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
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

In 1926, by the late W. Weir, Estate valued at between £60,000 and £70,000 for purchase of site for College Hostel and for erection and maintenance thereof, and for such other purposes as the Council shall decide.

Books for the Library have been given by the late Sir James Hector, K.C.M.G., the late Sir Theo. Cooper, the late Mr. H. W. Eve, the late Mr. G. A. Hogben, the late Mr. A. P. Buller, Messrs. J. W. Joynt, R. T. Turnbull and T. W. Kirk, the late Mr. J. R. Blair, Miss Izard, Dr. Arnold Izard, Sir R. Stout, Miss Pumphrey, the Hon. F. M. B. Fisher, Mr. A. de B. Brandon, Mr. D. Coghill, Mr. A. R. Atkinson, the late Mr. W. S. Reid, Professor Hunter, Professor Garrow, Professor Sommerville, Professor Cotton, Mr. P. Levi, Sir Frederick Chapman and Mr. W. F. Hogg.

HISTORICAL NOTICE.

On the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and higher education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things, recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature to make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington.

For the maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and that the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate income to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; that, if this were not practicable, the deficit in each case should be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand"; and provision was

made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment. Certain members of the Council were appointed, but nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897, the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon, P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act; an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the 22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six scholarships each year, called "Queen's Scholarship," to persons of either sex under the age of 14 years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. In 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. By the Education Act Amendment Act. 1907, the Queen's Scholarships were abolished. The Act of 1897 further set apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumaru Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appointment of four Professors for the Chairs of Classics, English Language and Literature, Chemistry and Physics, and Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and the following were appointed:—Classics, J. R. Brown, M.A., St. Andrews and Oxford; English

Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A., St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A., Cambridge, Ph.D., Würzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D., Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun.

The Staff has since been increased by the foundation of Chairs in Modern Languages, Biology, Roman Law, etc., English and New Zealand Law, Mental and Moral Philosophy, Physics, Education, Economics, History, Geology and Agriculture.

The College was admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

SITE AND BUILDINGS.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, six acres in extent, and the Government provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings was erected, the foundation stone being laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904. They were opened by His Excellency Lord Plunket on the 30th March, 1906.

In March, 1910, a further portion of the buildings was completed, forming a wing at the rear of the Arts Building. This wing contains two large class-rooms, and in the basement a men's cloak room, and common rooms for students.

In 1919, the Government made the College a grant for the north wing. This wing provides accommodation for the Library and the new School of Economics, and a new Women's Common Room and a new Tea Room.

The library contains a handsome stained glass window erected in memory of the students who fell in the War, 1914-1918.

In 1921 the Government made a further grant for the erection of the South Wing. This wing provides accommodation for the Physics and Geology Departments and frees additional space for Chemistry and Biology in the old Science Wing.

In 1905, the College received from Parliament an additional annual grant of £2,000 for specialisation

in Law and Science.

In 1914, the Victoria College Amendment Act was passed, by which it was enacted that the name of the College should in future be the Victoria University College. Changes were made in the constitution of the Council and of the Professorial Board. In the same year by an amendment to the New Zealand University Act an increase of £3,000 was made in the annual grant, and all the grants from the Government were consolidated into one annual grant of £9,000; further, the College was allotted a share of the National Endowment grant, part of which (amounting in 1925 to £2,083) comes direct from the Government, while a second part (amounting in 1925 to £1,040) is paid through the New Zealand University. Of this last sum £300 is set apart for Workers' Educational Classes.

In 1923, a short amending Act was passed which gave the Council power to levy its own Class fees without the previous approval of the Governor-in-Council. It also provided for a change in the date of the end of the Financial Year from March 31st to December 31st, and for a change in the date of the Annual Meeting of the Council from the May

Meeting to the July Meeting.

In 1919, an amending Act to the New Zealand University Act was passed, in which it was enacted that from April 1st, 1920, the annual grant to this College should be increased by £2,500.

In 1915, the Trustees of the late T. G. Macarthy made a grant of £10,000, for the purpose of establishing a School of Economics, to be called

"The T. G. Macarthy School of Economics." The foundation of the Chair was, however, delayed owing to the war. The Chair was founded in 1920 by the appointment of Professor B. E. Murphy.

In the same year, under the will of the late Sarah Anne Rhodes, the sum of £10,000 was left to

the Council for the education of women.

In 1921 the Council arranged with the S. A. Rhodes Trustees to grant either a Sarah Anne Rhodes Fellowship, or a Sarah Anne Rhodes Scholarship, and alternative sets of regulations were drawn up. The first scholarship was awarded in 1921 to Miss Eleanor A. Pope, B.Sc.

The first Fellowship was awarded to Miss E. A.

Pope in 1925.

In 1923 Sir Walter Buchanan made a donation of £10,000 to found a Chair of Agriculture. The Chair was filled by the appointment of Professor G. S. Peren, B.S.A., Toronto.

COLLEGE LIBRARY.

The College Library is maintained by an annual grant of £425 out of the College funds. At present it contains about 18,000 volumes, and subscribes for rather more than sixty periodicals.

WORKERS' EDUCATIONAL CLASSES.

In 1915, the Council, in co-operation with the Workers' Educational Association, established three classes in Wellington. The movement has now grown considerably, and in 1926 thirty-two classes were being conducted in different parts of the Victoria University District.

Two permanent Tutors for the East Coast (Hawke's Bay and Wairarapa), and West Coast districts (Taranaki and Manawatu) have been appointed, each of whom lectures to several classes.

The Council has appointed Professor T. A. Hunter as Director of Studies.

Note.—Terms will be granted only in subjects mentioned above.

The College year shall consist of three Terms: the First Term to begin about the middle of March and to end about May 15th; the Second Term to begin about May 31st and to end about August 21st; the Third Term to begin about September 6th and to end about the end of October.

The College examinations begin about October 15th.

MATRICULATION.

To matriculate a student must pass the Matriculation Examination and make the following declaration:—"I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Statutes of the University, so far as they apply to me, and I hereby declare that I believe myself to have attained the age of sixteen years."

No examination passed by any student before he has made this declaration can count towards the keeping of terms or the qualifying for a Degree.

The last day for making the Declaration is June 1st, provided that upon payment of a late-fee of £1 1s. 0d. the declaration may be made not later than July 1st.

SUPERVISION OF COURSES.

The Professorial Board supervises the courses of all new students. Before enrolment in classes a record of the proposed course of study, signed by the Chairman of the Professorial Board, or by the Chairman of one of the Faculties (of Arts, Science, or Law), must be in the hands of the Registrar. In the case of a student proceeding to one of the University degrees, this record shall state the complete course of study proposed for that degree; and subsequent departures (if any) from such proposed courses must be similarly recorded.

TERMS.

The subjects in which the keeping of terms is necessary are:—All subjects for B.A., B.Sc., and LL.B. Degrees, certain of the subjects for B.Com., all the subjects of the Engineering Entrance and of the Medical Intermediate.

No examination will be held nor terms granted except in subjects taught in the College (see list above).

INTERNAL STUDENTS

To keep terms in any subject an internal student must

(a) Have his name on the books of the College;

(b) Do the Class work and Class examinations to the satisfaction of the Professor; provided that in exceptional circumstances the Professor may allow him to keep terms by passing the examination provided for external students.

For keeping Terms in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geology or Geography, the Practical Examination or performance of a practical course to the satisfaction of the instructor shall be deemed to be a part of the College Examination; and, unless specially exempted by the Science Faculty, a student presenting himself for an Examination in any of these subjects for the purpose of keeping Terms must do the practical work in that subject in the year in which he so presents himself.

ATTENDANCE,

To fulfil the attendance requirement in a subject a student must, except in cases approved of by the Professorial Board, attend not less than 90% of the lectures in that subject.

REGULATIONS UNDER SECTION VII. OF STATUTE "BACHELOR OF SCIENCE."

Candidates shall be tested on translation of a passage written in a prescribed foreign language and dealing with the subject or subjects offered at

the Advanced stage.

Candidates are required to present themselves for examination in the first term of the second year of the Advanced course. In case of failure a candidate may submit himself for re-examination in the second term of the second year of his Advanced course.

EXTERNAL (Exempted) STUDENTS.

Exemption from lectures is provided for under certain conditions (see Calendar, N.Z. University, 1925, p. 22).

To keep terms in any subject an external student

must

(a) Obtain exemption from lectures and pay an exemption fee of £1 1s. 0d. not later than May 1st.

(b) Pay examination fees (£1 1s. 0d. per subject) not later than August 15th.

(c) Pass in the subject at the Annual College Examinations.:

Note.—Late application for exemption will be received on payment of late fee as follows:—

Examination fees will be received up to August 31st on payment of a late fee of £1 1s. 0d.

ACADEMIC YEARS.

A student may sit for a section of a degree at the end of his first year but may not sit for his final examination until he has completed at least three years work to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.

Note.—Applications for exemption must be made on the proper form which may be obtained from the Registrar.

DISCIPLINE.

In and after 1927 every student attending lectures at Victoria University College shall be required to sign the following declaration and no student shall have his or her name placed on the College books until this declaration is signed:

"I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Regulations of Victoria University College, so far as they apply to me."

The Board has full disciplinary powers over the conduct of all students within the College, the Gymnasium, the College grounds and at all ceremonies and meetings wherever held, conducted under the auspices of the College Council, the Professorial Board, the Students' Association, or any of the College Clubs or Societies, and in other cases when the Board considers that the interests of the College or of students are affected.

Students whose work or attendance is unsatisfactory may be excluded from College Classes for the remainder of the Session by the Professorial Board.

STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION FEE.

Every student attending lectures shall each year on enrolment pay to the Registrar the sum of 10/6, which sum shall be paid into a Consolidated Fund in the name of the Students' Association; provided that any student in whose case payment may involve hardship may appeal to the Professorial Board for exemption or for reduction of same; provided further that the Council may direct the Registrar to withhold any sum necessary to pay for damage done in the Students' Common Rooms or Cloak Rooms.

Upon payment of this sum the student shall ipso facto become a member of the Students' Association and shall also be entitled to become on written application and without any further payment a member of all College clubs and societies provided he agrees to abide by their constitutions and rules.

Note.—Students taking only one half-course shall not be required to pay the above fee.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

Professor Mackenzie. Mr. H. B. Tomlinson.

ENGLISH I.

Hours of meeting:—Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, 5 to 6, and Tuesdays, 7 to 8 (tutorial).

The work of the Class will cover the ground prescribed for Pass B.A., B.Sc. and LL.B. candidates taking English

(a) (1) The history and structure of the English language; elementary phonetics and either (i.) a knowledge of the elements of Anglo-Saxon, such as might be acquired by the use of Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, translation and explanation of easy sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose, and passages of early standard English, to test the candidate's knowledge of the history of forms and inflections; the sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose to be taken from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, and the passages of Early English to be taken from the following sections of Sisam's 'Fourteenth Century Verse and Prose' (Edition with glossary I., III., IV.B., IV.C., VI., VIII.A., IX., X., XI.A. XII.B., XIII., XV., XVII.; or (ii.) additional selected works by one or more authors. (2) Selected portions of the works of one or more authors.

(b) (1) A short essay on some subject arising out of the works selected under (a) (2) An account of some period of literature and its connection with the general history of the period. In the period special attention must be paid to the authors indicated but the other authors in the period are not to be neglected. The literary movements and their leaders, the current types and forms of literature and their representatives, as well as the influence of the ancient classics and of the leading Continental literatures on the English literature of the period, must also be examined. Great importance is attached to composition. General outlines of English Literature including a knowledge and appreciation of the thought and style of standard English authors from Shakespeare to Tennyson.

1927. Shakespeare—Romeo and Juliet, Hamlet: Macaulay—Essay on Milton; Milton—Samson Agonistes, L'Allegro, Il Penseroso, Lycidas.

Period: 1625 to 1688-Milton, Dryden, Herrick, Butler,

LATIN I.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 6 to 7 p.m., Wednesdays, 7 to 8 p.m., and Mondays, 7 to 8 p.m. (Tutorial.) Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation, and lectures are delivered at intervals.

GREEK I.

The work of this Class is arranged to suit students who are reading for the B.A. Examination. The Class will meet at least three hours per week at such times as may best suit students, provided that they can come before 5 p.m. For Greek Prose, Arnold (3/6) and Sidgwick (5/-) will be used. Goodwin's Greek Grammar (6/-) is recommended.

Set-books for 1927—Xenophon, Anabasis IV.; Aeschylus, Prometheus.

GREEK II. AND III. AND HONOURS CLASS.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Honours or Stages II. and III. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

GREEK HISTORY, ART AND LITERATURE.

Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, 7-8 p.m., and Fridays 6-7 p.m. (Tutorial).

This class deals with the subject as defined in the University Calendar as a Stage I. Subject for the Arts Degree, and is intended for students who desire to gain some knowledge of Greek life and thought without acquiring familiarity with the Greek language. The set books are studied in approved translations, and as far as possible the lectures will be illustrated by means of slides.

The subject is defined as follows:--

(i.) Greek History down to the end of the Peloponnesian War with a knowledge of the constitutions of Athens and Sparta.

Text Bock—Oman's History of Greece (Longmans), or Bury's History of Greece (Macmillan).

- (ii.) Special knowledge of a Greek historical or philosophical work. For 1927, Herodotus VII.-IX.
- (iii.) Elementary knowledge of Greek Art with special reference to sculpture.

Text Book-E. Gardner: Handbook of Greek Sculpture.

(iv.) General knowledge of Greek Literature and special study of selected authors and set books.

FRENCH I.

The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5 to 6 p.m., on Fridays from 7 to 8 p.m. and on Mondays or Wednesdays 7 to 8 p.m. (oral).

The books read will be: A. France—Le Crime de Sylvestre Bonnard; Voltaire—Zaïre; Molière—Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme; Lazare—Half Hours of French Translation, Part II. Period of Literature, 1700 to 1789.

Honours students will take lectures in Philosophy III. as directed by the Professor.

PSYCHOLOGICAL LABORATORY.

N.B.—In all courses hours will be fixed at the beginning of the session and every effort made to suit the convenience of students.

The University has prescribed alternative questions in Psychology for students who qualify in laboratory work. The courses are arranged as follows:—

I. As for B.A. and LL.B., etc.—A course of experiments in the qualitative problems of sensation, perception, mental imagery, association, memory, action, attention, feeling.

III. A course of experiments in simple quantitative methods, in examination of individuals in acuity of the senses, colour vision, tone discrimination, and in general intelligence and mental tests.

Psychology (General and Experimental).

The work of this class will cover the course prescribed for B.Sc. Pass.

and Wednesday at 3 p.m.

Practical Work—not less than four hours per week throughout the session. Hours to be arranged.

INDUSTRIAL PSYCHOLOGY.

This course will cover the work prescribed for B.Com. Degree.

HISTORY I.

This class which covers the work for the B.A. and B.Com. Degrees, meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays, from 7 to 8 p.m. and Fridays 6 to 7 p.m. (tutorial).

The course will deal with the development of the Great powers in the Nineteenth Century, and with

Colonization.

Special attention will be given to New Zealand history.

HISTORY II.

JUNIOR CLASS (Professor Murphy).

Economics, descriptive and analytic, with special reference to New Zealand conditions; covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the Commercial Accountants' Examination, the B.A. and B.Com. degrees, the Diplomas in Journalism, Banking and Social Science, and those reading Economics for general information. Three lectures per week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5 to 6 p.m., and Fridays, 7 to 8 p.m. Should a sufficient number of students desire it, a tutorial class will be held on Wednesdays, 7 to 8 p.m.

Text Book :-

Students intending to read Economics for Honours should join this class in their first academic year, and undertake additional reading to be prescribed as required.

ADVANCED CLASSES.

Course A. (Professor Murphy).

Economics, descriptive and analytic, in relation to existing conditions, including International Trade, a more advanced treatment of general Economics than is given in the Junior Class; covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of Economics II. (first year advanced B.A. unit), papers (a) and (b) in Honours, and Advanced Economics for B.Com. Group II. Four lectures per week on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m.

Text Book:—
Taussig—Principles of Economics, 2 Vols. Bastable-Commerce of Nations, (9th edition, edited

by Gregory).

Students in their "advanced" year will take this class, and this class only. Economics III. (alternative advanced B.A. unit), will not be offered in 1927, but will be offered in 1928.

Course B. (Mr. Williams).

ECONOMIC HISTORY.—Two classes will be offered in this subject.

(i.) The Economic History of England from the break-up of the Middle Ages to the present day, with special reference to the period from the Industrial Revolution onwards; covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the B.Com. degree, the diplomas in Social Science and Banking, paper (b) of Economics III., and (in part) paper (e) in Honours. Two lectures per week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 6 to 7 p.m.

Text Book:-

Meredith: Economic History of England.

Prior to joining the class students should possess such an elementary knowledge of Economic History as would be obtained by the perusal of Townsend-Warner: Landmarks in English Industrial History, or Bradshaw: Social History of England.

(ii.) The Economic History of Imperialism in the 19th and 20th centuries, with special reference to the British Empire, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of paper (e) in Honours. One lecture per week, on Mondays 5 to 6 p.m. or such other hour as may be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned. Reading will be prescribed as required.

Course C. (Mr. Williams).

ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY.—A general treatment, covering, and confined to, the requirements of the B.Com. degree. One lecture per week, Fridays 5 to 6 p.m., with an additional lecture on Wednesdays, 5 to 6 p.m., during the second half of the session.

One lecture per week, on Wednesdays, 6 to 7 p.m. During the second term an additional hour (Thursdays 5 to 6 p.m.,) will be devoted mainly to practical work.

One lecture per week, at an hour to be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned.

Course F. (Professor Murphy).

Industrial Law.—The industrial law of New Zealand, with special reference to the statutory labour protective code; covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the B.Com. degree, Group III. C. One lecture per week, at an hour to be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned. Students must possess the following New Zealand statutes and their amendments:

All the above courses, either because they are compulsory for the degrees in Arts and Commerce, or are of special local importance, will be offered, if required, each year, but the "advanced" units (Economics II. and Economics III.) will be offered only in alternate years.

The remaining courses, which are options in the new and expanded Commerce degree, will be offered at intervals according to requirements. Prospective students are advised to notify the Professor if and when they are likely to take them if offered.

Course G. (Mr. Williams).

Currency and Banking.—A general treatment, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the B.Com. degree, paper (c) (i.) in Honours, and the Diploma in Banking. This will be offered every alternate year as part of Economics III. (second year advanced B.A. unit). It will be offered next in 1928.

Course H. (Mr. Williams).

Public Finance.—A general treatment, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the B. Com. degree Group III B, and paper (c) (ii.) in Honours. One lecture per week at an hour to be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned.

B—Lectures twice weekly on General Physics, Properties of Matter, Electricity and Magnetism; Tuesday and Friday 9 to 10 a.m.

C-Practical work.

- (a) Tuesday and Friday 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. or
- (b) Wednesday, 2 to 5 p.m., and Saturday, 9 a.m. 12 noon.

An additional class will be held on Monday 7 to 10 p.m. for students who can attend only one day-time period.

D—Acoustics for students preparing for the Mus. B.Degree.

Students are required to pass certain test examinations on theoretical Physics, to complete the prescribed course of experiments and to pass a practical examination. Students are also required to keep neat and concise, but adequate, notes of their experimental work; these will be marked very week.

BOTANY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. Every student should come to lectures with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary studies have not removed. It is part of the duty of the Professor to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

Students that begin the University Course without any adequate training in Botany should, if circumstances permit, take two years to reach the pass

Text-Books.—It is obligatory to have Parker's Lessons in Elementary Biology, and Johnson's Note Book for Practical Botany, or Bower and Vaughan's Practical Botany for Beginners; and one of the following: Strasburger's Text Book of Botany, (3rd or later English edition); Miss A. S. M. Johnston's Botany, Mudge and Maslen's Class Book of Botany; or Bower's Botany of the Living Plant. It is very desirable, indeed almost necessary, that Senior students at least should have Dendy's Evolutionary Biology and Cockayne's New Zealand Plants and their Story.

Instruments—All students must provide themselves with the following instruments at least, a razor for section-cutting, a pair of mounted needles and a pair of forceps with fine points. It is very desirable that every student should have a pocket lens. Students that have not Johnson's Note Book must have a laboratory drawing-book, with alternate pages ruled for notes.

ADVANCED AND HONOURS CLASSES—There will generally be two lectures a week and at least one discussions class a week. It is necessary that students attending these classes should have Strasburger's Botany and Dendy's Evolutionary Biology.

Students of Botany, whether formally attached to the College or not, may obtain from the Professor permission to refer to the late Mr. T. Kirk's herbarium of New Zealand Flowering Plants, and to the late Dr. Knight's herbarium of Lichens (presented to the college by Mrs. Knight).

ZOOLOGY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. Every student should come to lecture with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary studies have not removed. It is part of the duty of the Professor to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

Students that begin the University Course without any adequate training in Zoology should, if circumstances permit, take two years to reach the pass grade.

1. In the case of disorderly conduct or any breach of the regulations the Librarian may, and in serious cases shall, report the person so offending to the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Any person so reported, if found guilty of any breach of the Regulations, shall be reprimanded and may be excluded from the use of the Library or dealt with in such other way as the Professorial Board may direct

HOURS.

2. During the Session the Library shall be open to readers from 9 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. with an interval of an hour at mid-day on all week days except Saturdays, when it shall be open from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

3. The Library shall be closed on Sundays, on public holidays, and at such other times as the

Professorial Board may direct.

4. Regulations will be issued from time to time for the use of the Library during recess.

ADMISSION FOR READING PURPOSES.

- 5. The following persons shall be entitled to use the Library for reading purposes:—
 - (a) Members of the College Council.
 - (b) Members of the Teaching Staff.
 - (c) Students who have paid the College fee for the current year.
 - (d) Graduates of any University, and persons engaged in Research work, and any other persons; provided that in every case permission shall have been granted by the Library Committee of the Professorial Board.

Note.—Persons using the Library under (c) and (d) shall every session first present to the Librarian a Library card for the current year, to be obtained from the Registrar.

CONDUCT OF READERS IN THE LIBRARY.

- 6. (a) The use of pens and ink in the Library is strictly prohibited except at tables provided for the purpose.
 - (b) Silence must be observed in the Library.
 - (c) Communications with other readers should be avoided: applications for information, etc., should be made to the Librarian.
- 7. No books are to be removed from the Library except as provided in Regulations 10, 11 and 12.
- 8. Books removed from the shelves by readers must be left on the tables in the reading rooms, except Law reports, which shall be replaced in the shelves.
- 9. Readers are particularly cautioned against injuring books belonging to the Library by writing in the margin, marking or turning down the leaves, or otherwise disfiguring them.

BORROWING BOOKS.

- 10. Members of the College Council and the Professors and Lecturers of the College may borrow any volumes provided:
 - (a) That entry of each volume so borrowed be made, dated, and signed, by the borrower, in the Ledger provided for the purpose.
 - (b) That volumes specified in Regulation 13 be retained by borrowers not longer than one week, and that no volume be retained for more than two months except during the long vacation.
- 11. Any other member of the Staff may borrow volumes except those volumes specified in Regulation 13, provided:
 - (a) That entry be made as in Regulation 10.

- (b) That not more than 5 volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than one month except during the long vacation.
- 12. Any other person privileged under Regulation 5 for reading purposes may on application to the Librarian borrow books at hours notified on the Library notice-board, provided:
 - (a) That a deposit of One Guinea be made with the Librarian which shall be returned to the depositor when he ceases to avail himself of the privilege of borrowing books provided he has returned undamaged all books borrowed by him: provided that a Professor's written voucher shall be accepted in lieu of a deposit of One Guinea.
 - (b) That not more than two volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than 14 days: provided that on the written request of a Professor or of an Independent Lecturer any Honours or Research student or student doing advanced work may take out five volumes at one time, no volume to be retained for more than one month.
- 13. Save as provided in Regulation 10, encyclopædias, dictionaries, law reports, prose translations of the classics, books containing valuable engravings, works with loose plates or maps, periodicals which have been less than a fortnight in the Library, may not be borrowed from the Library. Provided, always without prejudice to Regulation 10, that text-books prescribed for the current year, and books listed as specially in demand, may be withheld, lent, or recalled by the Librarian. A book so recalled must be returned within three days.

14. A Request Book shall be provided in which the names of those wishing to obtain books in circulation, the titles of the books and the date of request may be entered. Any book which has been entered in the request book shall be returned on the demand of the Librarian within three days.

15. The borrower shall be liable for any damage a book may have sustained whilst in his keeping.

16. No book belonging to the Library shall be privately lent by any borrower, except those specified in Regulation 10.

17. All books and publications of every kind shall be returned on or before February 1st in each year, and during the eight days immediately following the Library shall be closed; provided that members of the staff who desire to retain books in their possession during this period may do so on furnishing a list of such books to the Librarian on or before February 1st, and that members of the staff may also borrow books during the same period on application to the Librarian.

NOTE.—Reciprocal arrangements have been made with the Wellington Philosophical Society, whereby Students of the College can visit the library of that Society and consult books and periodicals, on production of a card from the College Librarian.

Current numbers of Mind, Psychological Bulletin and Review, International Journal of Ethics and Journal of Educational Psychology should be consulted at the Public Library.

2. The subjects of examination shall comprise not less than two nor more than three of those prescribed for the B.Sc. course, and at least one of

such shall be taken at the advanced grade.

3. The Scholarship shall be awarded by the Professorial Board on the basis of the College examinations in conjunction with the practical work done by the candidates throughout their course.

4. The Scholar must attend a course of lectures and do practical work to the approval of the Professorial Board.

6. The Scholarship is of the value of £50,

tenable for one year.

7. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first about August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled. Payments shall be subject to a favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Dean of the Science Faculty.

8. Candidates must apply in writing to the Registrar not later than the 20th of September.

JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

The late Mr. Jacob Joseph bequeathed a sum of £3,000 to Victoria College, in the year 1905, for the foundation of Scholarships. On this foundation two Scholarships of £60, tenable for one year, are open for award annually, under the following regulations:

- 1. The Scholarships shall be open to students (either men or women):—
 - (i.) Whose year of matriculation is not more than five years prior to the year of the award—except in the case of Law students, for whom the corresponding interval shall be seven years:
 - (ii.) Who have studied at Victoria College for at least two years, and have completed an Honours course thereat to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.
 - (iii.) Who have been certified by the University of New Zealand to have attained to the standard of Honours.
- 2. Preference, ceteris paribus, shall be shown to students of Law and Experimental Science (including Mental and Moral Philosophy, provided that evidence of sufficient Laboratory work be forth-coming.)
- 3. The Scholarships shall be awarded on evidence of capacity to undertake original work.

- 4. The tenure of the Scholarships shall be subject to the following conditions:—
 - (i.) A scholar shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.
 - (ii.) He shall submit to the Professorial Board a thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that thesis, and specifically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a copy of this thesis for the College Library.
- 5. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first on August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled, but the second instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award. Payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Professorial Board.
- 6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by May 1st.
- 7. The holding of another scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.
- 8. In the event of no scholarship or only one scholarship being awarded in any year, additional scholarships may be awarded in any subsequent year.

NATIONAL RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS.

I. One National Research Scholarship shall be offered each year for each of the four University Colleges affiliated with the University of New Zealand.

II. Such Scholarships shall be awarded to graduates of the four affiliated institutions or to other qualified persons for the purpose of enabling them to carry on independent research in any branch of physical, natural or applied science, or in any branch of economics.

III. A due proportion of such scholarships shall be offered for the purpose of encouraging research in connection with matters relating to the industries of New Zealand.

IV. If in any College two candidates of high merit present themselves, an additional scholarship may with the approval of the Minister of Education, be offered for that College in one year, but in no case shall a scholarship be awarded unless a candidate is deemed thoroughly worthy of the distinction. In case of equality, preference shall be given to candidates undertaking research in conection with matters relating to the industries of New Zealand.

V. Each scholarship shall be of the value of £100 per annum, together with the College laboratory fees, the cost of special apparatus or special books required for the purpose of research, and the actual travelling fares or cost of transit while the scholar is engaged on the work of research.

VI. The Professorial Board of the College shall supervise the work of the scholar, and may appoint a special committee, some of the members of which shall be members of the College staff, to assist in such supervision.

VII. Between the 1st November and the 31st May following, the Professorial Board shall forward to the Chancellor the name of the candidate or candidates (if any), whom it recommends for election to the Scholarship, together with the proposed subject of research; and, as soon as the Chancellor has signified his aproval of such recommendation, the said candidate or candidates shall be deemed to be elected.

VIII. Each Scholarship shall be tenable for two years if the holder shall for so long fulfil the prescribed conditions, but the tenure of the Scholarship may be extended to a third year on the recommendation of the Professorial Board.

IX. The scholar shall enrol his name at the college at which the Scholarship is held, and shall begin his work within a period to be named by the Professorial Board, but in no case later than six months after his election to the Scholarship, except with the approval of the Chancellor.

X. The Scholar shall be required to devote his whole time during the tenure of the Scholarship to the work of his research unless, under special circumstances, the consent of the Chancellor on the recommendation of the Professorial Board has been previously obtained in writing.

XI. The amount of the Scholarship shall be paid to the scholar in quarterly instalments, each instalment being paid at the end of the quarter from the date on which the Scholar begins his work, on the receipt of a satisfactory report from the Professorial Board.

XII. The Scholar shall each year send to the Professorial Board, through the Professor in whose department the work is being carried on, a report on the progress of his research.

XIII. The Scholar shall embody an account of the results of his research in a detailed report, which shall be sent, through the Professor in whose department the research is being carried on, to the Professorial Board, and by it to the Chancellor, who shall if he sees fit, cause it to be published in suitable form.

XIV. No publication of the results of the research shall be made by the Scholar unless the Chancellor gives his consent thereto.

XV. The final instalment of the Scholarship shall not be payable until the detailed report of the results has been made, in a form approved by the Professorial Board, to the Chancellor.

XVI. All the results of the research carried on by the Scholar in accordance with the terms of his Scholarship shall be the property of the Government of New Zealand, provided, however, that if the results prove to be of such economic importance as to warrant protection by Letters Patent, only the New Zealand rights shall be reserved to the Government, and the Scholar shall be permitted to reap any pecuniary benefit to be derived from patent rights elsewhere.

SARAH ANNE RHODES FELLOWSHIP AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

[The funds for the purposes are derived from a bequest by Mrs. S. A. Rhodes.]

REGULATIONS FOR SARAH ANNE RHODES FELLOWSHIP IN HOME SCIENCE.

- 1. One "Sarah Anne Rhodes Research Fellowship in Home Science," may be offered by the Council of the Victoria University College.
- 2. The Fellowship shall be open to women graduates of the University of New Zealand or of any other university approved by the Council of Victoria University College.
- 3. The Fellowship shall be of the value of £400 per annum together with travelling expenses approved by the Council, and shall be tenable for two years. The emolument shall be paid monthly.
- 4. The Fellow shall undertake research work in some problem of Home Science connected with New Zealand and approved by the Victoria University College Council.
- 5. The Fellow shall forward to the Council of Victoria University College half-yearly reports on the progress of her research, and the final report on the subject of her research shall be presented in a form suitable for publication.
- 6. The Council of Victoria University College may require the Fellow to deliver short courses of lectures in one or more of the University Colleges in New Zealand.
- 7. The Council of Victoria University College may terminate a Fellowship if the Fellow is guilty of misconduct or of the neglect of the duties of the Fellowship.

- 8. A Fellow is required to devote herself wholly to the objects of the Fellowship and is forbidden to hold any position of emolument, except by the permission of the Victoria University College Council.
- 9. The date of application for a Fellowship shall be advertised by the Council of Victoria University College.

REGULATIONS FOR SARAH ANNE RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS IN HOME SCIENCE.

- 1. One or more "Sarah Anne Rhodes Scholarships in Home Science" may be offered, as the Council of the Victoria University College has directed.
- 2. Candidates for the Scholarships must be women who have been resident in New Zealand not less than twelve months and who have kept terms in two subjects at Victoria University College, preference being given to candidates who have kept terms in Botany or Zoology or Chemistry or Physics.
- 3. A Scholarship shall be tenable for two years, provided that a Scholarship may be withdrawn if the scholar fails to do satisfactory work.
- 4. A scholar must carry out a course of study in Home Science in a university approved by the Council of Victoria University College.
 - 5. The emolument of the Scholarship shall be:—
 f125 per annum if the scholar pursues her
 studies in New Zealand.

£250 per annum if the scholar pursues her studies in a country other than New Zealand.

6. Payments of the emolument shall be made quarterly in advance, but the Council may reserve a portion of the last payment until a final satisfactory report is obtained.

- 7. A scholar is required to furnish half-yearly reports on her work, and such reports shall be accompanied by a certificate from the Professor or Director of the University Department in which the scholar has studied that the work has been done to his satisfaction.
- 8. A scholar is required to devote herself wholly to the objects of the Scholarship and is forbidden to hold any position of emolument, except by permission of the Council of the Victoria University College.
- 9. Applications for Scholarships must be in the hands of the Registrar of Victoria University College not later than 31st October in any year. With her application a candidate must forward an outline of her proposed course of study in Home Science and the name of the university in which she desires to pursue it.
- 10. Candidates shall be required to make a declaration that it is their intention to return to New Zealand at the termination of their Scholarships.
- 11. Under exceptional circumstances the Council may extend the term of any Scholarship or make a grant for any special expenses of a scholar.

FARMERS' UNION SCHOLARSHIP.

In 1924 a sum of £1,055 was received from Sir James Wilson for the foundation of a Scholarship to be known as "The Farmers' Union Scholarship." On this foundation a Research Scholarship of £100 is open for award annually under the following regulations:—

- 1. The Scholarship shall be tenable for the period of one year. The Council, however, shall have power to extend the tenancy in any case where it deems it advisable to do so.
- 2. The Scholarship shall be open to graduates of any University in the British Empire who are resident in New Zealand, and who have given satisfactory evidence of capacity to undertake original work.

Under special circumstances the Scholarship may, in the discretion of the Council, be granted to an undergraduate of the New Zealand University.

- 3. The Scholarship shall be held at Victoria University College School of Agriculture.
- 4. The tenure of the Scholarship shall be subject to the following conditions.
 - (i.) A scholar shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation bearing on Agriculture to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.
 - (ii.) He shall submit to the Professorial Board a Thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that Thesis, and speci-

fically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a copy of this Thesis for the Agricultural Section of the College Library.

- 5. Scholars shall receive payment in three equal instalments, the first on August 1st, the second on December 1st, and the third when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled, but the third instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award. Payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the scholar by the Professorial Board.
- 6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by March 15th.
- 7. The holding of another Scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Farmers' Union Scholarship.
- 8. In the absence of a suitable candidate, the total annual income accruing from the capital invested may, at the discretion of the Council of the College, be utilised for the purchase of apparatus or equipment, or to assist in any other way research work undertaken by the Staff of the School of Agriculture.

THE LISSIE RATHBONE SCHOLARSHIPS.

(The Lissie Rathbone Scholarships were established in 1925 by the Trustees of her will, she having bequeathed one half of her residuary estate for such Charitable, Educational or Religious objects as the Trustees should select. The Trustees have allotted £3,000 to Victoria University College, the income from which is to be applied to Scholarships.)

In pursuance of powers vested in the Council by the Trustees the following regulations are prescribed to govern the award and tenure of the Scholarships in this University College:

- 1. There shall be offered in each year one or more Lissie Rathbone Scholarships, as the funds will admit.
- 2. Election to the Scholarship shall be made by the Council of the Victoria University College.
- 3. The annual value of each Scholarship shall be not less than £50.
- 4. The tenure of each Scholarship shall be for three years, terminable however at any time if the Council, having received from the Professorial Board an unfavourable report of the conduct or progress of the scholar, shall so determine.
 - 5. Candidates for each Scholarship
 - (i.) Must be under nineteen years of age on the first day of December immediately preceding the date of the award of the Scholarship.

(ii.) May be of either sex.

(iii.) Must be resident for one year preceding the award in the Victoria University District.

(iv.) Must state their willingness to pursue as internal students of Victoria University College a course for a degree within the award of the New Zealand University from time to time (subject to such regulations as

may be consistent with the object of the Scholarship) which may be selected by such scholar, his parents or guardians.

- 6. Each Scholarship shall be awarded upon examination for excellence in the subjects of English and History. Provided that the Council shall not be bound to award the Scholarship to the candidate obtaining the highest number of marks in such subjects, but may in its discretion take into account the financial circumstances of the scholar, his parents or guardians.
- 7. The examination in which the award shall be made shall be the examination presented by the University of New Zealand for the award of its Entrance Scholarships, the examination papers used being those set in English and History for that examination. If, however, there shall at any time cease to be an Entrance Scholarship examination, or if there shall cease to be examination papers set in either English or History for the Entrance Scholarships, the examination in which such award shall be made shall be such other examination in English and History as the Council may from time to time appoint.
- 8. No candidate who has qualified for an Entrance Scholarship to the University shall be eligible for the award of a Lissie Rathbone Scholarship. No candidate shall be awarded a Scholarship whose aggregate marks do not reach 50 per cent. of the possible total.
- 9. Candidates for the Lissie Rathbone Scholarships need not be candidates for an Entrance Scholarship to the University.
- 10. In the event of the accumulated earnings of the gift being in excess of the amount required for scholarships awarded under Clause I., the Council may either grant boarding allowance to any scholar needing it, or make a grant to any student, who, though he or she has not qualified in

the Entrance Examination in the subjects prescribed for the Scholarship, has obtained at the College examinations of his first year a high class in the two subjects, English and History. In the event of the accumulated earnings of the gift proving at any time insufficient for all or any of the purposes above set forth the Council may adjust the annual value of any scholarship or the tenure thereof as the Council shall see fit from time to time.

11. Every candidate for the Scholarship shall send notice of his or her candidature on the prescribed form not later than 1st October. Entries shall be made in duplicate, one copy, accompanied by entry fee 10/6d., to be sent to the Registrar of the University of New Zealand, and the other copy to the Registrar, Victoria University College.

Note.—Late entry allowed up to 22nd October on receipt of late fee of £2 2s. 0d.

Forms of entry may be obtained on application to the Registrar, Victoria University College.

- 12. Payments shall be made in two instalments, the first in the month of July and the second in the month of November. Payments shall be subject to the recommendation of the Professorial Board.
- 13. In cases approved by the Council scholars may be permitted to transfer to another University College.

THE VICTORIA COLLEGE ACT, 1905.

[As amended by the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907, the Queen's Scholarship Act, 1906, the Victoria College Act Amendment Act, 1914, and the Victoria College Amendment Act, 1923.]

An Act to consolidate certain Enactments of the General Assembly relating to Victoria College.

[27th October, 1905. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The short Title of this Act is "The Victoria

College Act, 1905."

THE COLLEGE.

2. There is hereby established in the City of Wellington a college connected with the New Zealand University, to be called "the Victoria College."

THE CORPORATION.

3. The Council of the College, its professors and lecturers, and the graduates and undergraduates of the New Zealand University, whose names are on the books, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate under the style of "the Victoria University College," by which style that corporation shall have perpetual succession and a common seal.

THE COUNCIL.

4. The corporation shall act by a governing body, to be called "the Victoria University College Council" (elsewhere throughout this Act referred to as "the Council.")

5. The Council shall be constituted as follows:—

(a) A group of two members appointed by the Governor:

- (b) A group of two members appointed by the Professorial Board of the College:
- (c) A group of four members elected by the District Court of Convocation of the Victoria University District as defined by the New Zealand University Act, 1908:
- (d) One member appointed by the Wellington City Council:
- (e. A group of two members elected by the members of the Education Boards of education districts wholly or partly within the Victoria University District:
- (f) One member elected by the governing bodies of the secondary schools as defined by section eighty-nine of the Education Act, 1908, in the Victoria University District:
- (g) A group of two members elected by the teachers in public schools in the Victoria University District holding certificates of competency under section fifty-four of the Education Act, 1908:
- (h) One member elected by those teachers in secondary schools and in day technical schools, as defined respectively by section eighty-nine of the Education Act, 1908, and by section sixteen of the Education Amendment Act, 1910, in the Victoria University District who are graduates of any British chartered University, or are holders of certificates of competency under section fifty-four of the Education Act, 1908.
- 6. (1) Members appointed pursuant to paragraphs (b) and (d) of section five hereof shall be appointed by resolution passed at a meeting of the Board or Council making the appointment.

- (2) Members elected pursuant to paragraphs (c), (e), (f), (g), and (h) of the same section shall be elected in manner hereinafter appearing.
- (3) The first appointments and elections of members pursuant to the said section five shall be made within the first seven days of the month of June, nineteen hundred and fifteen, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, and the members so appointed or elected shall come into office on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen:

Provided that no appointment or election shall be made under the provisions of paragraphs (a), (e), or (g) of the said section, save for the purpose of filling casual vacancies, until the month of June, nineteen hundred and seventeen.

- 7. (1) For the purpose of election of members pursuant to paragraphs (c), (e), (g), and (h) of section five hereof the following provisions shall apply:—
 - (a) The Registrar of Victoria University College, or such other person as the Council appoints, shall be the Returning Officer who shall conduct all elections of those members.
 - (b) The Returning Officer shall prepare separate rolls of the persons who are entitled to vote for a member or members pursuant to the said paragraphs (c), (e), (g), and (h), and shall enter in the respective rolls the name, occupation, and address of every person who possesses the necessary qualifications entitling him to vote; provided that no person shall be entered on more rolls than one.

(c) Any person who possesses more qualifications than one shall be entitled to have his name transferred from one roll to another roll on which he is qualified to be enrolled at any time before the closing of the rolls as hereinafter mentioned:

Provided that a person who has had his name so transferred from one roll to another roll shall not be entitled to have his name transferred from the lastmentioned roll until after two years have elapsed since the date of the transfer to that roll, unless he has ceased to be qualified to have his name thereon.

- (d) All rolls shall be closed at five o'clock in the afternoon of the fourteenth day immediately preceding the day on which an election is to be held and shall continue to be closed until the election is completed; and no name shall be entered on any roll while that roll is closed.
- (e) Claims for enrolment shall be made and disposed of in accordance with regulations made by the Council.
- (f) At every election the votes shall be given by sealed voting-papers, in the form prescribed by regulations made by the Council, delivered to the Returning Officer personally on or before the day fixed for the election, or forwarded to him by post or otherwise so as to reach him not later than that day.
- (2) For the purpose of the election of a member pursuant to paragraph (f) of section five hereof the following provisions shall apply:—

- (a) The governing body of each secondary school shall be entitled to one vote for every hundred or part of a hundred pupils (exclusive of the pupils in any lower department) in average attendance for the year ending on the thirty-first day of December immediately preceding the election.
- (b) The votes of each such governing body shall be by resolution passed at a meeting of that governing body.
- (3) In any election to which this section refers the majority of votes shall decide the election, provided that if two candidates have an equal number of votes the Registrar shall (if necessary) determine the election by lot in the presence of the Chairman or other member of the Council.
- 8. (1) No member of the Professorial Board shall be a member of the Council unless he is appointed a member of that Board pursuant to paragraph (b) of section five hereof.
- (2) A member of the Professorial Board so elected shall not be entitled to vote on any question before the Council affecting himself or directly affecting the salary of any member of the teaching staff of the College, or directly affecting any payment made by or due from the Council to any member of the teaching staff.
- 9. Subject to the provisions of the next succeeding section, the term of office of all members appointed or elected as provided by paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e), and (g), of section five hereof shall be four years, and of all other members shall be two years; but all members shall continue to hold office until the appointment or election of their successors

- 10. On the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen, of the members appointed under the provisions of the principal Act by the Governor in Council, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members so appointed shall be deemed to have been appointed by the Governor under this Act; in like manner, of the members elected under the principal Act by the graduates of the New Zealand University on the books of the College, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (c) of section five of this Act; in like manner, of the members elected under paragraph (d) of sub-section one of section five of the principal Act, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (g) of section five of this Act; and, in like manner, of the members elected under the provisions of the principal Act by Education Boards, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (e) of section five of this Act; and the member elected by the Professorial Board shall retire
- 11. (1) Except as provided in the last preceding section, the members of the Council who are in office on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen, shall continue to hold office, subject as hereinafter in this section mentioned.
- (2) On the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and on the same day in each second year thereafter, one-half of the members mentioned in paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e) and (g) of section five hereof and the members mentioned in paragraphs (d), (f), and (h), of the said section shall retire from office.

- (3) The members to retire from each of the groups mentioned in paragraphs (a), (c), (e), and (g) of section five hereof on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall be those who have been longest in office.
- (4) The member to retire from the group mentioned in paragraph (b) of the said section five on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall, on or before the first day of May in that year, be decided by lot amongst the members of that group.
- (5) Of the members elected under paragraph (b) of section five of the principal Act, the one who has been longest in office shall retire on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen; and the remaining members shall retire on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen; and in no case shall any election be made hereafter of members under the said paragraph.
 - 12. (1) If any member of the Council—
 - (a) Dies, or by writing addressed to the Council resigns his seat; or
 - (b) Becomes a bankrupt; or
 - (c) For a period of three consecutive months fails to attend any meeting of the Council without obtaining leave or absence; or
 - (d) Is absent from New Zealand for a period of six consecutive months without obtaining leave or absence,—

he shall cease to be a member, and the vacancy thereby created shall be deemed a casual vacancy.

(2) The member filling a casual vacancy shall hold office only for the residue of the term of the vacating member.

- 13. (1) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by appointment by the Governor it shall be the duty of the Council to forthwith report the fact to the Minister of Education.
- (2) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by appointment by the Professorial Board, or by the Education Board, or by the Wellington City Council, it shall be the duty of the Council forthwith to report the fact to the Board or Council which appointed the vacating member.
- (3) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to filled by election it shall be the duty of the Council to do all things necessary for the proper conduct of that election.
- (4) Each vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, shall be filled by the same authority as that which appointed or elected the vacating member.
- 13a. [Section 12 of the Act of 1914.] (1) The appointment or election of a member to fill a vacancy caused by the expiry of the term of office of a vacating member shall be made within the first seven days of the month of June next preceding such expiry, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, but shall not take effect until such expiry.
- (2) The appointment or election of a member to fill a casual vacancy shall be made not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs.
- (3) Every retiring member shall be eligible for reappointment or re-election.
- (4) If any vacancy is not filled within sixty days after the same occurs, the Governor shall forthwith fill the vacancy by appointing some fit person as a member in place of the vacating member.

14. The Council shall meet at least once a month at such time and place as the Council determines.

15. At its first meeting held in the month of July in each year the Council shall elect one of its members to be Chairman.

16. The Chairman shall hold office for one year and shall be eligible for re-election.

17. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Chairman or any two members, five days' previous notice of the place and time for such meeting being posted or telegraphed to all the members.

18. At all meetings of the Council-

- (a) The quorum shall be six;
- (b) All questions shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting;
- (c) The Chairman shall preside and have a deliberate vote, and, in the event of equality of voting, a casting vote;
- (d) In the absence of the Chairman from any meeting the members present shall elect one of their number to act as chairman at that meeting, and while so acting he shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

19. Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Council may from time to time make by-laws for the purpose of regulating its own procedure, the conduct of all elections under this Act, and the general administration of the affairs of the College:

Provided that such by-laws shall not come into operation until and unless they have been approved by the Governor-in-Council.

- 20. The Council may continue to act notwithstanding any vacancy in its body.
- 21. The Council shall cause exact minutes of all its proceedings to be kept and also full and accurate accounts of all its receipts, disbursements, liabilities and engagements.
- 22. The seal of the Council shall be in the custody of the Chairman, and shall not be affixed to any document except pursuant to a resolution of the Council.
- 23 (1) The Council shall have full power to appoint and remove all professors, lecturers, examiners, officers, and servants of the College, and to generally manage the affairs thereof:
- (2) All persons appointed by the Council and holding office on the commencement of this Act shall be deemed to have been appointed under this Act.

THE PROFESSORIAL BOARD.

- 24. There shall be a Professorial Board of the College, consisting of all the professors of the College for the time being, and of such lecturers of the College for the time being as the Council may from time to time declare to be members of the Board.
- 25. The Board shall have power to make rules as to the time and place of its meetings and the procedure thereat:

Provided that all such rules shall, before coming into operation, be submitted to and approved by the Council.

26. At its annual meeting the Board shall elect one of its members, being a professor, to be Chairman, and if it fails so to do the Council may appoint a professor to be Chairman for the year.

27. The Chairman shall hold office for one year and be eligible for re-election.

28. At all meetings of the Board-

- (a) A quorum shall be such number as the Board with the consent of the Council from time to time determines.
- (b) The Chairman shall preside, and shall cause exact minutes of the proceedings to be kept.
- (c) He shall have a deliberate vote, and, in the case of equality of voting, a castingvote:
- (d) In his absence from any meeting the members present shall elect another professor to act as chairman of that meeting, and while so acting he shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

29. Subject in each instance to the approval of the Council, and to such modifications as the Council thinks fit to make therein, the Board may—

- (a) Fix the course of study, and the days and hours of lectures:
- (b) Make rules as to the attendance of the students.
- (c) Prescribe the subjects for examinations for scholarships, exhibitions, prizes, and other college distinctions and awards.

30. Subject to the right of appeal to the Council (whose decision shall be final) by any person who feels aggrieved, the Board may—

- (a) Deal with all questions relating to the discipline of the students:
- (b) Manage the College library:
- (c) Give instructions to the College servants as to the performance of their duties.

- 31. The Board shall be subject to the control of the Council, and shall furnish to it such reports and information as from time to time the Council requests or the Board deems necessary.
- 32. The Board may from time to time offer such suggestions for the consideration of the Council as the Board thinks advisable in the interests of the College.

LECTURE FEES.

- 33. There shall be payable by the students such reasonable fees for general tuition and for attendance on lectures as from time to time the Council prescribes.
- 34. For the purpose of procuring such approval, the Council shall forward each table of fees to the Minister of Education for submission to the Governor-in-Council; and the fees shall not be chargeable until such approval is signified.

(Clauses 35 and 36 repealed by the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907.

APPROPRIATION AND ENDOWMENT.

- 37. For the purpose of providing a fund for the maintenance of the College, and the payment of all expenses incurred by the Council in administering the affairs thereof, the Colonial Treasurer, without further appropriation than this Act, shall, out of the Consolidated Fund, pay to the Council each year ending the thirty-first day of March the sum of four thousand pounds, in such instalments during the year as he thinks fit.*
- 38. The parcel of land described in the First Schedule hereto is hereby set apart as an endowment for the College, but shall remain vested in His Majesty.

*The total income of the College from the Government before the cuts made in the grant on January 1st, 1922 and July 1st, 1922, was £11,500 exclusive of the National Endowment Grant.

39. The said parcel of land shall be held and administered as Crown lands under such of the leasing provisions of "The Land Act, 1892," as the Minister of Lands from time to time thinks fit; and the net rents and other proceeds derived therefrom and remaining after payment thereout of all necessary expenses attendant on the management and administration of the said land (including the expenses of survey and roading) shall, without further authority or appropriation than this Act, be paid over from time to time to the Council for the purposes of the College.

40. The parcel of land described in the Second Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be vested in the Council in trust as a site for University College buildings and as grounds appertaining thereto:

Provided that the said land shall be inalienable by sale, mortgage, lease, or otherwise.

41. The Council may grant leases of any land (other than the land described in the First and Second Schedules hereto) to which the corporation of the College at any time becomes entitled by way of purchase, grant, or otherwise, but may not without the previous consent of the Governor-in-Council sell or mortgage the same.

ACCOUNTS AND AUDIT.

42. The Audit Office shall be the auditor of the Council, and shall have the same duties and powers in respect of the moneys and accounts of the Council, and of persons dealing therewith, as if the Council were a local authority within the meaning of section six of "The Public Revenues Act, 1892."

43. Within ten days after the close of each financial year ending the thirty-first day of December,

the Council shall cause to be prepared and submitted to the Audit Office a statement of accounts showing—

- (a) The total receipts and disbursements for the year; and
- (b) Such other particulars as the Governorin-Council from time to time prescribes by regulations under this Act.

44. Such statement shall be audited by the Audit Office within ten days after receipt thereof, and shall, together with the certificate of the Audit Office and a general report as to the progress of the College, be forwarded by the Council to the Minister of Education within thirty days after the close of such year, to be by him laid before Parliament if sitting, or, if not, then within ten days after the commencement of the next session thereof.

GENERAL.

- 45. The Minister of Education shall be the Visitor of the College, and shall have all the powers and functions usually possessed by Visitors.
- 46. The Governor may from time to time, by Order-in-Council gazetted, make such regulations as he deems necessary in order to give full effect to the provisions of this Act relating to Queen's Scholarships.
- 47. The enactments mentioned in the Third Schedule hereto are hereby repealed.

SCHEDULES.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

All that piece or parcel of land situated in Blocks I. and V., Nukumaru Survey District, in the Wellington Provincial District, containing by admeasurement 4,000 acres, more or less: bounded towards the north by Blocks XIII., Momohaki Survey District, 14,500 links; towards the east by other part of Block I., Nukumaru Survey District, and by the Waitotara River, 38,600 links; towards the south-east by a Native reserve, 11,910 links; towards the south-west by a line, 3,500 links; and towards the west by Sections Nos. 13 and 11 in Block IX., and by Block IV., Wairoa Survey District, 33,073 links; be all the aforesaid linkages more or less: excepting therefrom the several roads which are included within the said area: as the same is delineated upon the plan deposited in the District Survey Office, Wellington.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

All that parcel of land in the City of Wellington, containing by admeasurement 5 acres 3 roods, more or less, being part of the Town Belt: bounded towards the east generally by Salamanca Road from Kelburne Parade to the northernmost corner of Hospital Reserve; thence by the said Hospital Reserve to a public road, 50 links wide, forming the northern boundary of the Roman Catholic Cemetery; thence by the said public road, 75 links; thence by a right line bearing south 22° 59' west, 460 links; thence towards the south generally by a right line bearing south 81° 40' west, 440 links, thence by a right line to the eastern side of Kelburne Parade; and thence towards the west by the said Kelburne Parade to Salamanca Road aforesaid.

Also all that parcel of land in the City of Wellington, containing by admeasurement 2 roods 23 perches, more or less, being Allotments Nos. 1, 2 and 3 shown on Plan No. 898 deposited in the Lands Registry Office at Wellington, and known as Hospital Reserve: bounded towards the north-east by Salamanca Road and Plantation Reserve; to-

wards the south-east by a public road 50 links wide; and towards the south-west and north-west by the Town Belt.

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
