class will be arranged to meet the convenience of students.

**PRESCRIPTIONS:**

FOR THE ENGLISH SECTION OF B.A., LL.B., PASS GRADE.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE (Two papers)—

- (a) (1) The history and structure of the English language; a knowledge of the elements of Anglo-Saxon, such as might be acquired by the use of Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, translation and explanation of easy sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose, and passages of early standard English, to test the candidate's knowledge of the history of forms and inflections; (the sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose to be taken from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, and the passages of Early English to be taken from the following sections of Morris and Skeat's Specimens of Early English: Part II., 1 to 18 inclusive (except 2, 14 and 17). (2) Selected portions of the works of one or more authors.
- (b) (1) A short essay on some subject arising out of the works selected under (a). (2) An account of some period of literature and its connection with the general history of the period.

NOTE.—Great importance is attached to composition.

1920. Wordsworth—Edited by Matthew Arnold ("Golden Treasury Series"); Shelley—Adonais; Lamb—Essays of Elia (First Series); Thackeray—Esmond.

Period: 1798 to 1840.



NOTE.—Special attention must be paid to Wordsworth, Coleridge, Byron, Keats, Shelley, Scott, Lamb, Macaulay, and Carlyle; but the other authors in the period are not to be neglected. The literary movements and their representatives, as well as the influence of the ancient classics and of the leading Continental literatures on the English literature of the period, must also be examined.

FOR ADVANCED GRADE AND SCHOLARSHIP.

*New prescription for a two-years' course.*

#### First Year.

- (a) Candidates shall be required to pass examinations to the satisfaction of their professors in the literary period immediately succeeding the one in which they passed at the Pass grade, and in the selected books prescribed for the year.
- (b) They shall also be required to pass examinations on the following prose specimens in Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Reader:—II., III., IV., V., VIII., IX., X., XIV.; and on the prose and verse specimens in Morris's Early English, Part I., I. to IX. inclusive.

#### Second Year.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE (Two papers)—

- (a) Questions on the history, structure, philology, and etymology of the English language, the standard to be intermediate between the pass and the honours standard.

The elements of Anglo-Saxon grammar as given in Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, pp. 1-53.

Translation and explanation of passages of Anglo-Saxon prose from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Reader (seventh or later edition), specimens I. to XVIII. inclusive, except XI., XII., and XVI.; and of passages of Anglo-Saxon poetry from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Reader, specimens XXI. to XXVI. inclusive.

Translation and explanation of passages in verse and prose from Morris's Specimens of Early English, Part I. (1150-1300), specimens X. to XIX. inclusive.

Easy unprescribed passages of Anglo-Saxon prose and Early English verse and prose.

The following poems to be studied in alternate years (To prevent mistake the year in each case will be printed in the New Zealand University Calendar):—

- (1) Langland's Piers the Plowman (Skeat's Edition, C.P.).
- (2) Chaucer's Man of Law's Tale; Words of Host to Physician and Pardoner; Pardoner's Prologue; Prologue of Second Nun's Tale; Poem to same; Second Nun's Tale; Prologue of Canon Yeoman's Tale; Canon Yeoman's Tale; Manciple's Prologue; Parson's Prologue. (Skeat's Edition published in one volume: C.P.).

- (b) Such a knowledge of English literature of the period set for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as a candidate should have from reading the principal works of the leading authors of the period. A few questions on the selected books prescribed for the Bachelor of Arts examination.

A short essay on some subject arising out of the works selected for the Bachelor of Arts examination. At least three subjects shall be proposed for the essay, and each candidate shall choose one of them.

NOTE.—Great importance is attached to composition.

*Old prescription for a one-year's course.*

## ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE (Two papers)—

## FOR HONOURS.

## C. ENGLISH (Three papers):—

- (a) The history and structure of the English language; questions on its philology and etymology; translation and explanation of passages in verse and prose from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Reader (7th edition), excluding pages 175 to 201; passages from Morris's Specimens of Early English, Part I. (1150 to 1300); and unprescribed passages of Anglo-Saxon and Early English.
- (b) (1) The history of some one period of English literature. The paper will include such questions on the matter, style and spirit of the greatest works of the period as will test the independent reading of the candidate. (2) A detailed knowledge of the language, material sources and characteristics of selected works of one or more authors.

NOTE.—Part 2 of Paper (b) shall not occupy more than one-third of the whole paper.

Period: As for B.A. Pass. Special attention must be paid to the authors indicated for the B.A. Pass.

Set Books: As for the B.A. Pass, and in addition:

1920. Keats—Odes, Hyperion; De Quincey—English Opium-Eater.

- (c) Essay on some subject arising out of the works selected under (b2). Three subjects will be proposed for the essay, and each candidate will choose one. A thesis can be substituted for the essay.

NOTE.—Great importance is attached to composition.

**LATIN***Professor Rankine Brown.*

ADVANCED AND HONOURS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m., and Saturdays 9 a.m. The work in the class is conditioned by the books set for the University Examinations, but is not confined to these. The books set for Advanced Latin are read on Mondays and Fridays, and students taking Latin as an advanced subject must attend at these hours.

The special books for Honours are read on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Courses of Lectures are given on Syntax, Literature and History; and weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation.

Set Books: Advanced: Tacitus, Annals I.; Virgil Georgic II. Honours: Tacitus Annals I., II., Cicero de Officiis, I., II.; Virgil, Georgics, II., IV.; Horace, Satires I., Lucretius I. Special History Period for Honours; 31 B.C. to 79 A.D. For Sight Translation, 'Book of Latin Verse' (Garod) will be used.

PASS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 6 to 7 p.m., Wednesdays, 7 to 8 p.m., and Mondays, 7 to 8 p.m. (Tutorial). Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation, and lectures are delivered at intervals. For convenience of teaching, this class will be divided into two graded sections.

Set Books—Cicero pro Murena; Virgil, Georgic IV. The following books will also be used:—Dies Romani (Arnold); Lower Latin Unseen; Ramsay, Latin Prose, Vol. I.

In addition to the books specially prescribed for the different Classes, the following are recommended for reference. All students ought to provide themselves with at least the first *three*:—

Gildersleeve and Lodge, Latin Grammar; Meissner's Latin Phrase Book; Mackail's History of Latin Literature; Pelham's Outlines of Roman History; Student's Companion to Latin Authors (Middleton and Mills); Companion to School Classics (Gow); Smith's Classical Dictionary; Lewis and Short's Latin Dictionary; Lewis Elementary Latin Dictionary.

**GREEK***Professor Rankine Brown.*

ADVANCED CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Honours or Advanced Greek. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

SENIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The work of this Class is arranged to suit students who are reading for the B.A. Examination. It will meet at least three hours per week at such times as may best suit students, provided that they can come before 5 p.m. For Greek Prose, Arnold (3/6) and Sidgwick (5/-) will be used. Goodwin's Greek Grammar (6/-) is recommended. For Sight Translation, Florilegium Tronis Graecum (Burrows and Walters) will be used.

Set Books for 1920. Honours: Plato, Republic I-II. to p. 367; Iliad VI.; Herodotus I.; Aeschylus, Agamemnon; Demosthenes de Corona; Aristophanes, Clouds. Advanced: Plato, Republic I-II. to p. 367; Homer, Iliad VI. Pass: Plato, Apology and Crito; Euripides, Hecuba.

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This Class is intended for students who have just begun or are beginning Greek. It will meet probably three hours per week before 5 p.m., at an hour to suit students. The following books will be used:—Smith's *Initia Graeca*, part I. (3/6); Arnold's Greek Prose (3/6); Greek War of Independence (Sonnenschein).

The following books are recommended for reference:—

Murray's History of Greek Literature; Oman's History of Greece; Bury's History of Greece; Greenidge's Greek Constitutional History; Liddell and Scott's Greek Lexicon. Liddell and Scott's Greek Abridged.

### FRENCH

#### 1. PASS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5 to 6 p.m., and on Fridays from 7 to 8 p.m. The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. Examination 1920. Lectures will be delivered on French Literature from 1789-1845. Text-books:—Kastner & Atkins, Short History of French Literature; Renault, Grammaire Française; Fasnacht, Select Specimens of Great French Authors. The dictionary recommended is Passy & Hempl's International French Dictionary. Pub. by A. & T. Jack.

#### 2. ADVANCED CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The work in this class will be in part the same as that of the Honours Class, but special lectures will be delivered forming the first half of a two years' Honours course. The class will meet from 4 to 5 p.m. on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays. If necessary, the period from 4 to 5 p.m. on Mondays may be transferred to 10 to 11 a.m. on Saturdays. Students in this class should attend the lectures on French literature (1789-1845) delivered in the Pass Class. Text-books:—Lanson, Histoire de la Littérature Française; Faguet, Dix-Neuvième Siècle. The dictionaries recommended for Advanced and Honours Students are Petit Larousse Illustré or Littré & Beaujean (Hachette).

#### 3. HONOURS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This class will probably meet from 4 to 5 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays. The best French Historical Grammar is that of Nyrop, 4 volumes (40/-). Darmsteter's Historical French Grammar (Macmillan) (12/6) is recommended as a text-book.

#### 4. COMMERCIAL CLASS.

Fee £2 2s.

This class will meet from 5 to 6 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays. An additional hour will be arranged for, if necessary.

#### 5. ORAL CLASS.

In connection with the requirements of the University, an oral examination in French will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. This class will meet on Mondays from 7 to 8 p.m. Text-book: Kron's French Daily Life (Dent).

**GERMAN**

Fee £3 3s.

Advanced and Honours classes will be formed as required, at hours to suit the requirements of students. There will also be an elementary class if required.

## PASS CLASS.

This class will meet on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 6 to 7 p.m. and on Thursdays from 7 to 8 p.m. (tutorial). Lectures will be given on Literature and on the books prescribed for the B.A. examination 1920. Recommended: Eve—German Grammar; Francke—History of German Literature.

**MENTAL AND MORAL PHILOSOPHY.***Professor Hunter.*

N.B.—Students who desire to proceed to the Honours Course in Philosophy are advised to take the subject in their first year and to consult the Professor before arranging their courses.

## PRELIMINARY CLASS.

## PSYCHOLOGY AND EITHER LOGIC OR ETHICS.

Fee £3 3s.

This is an introductory course for those who do not desire to sit for the Degree Examination in this subject after only one year's study of it. Lectures: Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6 p.m.

Tutorial: Thursday at 7 p.m.

Psychology will be taken during the first half of the session and Logic or Ethics (as the student selects) during the second half.

Text-Books: Titchener—A Beginner's Psychology; Seashore—Elementary Experiments in Psychology; Welton—Groundwork of Logic; Johnston—An Introduction to Ethics.

## PASS CLASS.

## PSYCHOLOGY AND EITHER LOGIC OR ETHICS.

Fee £3 3s.

This course covers, but is not confined to, the work prescribed for B.A. (Pass), B.Sc. (Pass, old statute) and LL.B.

Lectures—Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6 p.m.

Tutorial—Thursday 7 p.m.

Psychology will be taken during the first half of the session and Logic or Ethics (as the student selects) during the second half.

Text-Books: Breese—Psychology; Welton—Groundwork of Logic or Welton and Monahan—Intermediate Logic; Thilly—Introduction to Ethics.

## ADVANCED CLASS.

## LOGIC, PSYCHOLOGY, ETHICS AND THE HISTORY OF ETHICS.

Fee £3 3s.

The arrangement of work in this class is designed to meet the requirements of students who are taking Philosophy at the Advanced Stage for the B.A. Degree or for Senior Scholarship (either as a one-year or as a two-year course).

Lectures in the different branches will be delivered as follows:

(i.) Logic: Monday at 5 p.m.

Text-Book: Welton—Manual of Logic, Vol. 2.

Set-Book: Jevons—Principles of Science, Books IV. and V.

(ii.) Psychology: Wednesday at 5 p.m.

Text-Book: Stout—Manual of Psychology.

Set-Book: Berkeley—New Theory of Vision.

- (iii.) Ethics: Friday at 5 p.m.  
Text-Book: Dewey and Tufts—Ethics.
- (iv.) History of Ethics: Thursday at 5 p.m.  
Text-Book: Rogers—Short History of Ethics.  
Period—Modern.  
Set-Books: Hume—Principles of Morals, Butler—Three Sermons on Human Nature and Dissertation on Virtue.

## HONOURS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

The main work of this class will be the study of the History of Philosophy and a consideration of the metaphysical problems raised in Logic, Psychology and Ethics.

Lectures: Tuesday at 5 p.m. and at other hours to be arranged at the beginning of the session.

Text-Books: Venn—Empirical Logic; Stout—Analytic Psychology or James—Principles of Psychology or Ward—Psychological Principles; Paulsen—System of Ethics; Rogers—History of Philosophy or Falckenberg—History of Modern Philosophy.

## PSYCHOLOGY LABORATORY.

N.B.—In all courses hours will be fixed at beginning of the session and every effort made to suit the convenience of students.

The University has prescribed alternative questions in Psychology for students who qualify in Laboratory work. The courses are arranged as follows:—

(i.) PRELIMINARY—A course of elementary experiments in the qualitative problems of sensation, perception, mental imagery, association, memory, action, attention, feeling.

Text-Book: Seashore—Elementary Experiments in Psychology.

(ii.) PASS—A course of more advanced experiments in the subjects specified under (i.)

Text-Book: Myers—Experimental Psychology, Vol. 2.

To obtain the practical certificate at the Pass Stage students must qualify in courses (i.) and (ii.)

(iii.) ADVANCED: A course of experiments in advanced work in the subjects of the Pass course; in simple quantitative methods, in examination of individuals in acuity of the senses, colour vision, tone discrimination, and in general intelligence and mental tests.

(iv.) HONOURS: Experiments in more advanced work of course (iii.). Students desiring to undertake research work for Honours thesis will be given every facility for doing so.

Economics, descriptive and analytic, with special reference to New Zealand conditions, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the Commercial Accountants' Examination, the B.A. and B.Com. degrees, the diploma in Journalism, and those reading Economics for general information, three lectures per week on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5 to 6 p.m., and Fridays, 7 to 8 p.m. Tutorial Class on Wednesdays, 7 to 8 p.m.

Text-Books:—Ely and Wicker: *Elementary Principles of Economics*. Clay: *Economics for the General Reader*. Barker: *Cash and Credit*.

Students intending to read for Honours in Economics should join this class in their first year.

#### SENIOR DIVISION.

The fee for a full course in the senior division (Advanced or Honours) is £3 3s., for any one of the courses B to F, taken separately, £1 11s. 6d.

**Course A: Economics.**—Descriptive and analytic, a more advanced treatment, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements for the Advanced grade and for papers (a) and (b) in Honours. Two lectures per week, on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, 6 to 7 p.m.

Text-Book:—Taussig: *Principles of Economics*, 2 vols.

**Course B: Money and Banking.**—A general treatment, covering but not necessarily confined to, the requirements for B.A. Advanced grade, B.Com., Diploma in Journalism, and paper (c) i. in Honours. One lecture per week, on Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m. Reading will be prescribed as required.

**Course C: Public Finance.**—The principles of public finance and taxation, as illustrated in the British and New Zealand financial systems, war finance, local finance; covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of paper (c) ii. in Honours. One lecture per week, at an hour to be arranged.

Text-Book.—Bastable: *Public Finance*.

**Course D: Economic Methodology and Statistics.**—A general treatment of the scope and method of Economics and of statistical methods treated so as not to require a knowledge of mathematics higher than matriculation standard, and covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of paper (d) in Honours and of Statistical Method for B.Com. and Diploma in Journalism. One lecture per week at an hour to be arranged.

Text-Books:—New Zealand Official Yearbook, latest volume. Bowley: Elements of Statistics and Elementary Manual of Statistics. Keynes: Scope and Method of Political Economy (Honours students only). King: Elements of Statistical Method (B.Com. students only).

**Course E: The Economic History of England.**—Covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements for B.A. Advanced grade, paper (e) in Honours, B.Com. and Diploma in Journalism. One lecture per week, at an hour to be arranged.

Text-Book:—Meredith's Economic History of England.

**Course F: The Industrial Law of New Zealand.**—A treatment of the economic and legal aspects of the labour protective code of New Zealand, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the paper on Industrial Law for the B.Com. degree.

Advanced students will attend courses A and B. and the first term of Course E. Honours students will attend Courses A, B or C, D and E. Hours of lectures are liable to alteration to suit the convenience of students.

Special classes for detailed study of particular authors or topics, or for investigation into New Zealand economic conditions, will be formed when required.

In general, students will not be admitted to classes in the senior division until they satisfy the Lecturer that they possess a sufficient preliminary knowledge of elementary Economics.

PASS CLASS.

Fee £3 3s.

This class, which covers the work for the B.A. Degree, meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays, from 7 to 8 p.m., and Fridays 6 to 7 p.m. (tutorial).

The course will deal with the development of the Great powers in the Nineteenth Century, and with the Outlines of English History from 1272 to 1509.

#### ADVANCED CLASS.

The practical work is divided into two courses in the same manner as the Pass Lectures. Each student is expected to complete the course of experiments set.

Those students wishing to complete their study in one year will attend two of the above periods per week and those taking two years over their study will attend at least one period per week in each year.

All students will be required to keep neat and concise, but adequate, notes of their experimental work; these will be marked at the completion of each experiment.

### 2.—ADVANCED CLASSES.

Students of these classes are recommended to do at least six hours practical work per week.

The Chemical Laboratory is well equipped for all ordinary chemical operations. Students intending to take up Chemistry as a profession should work in the laboratory not less than eighteen hours weekly and study Mathematics, Physics, French and German.

A minimum attendance of 5 hours weekly is required from candidates for a Pass Degree in Chemistry.

## BOTANY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. The Professor will advise students as to which text-books they should by no means be without. Every student should come to lecture with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary study has not removed. It is part of the duty of the Professor to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

General Text Books:—Parker's Lessons in Elementary Biology; Marshall's Frog; Romanes, Darwin and after Darwin, (Longmans); Dendy's Evolutionary Biology, (Constable and Co.); Hewitt, House-flies and how they spread disease, Camb. University Press.

Section A.—The lectures in this subject are for those students who begin their University course without any knowledge of Botany, and who do not intend to take the subject at the Pass stage after one year's study only.

Lectures, Monday, 4 p.m.; Tuesday, 4 p.m.; Thursday, 4 p.m. Tutorial class, Thursday, 7 p.m.

Section B.—Lectures, Monday, 5 p.m.; Tuesday, 4 p.m.; Friday, 6 p.m.

In "Advanced" Botany the lectures will be for those students who have already attended the Pass course.

Section B.—Lectures, Monday, 5 p.m.; Friday, 6 p.m., and one other hour to be arranged.

Five hours a week should be spent at practical work.

## THE VICTORIA COLLEGE ACT, 1905.

[As amended by the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907, the Queen's Scholarships Act, 1906, and the Victoria College Act Amendment Act, 1914.]

An Act to consolidate certain Enactments of the General Assembly relating to Victoria College.

[27th October, 1905.]

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The short Title of this Act is "The Victoria College Act, 1905."

### THE COLLEGE.

2. There is hereby established in the City of Wellington a college connected with the New Zealand University, to be called "the Victoria College."

### THE CORPORATION.

3. The Council of the College, its professors and lecturers, and the graduates and undergraduates of the New Zealand University, whose names are on the books, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate under the style of "the Victoria University College," by which style that corporation shall have perpetual succession and a common seal.

### THE COUNCIL.

4. The corporation shall act by a governing body, to be called "the Victoria University College Council" (elsewhere throughout this Act referred to as "the Council.")

5. The Council shall be constituted as follows:—

- (a.) A group of two members appointed by the Governor:
- (b.) A group of two members appointed by the Professorial Board of the College:
- (c.) A group of four members elected by the District Court of Convocation of the Victoria University District as defined by the New Zealand University Act, 1908:
- (d.) One member appointed by the Wellington City Council:

- (e.) A group of two members elected by the members of the Education Boards of education districts wholly or partly within the Victoria University District:
- (f.) One member elected by the governing bodies of the secondary schools as defined by section eighty-nine of the Education Act, 1908, in the Victoria University District:
- (g.) A group of two members elected by the teachers in public schools in the Victoria University District holding certificates of competency under section fifty-four of the Education Act, 1908:
- (h.) One member elected by those teachers in secondary schools and in day technical schools, as defined respectively by section eighty-nine of the Education Act, 1908, and by section sixteen of the Education Amendment Act, 1910, in the Victoria University District who are graduates of any British chartered University, or are holders of certificates of competency under section fifty-four of the Education Act, 1908.

6. (1.) Members appointed pursuant to paragraphs (b) and (d) of section five hereof shall be appointed by resolution passed at a meeting of the Board or Council making the appointment.

(2.) Members elected pursuant to paragraphs (c), (e), (f), (g), and (h) of the same section shall be elected in manner hereinafter appearing.

(3.) The first appointments and elections of members pursuant to the said section five shall be made within the first seven days of the month of June, nineteen hundred and fifteen, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, and the members so appointed or elected shall come into office on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen:

Provided that no appointment or election shall be made under the provisions of paragraphs (a), (e), or (g) of the said section, save for the purpose of filling casual vacancies, until the month of June, nineteen hundred and seventeen.

7. (1.) For the purpose of election of members pursuant to paragraphs (c), (e), (g), and (h) of section five hereof the following provisions shall apply:—

- (a.) The Registrar of Victoria University College, or such other person as the Council appoints, shall be the Returning Officer who shall conduct all elections of those members.



(b.) The Returning Officer shall prepare separate rolls of the persons who are entitled to vote for a member or members pursuant to the said paragraphs (c), (e), (g), and (h), and shall enter in the respective rolls the name, occupation, and address of every person who possesses the necessary qualification entitling him to vote; provided that no person shall be entered on more rolls than one.

(c.) Any person who possesses more qualifications than one shall be entitled to have his name transferred from one roll to another roll on which he is qualified to be enrolled at any time before the closing of the rolls as hereinafter mentioned:

Provided that a person who has had his name so transferred from one roll to another roll shall not be entitled to have his name transferred from the last-mentioned roll until after two years have elapsed since the date of the transfer to that roll, unless he has ceased to be qualified to have his name thereon.

(d.) All rolls shall be closed at five o'clock in the afternoon of the fourteenth day immediately preceding the day on which an election is to be held and shall continue to be closed until the election is completed; and no name shall be entered on any roll while that roll is closed.

(e.) Claims for enrolment shall be made and disposed of in accordance with regulations made by the Council.

(f.) At every election the votes shall be given by sealed voting-papers, in the form prescribed by regulations made by the Council, delivered to the Returning Officer personally on or before the day fixed for the election, or forwarded to him by post or otherwise so as to reach him not later than that day.

(2.) For the purpose of the election of a member pursuant to paragraph (f) of section five hereof the following provisions shall apply:—

(a.) The governing body of each secondary school shall be entitled to one vote for every hundred or part of a hundred pupils (exclusive of the pupils in any lower department) in average attendance for the year ending on the thirty-first day of December immediately preceding the election.

(b.) The votes of each such governing body shall be by resolution passed at a meeting of that governing body.

(3.) In any election to which this section refers the majority of votes shall decide the election, provided that if two candidates have an equal number of votes the Registrar shall (if necessary) determine the election by lot in the presence of the Chairman or other member of the Council.

8. (1.) No member of the Professorial Board shall be a member of the Council unless he is appointed a member of that Board pursuant to paragraph (b) of section five hereof.

(2.) A member of the Professorial Board so elected shall not be entitled to vote on any question before the Council affecting himself or directly affecting the salary of any member of the teaching staff of the College, or directly affecting any payment made by or due from the Council to any member of the teaching staff.

9. Subject to the provisions of the next succeeding section, the term of office of all members appointed or elected as provided by paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e), and (g), of section five hereof shall be four years, and of all other members shall be two years; but all members shall continue to hold office until the appointment or election of their successors.

10. On the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen, of the members appointed under the provisions of the principal Act by the Governor in Council, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members so appointed shall be deemed to have been appointed by the Governor under this Act; in like manner, of the members elected under the principal Act by the graduates of the New Zealand University on the books of the College, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (c) of section five of this Act; in like manner, of the members elected under paragraph (d) of sub-section one of section five of the principal Act, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (g) of section five of this Act; and, in like manner, of the members elected under the provisions of the principal Act by Education Boards, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (e) of section five of this Act; and the member elected by the Professorial Board shall retire.

11. (1.) Except as provided in the last preceding section, the members of the Council who are in office on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen, shall continue to hold office, subject as hereinafter in this section mentioned.

(2.) On the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and on the same day in each second year thereafter, one-half of the members mentioned in paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e) and (g) of section five hereof and the members mentioned in paragraphs (d), (f), and (h), of the said section shall retire from office.

(3.) The members to retire from each of the groups mentioned in paragraphs (a), (c), (e), and (g) of section five hereof on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall be those who have been longest in office.

(4.) The member to retire from the group mentioned in paragraph (b) of the said section five on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall, on or before the first day of May in that year, be decided by lot amongst the members of that group.

(5.) Of the members elected under paragraph (b) of section five of the principal Act, the one who has been longest in office shall retire on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen; and the remaining members shall retire on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen; and in no case shall any election be made hereafter of members under the said paragraph.

12. (1.) If any member of the Council—

(a.) Dies, or by writing addressed to the Council resigns his seat; or

(b.) Becomes a bankrupt; or

(c.) For a period of three consecutive months fails to attend any meeting of the Council without obtaining leave of absence; or

(d.) Is absent from New Zealand for a period of six consecutive months without obtaining leave of absence,—

he shall cease to be a member, and the vacancy thereby created shall be deemed a casual vacancy.

(2.) The member filling a casual vacancy shall hold office only for the residue of the term of the vacating member.

13. (1.) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by appointment by the Governor it shall be the duty of the Council to forthwith report the fact to the Minister of Education.

(2.) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by appointment by the Professorial Board, or by the Education Board, or by the Wellington City Council, it shall be the duty of the Council forthwith to report the fact to the Board or Council which appointed the vacating member.

(3.) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by election it shall be the duty of the Council to do all things necessary for the proper conduct of that election.

(4.) Each vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, shall be filled by the same authority as that which appointed or elected the vacating member.

13a. [*Section 12 of the Act of 1914.*] (1.) The appointment or election of a member to fill a vacancy caused by the expiry of the term of office of a vacating member shall be made within the first seven days of the month of June next preceding such expiry, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, but shall not take effect until such expiry.

(2.) The appointment or election of a member to fill a casual vacancy shall be made not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs.

(3.) Every retiring member shall be eligible for re-appointment or re-election.

(4.) If any vacancy is not filled within sixty days after the same occurs, the Governor shall forthwith fill the vacancy by appointing some fit person as a member in place of the vacating member.

14. The Council shall meet at least once a month at such time and place as the Council determines.

15. The meeting held in the month of May in each year shall be the annual meeting, and at that meeting the Council shall elect one of its members to be Chairman.

16. The Chairman shall hold office for one year and shall be eligible for re-election.

17. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Chairman or any two members, five days' previous notice of the place and time for such meeting being posted or telegraphed to all the members.

18. At all meetings of the Council—

(a.) The quorum shall be six;

(b.) All questions shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting;

- (c.) The Chairman shall preside and have a deliberate vote, and, in the event of equality of voting, a casting vote;
- (d.) In the absence of the Chairman from any meeting the members present shall elect one of their number to act as chairman at that meeting, and while so acting he shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

19. Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Council may from time to time make by-laws for the purpose of regulating its own procedure, the conduct of all elections under this Act, and the general administration of the affairs of the College:

Provided that such by-laws shall not come into operation until and unless they have been approved by the Governor-in-Council.

20. The Council may continue to act notwithstanding any vacancy in its body.

21. The Council shall cause exact minutes of all its proceedings to be kept and also full and accurate accounts of all its receipts, disbursements, liabilities and engagements.

22. The seal of the Council shall be in the custody of the Chairman, and shall not be affixed to any document except pursuant to a resolution of the Council.

23. (1.) The Council shall have full power to appoint and remove all professors, lecturers, examiners, officers, and servants of the College, and to generally manage the affairs thereof:

(2.) All persons appointed by the Council and holding office on the commencement of this Act shall be deemed to have been appointed under this Act.

#### THE PROFESSORIAL BOARD.

24. There shall be a Professorial Board of the College, consisting of all the professors of the College for the time being, and of such lecturers of the College for the time being as the Council may from time to time declare to be members of the Board.

†25. The Board shall have power to make rules as to the time and place of its meetings and the procedure thereat:

Provided that all such rules shall, before coming into operation, be submitted to and approved by the Council.

26. At its annual meeting the Board shall elect one of its members, being a professor, to be Chairman, and if it fails so to do the Council may appoint a professor to be Chairman for the year.

27. The Chairman shall hold office for one year, and be eligible for re-election.

28. At all meetings of the Board—

(a.) A quorum shall be such number as the Board with the consent of the Council from time to time determines.

(b.) The Chairman shall preside, and shall cause exact minutes of the proceedings to be kept.

(c.) He shall have a deliberative vote, and, in the case of equality of voting, a casting-vote:

(d.) In his absence from any meeting the members present shall elect another professor to act as chairman of that meeting, and while so acting he shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

29. Subject in each instance to the approval of the Council, and to such modifications as the Council thinks fit to make therein, the Board may—

(a.) Fix the course of study, and the days and hours of lectures:

(b.) Make rules as to the attendance of the students.

(c.) Prescribe the subjects for examinations for scholarships, exhibitions, prizes, and other college distinctions and awards.

30. Subject to the right of appeal to the Council (whose decision shall be final) by any person who feels aggrieved, the Board may—

(a.) Deal with all questions relating to the discipline of the students:

(b.) Manage the College library:

(c.) Give instructions to the College servants as to the performance of their duties.

31. The Board shall be subject to the control of the Council, and shall furnish to it such reports and information as from time to time the Council requests or the Board deems necessary.

32. The Board may from time to time offer such suggestions for the consideration of the Council as the Board thinks advisable in the interests of the College.

#### LECTURE FEES.

33. There shall be payable by the students such reasonable fees for general tuition and for attendance on lectures as from time to time the Council prescribes and the Governor-in-Council approves.

34. For the purpose of procuring such approval, the Council shall forward each table of fees to the Minister

of Education for submission to the Governor-in-Council; and the fees shall not be chargeable until such approval is signified.

(Clauses 35 and 36 repealed by the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907.)

#### APPROPRIATION AND ENDOWMENT.

37. For the purpose of providing a fund for the maintenance of the College, and the payment of all expenses incurred by the Council in administering the affairs thereof, the Colonial Treasurer, without further appropriation than this Act, shall, out of the Consolidated Fund, pay to the Council each year ending the thirty-first day of March the sum of four thousand pounds, in such instalments during the year as he thinks fit.\*

38. The parcel of land described in the First Schedule hereto is hereby set apart as an endowment for the College, but shall remain vested in His Majesty.

39. The said parcel of land shall be held and administered as Crown lands under such of the leasing provisions of "The Land Act, 1892," as the Minister of Lands from time to time thinks fit; and the net rents and other proceeds derived therefrom and remaining after payment thereof of all necessary expenses attendant on the management and administration of the said land (including the expenses of survey and roading) shall, without further authority or appropriation than this Act, be paid over from time to time to the Council for the purposes of the College.

40. The parcel of land described in the Second Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be vested in the Council in trust as a site for University College buildings and as grounds appertaining thereto:

Provided that the said land shall be inalienable by sale, mortgage, lease, or otherwise.

41. The Council may grant leases of any land (other than the land described in the First and Second Schedules hereto) to which the corporation of the College at any time becomes entitled by way of purchase, grant, or otherwise, but may not without the previous consent of the Governor-in-Council sell or mortgage the same.

#### ACCOUNTS AND AUDIT.

42. The Audit Office shall be the auditor of the Council, and shall have the same duties and powers in respect of the moneys and accounts of the Council, and of persons

dealing therewith, as if the Council were a local authority within the meaning of section six of "The Public Revenues Act, 1892."

43. Within ten days after the close of each financial year ending the thirty-first day of March, the Council shall cause to be prepared and submitted to the Audit Office a statement of accounts showing—

- (a.) The total receipts and disbursements for the year; and
- (b.) Such other particulars as the Governor-in-Council from time to time prescribes by regulations under this Act.

44. Such statement shall be audited by the Audit Office within ten days after receipt thereof, and shall, together with the certificate of the Audit Office and a general report as to the progress of the College, be forwarded by the Council to the Minister of Education within thirty days after the close of such year, to be by him laid before Parliament if sitting, or, if not, then within ten days after the commencement of the next session thereof.

#### GENERAL.

45. The Minister of Education shall be the Visitor of the College, and shall have all the powers and functions usually possessed by Visitors.

46. The Governor may from time to time, by Order-in-Council gazetted, make such regulations as he deems necessary in order to give full effect to the provisions of this Act relating to Queen's Scholarships.

47. The enactments mentioned in the Third Schedule hereto are hereby repealed.

### SCHEDULES.

#### FIRST SCHEDULE.

All that piece or parcel of land situated in Blocks I. and V., Nukumarū Survey District, in the Wellington Provincial District, containing by admeasurement 4,000 acres, more or less: bounded towards the north by Blocks XIII., Momohaki Survey District, 14,500 links; towards the east by other part of Block I., Nukumarū Survey District, and by the Waitotara River, 38,600 links; towards the south-east by a Native reserve, 11,910 links; towards the south-west by a line, 3,500 links; and towards the west by Sections Nos. 13 and 11 in Block IX., and by Block IV., Wairoa Survey District, 33,073 links; be all the aforesaid linkages more or less: excepting therefrom the several roads which are included within the said area: as the same is delineated upon the plan deposited in the District Survey Office, Wellington.



## SECOND SCHEDULE.

All that parcel of land in the City of Wellington, containing by admeasurement 5 acres 3 roods, more or less, being part of the Town Belt: bounded towards the east generally by Salamanca Road from Kelburne Parade to the northernmost corner of Hospital Reserve; thence by the said Hospital Reserve to a public road, 50 links wide, forming the northern boundary of the Roman Catholic Cemetery; thence by the said public road, 75 links; thence by a right line bearing south  $22^{\circ} 59'$  west, 460 links; thence towards the south generally by a right line bearing south  $81^{\circ} 40'$  west, 440 links, thence by a right line to the eastern side of Kelburne Parade; and thence towards the west by the said Kelburne Parade to Salamanca Road aforesaid.
