






HISTORICAL NOTICE.

On the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and higher education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things, recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature to make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington.

For the maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and that the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate in-

come to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; that, if this were not practicable, the deficit in each case should be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand"; and provision was made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment. Certain members of the Council were appointed, but nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897, the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon, P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act! an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the 22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six scholarships each year, called "Queen's Scholarship," to persons of either sex under the age of 14 years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. In 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. By the Education Act Amendment

Act, 1907, the Queen's Scholarships were abolished. The Act of 1897 further set apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumaru Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appoint ment of four Professors for the Chairs of Classics, English Language and Literature, Chemistry and Physics, and Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and the following were appointed:—Classics, J. R. Brown, M.A., St. Andrews and Oxford; English Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A., St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A., Cambridge, Ph.D., Würzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D., Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun.

The Staff has since been increased by the foundation of Chairs in Modern Languages, Biology, Roman Law, etc., English and New Zealand Law, Mental and Moral Philosophy, Physics, Education, Economics, History, Geology and Agriculture.

The College was admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

SITE AND BUILDINGS.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, six acres in extent, and the Government provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings was erected, the foundation stone being laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904. They were opened by His Excellency Lord Plunket on the 30th March, 1906.

In March, 1910, a further portion of the buildings was completed, forming a wing at the rear of

the Arts Building. This wing contains two large class-rooms, and in the basement a men's cloak room, and common rooms for students.

In 1919, the Government made the College a grant for the north wing. This wing provides accommodation for the Library and the new School of Economics, and a new Women's Common Room and a new Tea Room.

The library contains a handsome stained glass window erected in memory of the students who fell in the War, 1914-1918.

In 1921 the Government made a further grant for the erection of the South Wing. This wing provided accommodation for the Physics and Geology Departments and freed additional space for Chemistry and Biology in the old Science Wing.

In 1905, the College received from Parliament an additional annual grant of £2,000 for specialisation in Law and Science.

In 1914, the Victoria College Amendment Act was passed, by which it was enacted that the name of the College should in future be the Victoria University College. Changes were made in the constitution of the Council and of the Professorial Board. In the same year by an amendment to the New Zealand University Act an increase of £3,000 was made in the annual grant, and all the grants from the Government were consolidated into one annual grant of £9,000; further, the College was allotted a share of the National Endowment grant, part of which (amounting in 1925 to £2,083) comes direct from the Government, while a second part (amounting in 1925 to £1,040) is paid through the New Zealand University. Of this last sum £300 is set apart for Workers' Educational Classes.

In 1923, a short amending Act was passed which gave the Council power to levy its own Class fees without the previous approval of the Governor-in-Council. It also provided for a change in the date

of the end of the Financial Year from March 31st to December 31st, and for a change in the date of the Annual Meeting of the Council from the May Meeting to the July Meeting.

In 1919, an amending Act to the New Zealand University Act was passed, in which it was enacted that from April 1st, 1920, the annual grant to this College should be increased by $\pounds 2,500$.

In 1915, the Trustees of the late T. G. Macarthy made a grant of £10,000, for the purpose of establishing a School of Economics, to be called "The T. G. Macarthy School of Economics." The foundation of the Chair was, however, delayed owing to the war. The Chair was founded in 1920 by the appointment of Professor B. E. Murphy.

In the same year, under the will of the late Sarah Anne Rhodes, the sum of £10,000 was left to the Council for the education of women.

In 1921 the Council arranged with the S. A. Rhodes Trustees to grant either a Sarah Anne Rhodes Fellowship, or a Sarah Anne Rhodes Scholarship, and alternative sets of regulations were drawn up. The first scholarship was awarded in 1921 to Miss Eleanor A. Pope, B.Sc.

The first Fellowship was awarded to Miss E. A. Pope in 1925.

In 1923 Sir Walter Buchanan made a donation of £10,000 to found a Chair of Agriculture. The Chair was filled by the appointment of Professor G. S. Peren, B.S.A., Toronto.

Upon the establishment of the Massey Agricultural College in 1927 the Victoria University College Council agreed to hand over the income derived from the Buchanan Trust funds to that College, and Professor G. S. Peren resigned his Chair having been appointed Principal of the Massey College.

In 1926, by the will of the late W. Weir, a sum estimated at £60,000 was left to the College to provide and maintain a hostel for men students.

The Council has leased from the Wellington Hospital Board a very fine site overlooking the harbour and adjoining Kelburn Park on which it is proposed to proceed with the erection of one or more hostels as soon as the money from the bequest becomes available. This will be some time in 1929.

In 1928 by an amendment of the N.Z. University Act, the statutory grant was increased from £10,600 to £11,750.

COLLEGE LIBRARY.

The College Library is maintained by an annual grant of £425 out of the College funds. At present it contains about 18,000 volumes, and subscribes for rather more than sixty periodicals.

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WORKERS' EDUCATIONAL CLASSES.

In 1915, the Council, in co-operation with the Workers' Educational Association, established three classes in Wellington. The movement has now grown considerably, and in 1928 thirty-eight full tutorial classes and twelve study circles and short courses were being conducted in different parts of the Victoria University District.

A permanent Tutor (Mr. A. E. Mander) for the East Coast (Hawke's Bay and Wairarapa), and West Coast districts (Taranaki and Manawatu) has been appointed, who lectures to several classes in each district.

The Council has appointed Professor T. A. Hunter as Director of Studies.

Note.—Terms will be granted only in subjects mentioned above.

The College year shall consist of three Terms: the First Term to begin about the middle of March and to end about May 15th; the Second Term to begin about May 31st and to end about August 21st; the Third Term to begin about September 6th and to end about the end of October.

The College examinations begin about October 15th.

MATRICULATION.

To matriculate a student must pass the Matriculation Examination and make the following declaration:—"I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Statutes of the University, so far as they apply to me, and I hereby declare that I believe myself to have attained the age of sixteen years."

No examination passed by any student before he has made this declaration can count towards the keeping of terms or the qualifying for a Degree.

The last day for making the Declaration is June 1st, provided that upon payment of a late-fee of $\pounds 1$ 1s. Od. the declaration may be made not later than July 1st.

SUPERVISION OF COURSES.

The Professorial Board supervises the courses of all new students. Before enrolment in classes a record of the proposed course of study, signed by the Chairman of the Professorial Board, or by the Dean of one of the Faculties (of Arts, Science, or Law), must be in the hands of the Registrar. In the case of a student proceeding to one of the University degrees, this record shall state the complete course of study proposed for that degree; and subsequent departures (if any) from such proposed courses must be similarly recorded.

TERMS.

The subjects in which the keeping of terms is necessary are:—All subjects for B.A., B.Sc., and LL.B. Degrees, certain of the subjects for B.Com., all the subjects of the Engineering Entrance and of the Medical Intermediate.

No examination will be held nor terms granted except in subjects taught in the College (see list above).

INTERNAL STUDENTS.

To keep terms in any subject an internal student must

(a) Have his name on the books of the College:

(b) Do the Class work and Class examinations to the satisfaction of the Professor; provided that in exceptional circumstances the Professor may allow him to keep terms by passing the examination provided for external students.

For keeping Terms in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geology or Geography, the Practical

COLLEGE REGULATIONS

Examination or performance of a practical course to the satisfaction of the instructor shall be deemed to be a part of the College Examination; and, unless specially exempted by the Science Faculty, **a** student presenting himself for an Examination in any of these subjects for the purpose of keeping Terms must do the practical work in that subject in the year in which he so presents himself.

ATTENDANCE.

To fulfil the attendance requirement in a subject a student must, except in cases approved of by the Professorial Board, attend not less than 90% of the lectures in that subject.

REGULATIONS UNDER SECTION VII. OF STATUTE

"BACHELOR OF SCIENCE."

Candidates shall be tested on translation of a passage written in a prescribed foreign language and dealing with the subject or subjects offered at the Advanced stage.

Candidates are required to present themselves for examination in the first term of the second year of the Advanced course. In case of failure a candidate may submit himself for re-examination in the second term of the second year of his Advanced course.

EXTERNAL (*Exempted*) STUDENTS.

Exemption from lectures is provided for under certain conditions (see Calendar, N.Z. University, 1929, p. 23).

To keep terms in any subject an external student must:----

(a) Obtain exemption from lectures and pay an exemption fee of $\pounds 1$ 1s. not later than May 1st, except with late fee of $\pounds 1$ 1s. up to September 30th.

(b) Pay examination fees ($\pounds 1$ 1s per subject) not later than July 10th, except with late fee of $\pounds 1$ 1s. up to September 30th.

(c) Pass in the subject at the Annual College Examinations.

Note.—An additional fee of $\pounds 1/1/$ - is required from exempted students who desire to be examined in Oral French.

Note.—These fees will be charged subject to the N.Z. University Council approving the recommendation of the Academic Board that the Annual College Examinations for exempted students be revived this year. Otherwise the Annual exemption fee of £3 3s. will be retained (see 1928 Calendar).

ACADEMIC YEARS.

A student may sit for a section of a degree at the end of his first year but may not sit for his final examination until he has completed at least three years work to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.

DISCIPLINE.

Every student attending lectures at Victoria University College shall be required to sign the following declaration and no student shall have his or her name placed on the College books until this declaration is signed:

"I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Regulations of Victoria University College, so far as they apply to me."

The Board has full disciplinary powers over the conduct of all students within the College, the Gymnasium, the College grounds and at all ceremonies and meetings wherever held, conducted under the auspices of the College Council, the Professorial Board, the Students' Association, or any of the College Clubs or Societies, and in other cases when the Board considers that the interests of the College or of students are affected.

Students whose work or attendance is unsatisfactory may be excluded from College Classes for the remainder of the Session by the Professorial Board.

COLLEGE REGULATIONS

STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION FEE.

Every student attending lectures shall each year on enrolment pay to the Registrar the sum of $\pounds 1/1/$ -, which sum shall be paid into a Consolidated Fund in the name of the Students' Association; provided that any student in whose case payment may involve hardship may appeal to the Professorial Board for exemption or for reduction of same; provided further that the Council may direct the Registrar to withhold any sum necessary to pay for damage done in the Students' Common Rooms or Cloak Rooms.

Upon payment of this sum the student shall ipso facto become a member of the Students' Association and shall also be entitled to become on written application and without any further payment a member of all College clubs and societies provided he agrees to abide by their constitutions and rules.

Note.—Students taking only one half-course shall not be required to pay the above fee.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS.

1. In the case of disorderly conduct or any breach of the regulations the Librarian may, and in serious cases shall, report the person so offending to the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Any person so reported, if found guilty of any breach of the Regulations, shall be reprimanded and may be excluded from the use of the Library or dealt with in such other way as the Professorial Board may direct.

HOURS.

2. During the Session the Library shall be open to readers from 9 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. with an interval of an hour at mid-day on all week days except Saturdays, when it shall be open from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

3. The Library shall be closed on Sundays, on public holidays, and at such other times as the Professorial Board may direct.

4. Regulations will be issued from time to time for the use of the Library during recess.

ADMISSION FOR READING PURPOSES.

5. The following persons shall be entitled to use the Library for reading purposes:—

- (a) Members of the College Council.
- (b) Members of the Teaching Staff.
- (c) Students who have paid the College fee for the current year.
- (d) Graduates of any University, and persons engaged in Research work, and any other persons; provided that in every case permission shall have been granted by the Library Committee of the Professorial Board.

Note.—Persons using the Library under (c) and (d) shall every session first present to the Librarian a Library card for the current year, to be obtained from the Registrar.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS

CONDUCT OF READERS IN THE LIBRARY.

- 6. (a) The use of pens and ink in the Library is strictly prohibited except at tables provided for the purpose.
 - (b) Silence must be observed in the Library.
 - (c) Communications with other readers should be avoided: applications for information, etc., should be made to the Librarian.

7. No books are to be removed from the Library except as provided in Regulations 10, 11 and 12.

8. Books removed from the shelves by readers must be left on the tables in the reading rooms. except Periodicals, Dictionaries, Encyclopedias and Law reports, which shall be replaced in the shelves.

9. Readers are particularly cautioned against injuring books belonging to the Library by writing in the margin, marking or turning down the leaves, or otherwise disfiguring them.

BORROWING BOOKS.

10. Members of the College Council and the Professors and Lecturers of the College may borrow any volumes provided:

- (a) That entry of each volume so borrowed be made, dated, and signed, by the borrower, in the Ledger provided for the purpose.
- (b) That volumes specified in Regulation 13 be retained by borrowers not longer than one week, and that no volume be retained for more than two months except during the long vacation.

11. Any other member of the Staff may borrow volumes except those volumes specified in Regulation 13, provided:

(a) That entry be made as in Regulation 10.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS

(b) That not more than 5 volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than one month except during the long vacation.

12. Any other person privileged under Regulation 5 for reading purposes may on application to the Librarian borrow books at hours notified on the Library notice-board, provided:

- (a) That a deposit of One Guinea be made with the Librarian which shall be returned to the depositor when he ceases to avail himself of the privilege of borrowing books provided he has returned undamaged all books borrowed by him: provided that a Professor's written voucher shall be accepted in lieu of a deposit of One Guinea.
- (b) That not more than two volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than 14 days: provided that on the written request of a Professor or of an Independent Lecturer any Honours or Research student or student doing work at Stage III. may take out five volumes at one time, no volume to be retained for more than one month.

13. Save as provided in Regulation 10, encyclopædias, dictionaries, law reports, prose translations of the classics, books containing valuable engravings, works with loose plates or maps, periodicals which have been less than a fortnight in the Library, may not be borrowed from the Library. Provided, always without prejudice to Regulation 10, that text-books prescribed for the current year, and books listed as specially in demand, may be withheld, lent, or recalled by the Librarian. A book so recalled must be returned within three days.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS

14. A Request Book shall be provided in which the names of those wishing to obtain books in circulation, the titles of the books and the date of request may be entered. Any book which has been entered in the request book shall be returned on the demand of the Librarian within three days.

15. The borrower shall be liable for any damage a book may have sustained whilst in his keeping.

16. No book belonging to the Library shall be privately lent by any borrower, except those specified in Regulation 10.

17. All books and publications of every kind shall be returned on or before February 1st in each year, and during the eight days immediately following the Library shall be closed; provided that members of the staff who desire to retain books in their possession during this period may do so on furnishing a list of such books to the Librarian on or before February 1st, and that members of the staff may also borrow books during the same period on application to the Librarian.

NOTE.—Reciprocal arrangements have been made with the Wellington Philosophical Society, whereby Students of the College can visit the library of that Society and consult books and periodicals, on production of a card from the College Librarian. Current numbers of Mind, Psychological Bulletin and Review, International Journal of Ethics and Journal of Educational Psy-chology should be consulted at the Public Library.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

Professor Mackenzie. Mr. A. B. Cochran.

ENGLISH I.

Hours of meeting:-Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at 5 p.m. Tuesdays, 7 to 8 p.m.

The work of the Class will cover the ground prescribed for Pass B.A., and LL.B. candidates taking English.

The Prescription:-

1. English I. (Two papers) :--

(a) (1) The history and structure of the English language; elementary phonetics and either (i.) a knowledge of the elements of Anglo-Saxon, such as might be acquired by the use of Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, translation and explanation of easy sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose, and passages of early standard English, to test the candidate's knowledge of the history of forms and inflections; the sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose to be taken from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, and the passages of Early English to be taken from the following sections of Sisam's "Fourteenth Century Verse and Prose" (Edition with glossary I., III., IV.B., IV.C., VI., VIII.A., IX., X., XI.A. XII.B., XIII., XV., XVIII; or (ii.) additional selected works by one or more authors. (2) Selected portions of the works of one or more authors.

(b) (1) A short essay on some subject arising out of the works selected under (a) (2) An account of some period of literature and its connection with the general history of the period. In the period special attention must be paid to the authors indicated but the other authors in the period are not to be neglected. The literary movements and their leaders, the current types and forms of literature and their representatives, as well as the influence of the ancient classics and of the leading Continental literatures on the English literature of the period, must also be examined. Great importance is

attacced to composition. General outlines of English Literature including a knowledge and appreciation of the thought and style of standard English authors from Shakespeare to Tennyson.

1929. Shakespeare-Merchant of Venice, Julius Caesar; Gray-Poems; Goldsmith-Deserted Village; Johnson-Life of Swift; Gibbon-Autobiography.

Period: 1744 to 1798-Johnson, Burke, Gibbon, Goldsmith, Collins, Gray, Crabbe, Burns and Cowper.

Additional selected works under (a) 1 (ii.):-

1929. Johnson-Rasselas; Burke-American Speeches; Crabbe-The Village; Cowper-The Task, Books I.-III.; Stevenson-Familiar Studies of Men and Books.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays, at 6 to 7 p.m. and on Wednesdays and Mondays, 7 to 8 p.m. Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose and Sight Translation, and lectures are delivered at intervals.

GREEK II. AND III. AND HONOURS CLASS.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Stages II. and III. and Honours. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

GREEK HISTORY, ART AND LITERATURE.

Mondays and Wednesdays, 11 to 12 a.m. and Tuesdays and Fridays 2 to 3 p.m.

This class deals with the subject as defined in the University Calendar as a Stage I. Subject for the Arts Degree, and is intended for students who desire to gain some knowledge of Greek life and thought without acquiring familiarity with the Greek language. The set books are studied in approved translations, and as far as possible the lectures will be illustrated by means of slides.

(i.) Greek History down to the end of the Peloponnesian War with a knowledge of the constitutions of Athens and Sparta.

(iv.) General knowledge of Greek Literature and special study of selected authors and set books.

ORAL CERTIFICATE.

In connection with the requirements of the University, an oral examination in French will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Nicholson—Introduction to French Phonetics is recommended.

A. Stage I or II.—A course of experiments in the qualitative problems of sensation, perception, mental imagery, association, memory, action, attention, feeling.

Economics, descriptive and analytic, with special reference to New Zealand conditions; covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the Commercial Accountants' Examination, the B.A. and B.Com. degrees (Economics I), the Diplomas in Journalism, Banking and Social Science, and those reading Economics for general information. Three lectures per week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5 to 6 p.m., and Fridays 7 to 8 p.m. Should a sufficient number of students desire it, a tutorial class will be conducted by Dr. Heine on Wednesdays, 7 to 8 p.m.

ADVANCED CLASSES.

It will also cover the requirements of Advanced Economics and International Trade as defined for the B.Com. degree. Three lectures per week, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m.

Two lectures per week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 6 to 7 p.m. This class will cover the work prescribed for the B.Com. degree, the Diplomas in Social Science and Banking, and portion of the work for Economics II. B. and Honours. Reading will be prescribed as required. Prior to joining the class students should possess such an elementary knowledge of Economic History as would be obtained by the perusal of Townsend Warner: Landmarks in English Industrial History, or Waters: Economic History of England. (b) The economic history of Imperialism in the 19th and 20th centuries, with special reference to the British Empire, covering, in conjunction with class (a), the requirements of Honours in Arts. One lecture per week, on Mondays, 5 to 6 p.m., or such other hour as may be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned. Reading will be prescribed as required.

COURSE C. (Dr. Heine).

ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY.—A general treatment, covering, and confined to, the requirements of the B.Com. degree and the Diploma in Banking. One lecture per week, on Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m., with an additional lecture if required on Wednesdays, 5 to 6 p.m. during the second half of the session.

One lecture per week, at an hour to be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned. Thursdays, 10 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. Students unable to attend at these hours may carry out the work at some other period by arrangement with the professor.

3. ADVANCED COURSE.

PHYSICS.

Professor Florance. Miss Marwick.

I. PASS CLASSES.

These classes cover the work prescribed for the Pass B.A. and B.Sc., (Stage I.), Medical Intermediate and Engineering Preliminary Syllabuses.

A—Lectures twice weekly on General Physics, Properties of Matter, Heat, Sound and Light; Monday and Wednesday 10 to 11 a.m.

B-Lectures twice weekly on General Physics, Properties of Matter, Electricity and Magnetism; Tuesday and Friday 9 to 10 a.m.

C-Practical work.

- (a) Tuesday and Friday 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. or
- (b) Wednesday, 2 to 5 p.m., and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

An additional class will be held on Monday 7 to 10 p.m. for students who can attend only one daytime period.

D—Acoustics for students preparing for the Mus. B. Degree.

Students are required to pass certain test examinations on theoretical Physics, to complete the prescribed course of experiments and to pass a practical examination. Students are also required to keep neat and concise, but adequate, notes of their experimental work; these will be marked very week.

Intending students, particularly those who wish ultimately to take "Advanced" Physics are recommended to consult the Professor before the commencement of the classes. It is advisable that students doing the Advanced Physics course should also do Pure Mathematics at least to Stage II.

II. ADVANCED CLASSES.

These classes cover the work prescribed for Physics (Stage III) of the B.A. and B.Sc. Degrees, and extend over two years. Times to be arranged.

A-Three lectures weekly in alternate years on Heat, Sound and Light.

B-Three lectures weekly in alternate years on General Physics, Electricity and Magnetism.

C-Practical work. Students must do at least 6 hours practical work per week.

D-Applied Physics. Students taking this course must either be attending or have already attended the ordinary advanced course in Physics. Times and books to be arranged.

The laboratory is well equipped for certain classes of original investigation and every facility possible will be afforded to those who undertake research work.

V. MATHEMATICAL AND PHYSICAL SOCIETY.

Subjects of a mathematical and physical nature are discussed at the fortnightly meetings. All students of the Physics Department are invited to attend.

GEOGRAPHY (for B.A.)

Two half-courses, as under, are arranged for students preparing for the B.A. pass examination.

PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY.

Professor Cotton.

Lecture hours: Mendays and Wednesdays, 5 to 6 p.m.

Three hours a week must be spent at practical work, which may be done on Saturdays (9 a.m. to 12 noon).

This course will serve as an introduction to the subject, and will prepare for the B.A. or B.Sc. examination.

Five hours a week should be spent at practical work.

BOTANY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. Every student should come to lectures with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary studies have not removed. It is part of the duty of the teachers to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

TEXT-BOOKS.—It is obligatory to have Parker's Lessons in Elementary Biology, and Johnson's Note Book for Practical Botany, or Bower and Vaughan's Practical Botany for Beginners; and one of the following: Strasburger's Text Book of Botany, (3rd or later English edition); Miss A. S M. Johnston's Botany, Mudge and Maslen's Class Book of Botany; or Bower's Botany of the Living Plant. It is very desirable, indeed almost necessary, that Senior students at least should have Dendy's Evolutionary Biology and Cockayne's New Zealand Plants and their Story.

Instruments—All students must provide themselves with the following instruments at least, a razor for section-cutting, a pair of mounted needles and a pair of forceps with fine points. It is very desirable that every student should have a pocket lens. Students that have not Johnson's Note Book must have a laboratory drawing-book, with alternate pages ruled for notes.

ADVANCED AND HONOURS CLASSES—There will generally be two lectures a week and at least one discussions class a week. It is necessary that students attending these classes should have Strasburger's Botany and Dendy's Evolutionary Biology.

Students of Botany, whether formally attached to the College or not, may obtain from the Professor permission to refer to the late Mr. T. Kirk's herbarium of New Zealand Flowering Plants, and to the late Dr. Knight's herbarium of Lichens (presented to the college by Mrs. Knight).

ZOOLOGY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. Every student should come to lecture with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary studies have not removed. It is part of the duty of the teachers to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

TEXT BOOKS-It is obligatory to have Thomson's Outlines of Zoology, Marshall and Hurst's Practical Zoology and Marshall's Frog. It is highly desirable that every student should have also Dendy's Evolutionary Biology and Hewitt's House Flies and How they Spread Disease.

ADVANCED AND HONOURS CLASSES—Honours Students must have Parker and Haswell's Zoology (2nd or later Edition), and should consult the Professor about other books.

Students should supply themselves with the following appliances:—A drawing book with alternate pages ruled for notes. Two pencils—one hard and one soft. Dissecting instruments—scissors, forceps, scalpels (2), mounted needles, seeker, razor with straight edge (better not hollow-ground), pecket magnifying-glass.

BURSARIES.

Two types of Bursaries are awarded to Students under certain conditions.

The fees of both types of Bursaries are paid up to the value of £20 per annum.

(1) UNIVERSITY BURSARIES.

These are awarded to holders of higher leaving certificates or to students who have passed the Entrance Scholarship Examination with credit provided they are under 19 years of age on December 1st in the year preceding the application (University Calendar, p. 42).

Forms of application may be obtained from the Registrar and should be applied for early in the session.

(2) EDUCATIONAL BURSARIES.

These are awarded by the Education Department to holders of a trained teacher's certificate or of a teacher's certificate of a class not lower than Class C.

Forms of application, which may be obtained from the Registrar, must be in the hands of the Senior Inspector of the District <u>on or before 1st</u> March.

Bursars who are compelled by ill-health or for any other reason to cease attendance at any class or classes should communicate at once with the Registrar. Omission to do so may involve loss of their Bursary.

SIR GEORGE GREY SCHOLARSHIP. (Subject to the granting of a vote by Parliament).

REGULATIONS.

1. The Scholarship shall be open to students, whether graduates or undergraduates, who have pursued successfully a Science course of an advanced standard and who have not completed their fourth academic year on 1st October of the year in which the Scholarship is awarded.

2. The subjects of examination shall comprise not less than two nor more than three of those prescribed for the B.Sc. course, and at least one of such shall be taken at the advanced grade.

3. The Scholarship shall be awarded by the Professorial Board on the basis of the College examinations in conjunction with the practical work done by the candidates throughout their course.

4. The Scholar must attend a course of lectures and do practical work to the approval of the Professorial Board.

5. The Scholarship shall not be tenable with any other scholarship or exhibition.

6. The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable for one year.

7. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first about August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled. Payments shall be subject to a favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Dean of the Science Faculty.

8. Candidates must apply in writing to the Registrar not later than the 20th of September.

JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

The late Mr. Jacob Joseph bequeathed a sum of £3,000 to Victoria College, in the year 1905, for the foundation of Scholarships. On this foundation two Scholarships of £60, tenable for one year, are open for award annually, under the following regulations:

1. The Scholarships shall be open to students (either men or women) :---

- (i.) Whose year of matriculation is not more than five years prior to the year of the award---except in the case of Law students, for whom the corresponding interval shall be seven years:
- (ii.) Who have studied at Victoria College for at least two years, and have completed an Honours course thereat to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.
- (iii.) Who have been certified by the University of New Zealand to have attained to the standard of Honours.

2. Preference, *ceteris paribus*, shall be shown to students of Law and Experimental Science (including Mental and Moral Philosophy, provided that evidence of sufficient Laboratory work be forthcoming.)

3. The Scholarships shall be awarded on evidence of capacity to undertake original work.

4. The tenure of the Scholarships shall be subject to the following conditions:---

- (i.) A scholar shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.
- (ii.) He shall submit to the Professorial Board a thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that thesis, and specifically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a copy of this thesis for the College Library.

5. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first on August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled, but the second instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award. Payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Professorial Board.

6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by May 1st.

7. The holding of another scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.

8. In the event of no scholarship or only one scholarship being awarded in any year, additional scholarships may be awarded in any subsequent year.

NATIONAL RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS.

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the National Research Scholarship Regulations, 1927.

2. (1.) Not more than four National Research Scholarships may be awarded in any year in accordance with section 12 of the said Act and with these regulations.

(2.) Such scholarships shall be awarded only to graduates of the New Zealand University and to other suitable persons approved for the purpose by the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (hereinafter referred to as the Council).

3. (1.) Application for the award of a National Research Scholarship shall be made to the Council by writing addressed to the Permanent Secretary of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, at Wellington, not later in any year than the 14th day of February: Provided that the Council may, in its discretion and in special cases, receive any application after the said date in any year, and may award to the applicant a scholarship for that year.

(2.) Every application for a scholarship under these regulations shall specify with reasonable particularity the nature of the investigation or research proposed to be undertaken by the applicant in the event of a scholarship being awarded him.

(3.) Every application shall be supported by one or more certificates signed by a Professor of the University of New Zealand or some other suitable person, to the effect that in the option of the person by whom such certificate is given, the applicant is a fit and proper person to undertake the proposed investigation or research and to be holder of a scholarship under these regulations.

4. (1.) Every scholarship granted under these regulations shall be of the value of $\pounds 180$ per annum, to be paid by equal quarterly instalments.

(2.) In addition to the aforesaid amount, not more than $\pounds 25$ in the aggregate may be paid to the holder of a scholarship for the purchase of books or apparatus specially required for the purpose of carrying out any investigation or research, and towards the cost of locomotion while engaged thereon.

(3.) All books or apparatus purchased as aforesaid shall be and remain the property of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research.

5. (1.) Every scholarship granted under these regulations shall be tenable for one year, but may be withdrawn at any time if the Council is satisfied that the holder has failed to comply with the terms and conditions on which the same has been awarded.

(2.) Without limiting the number of new scholarships that may be awarded in any year, the term of any scholarship may, with the approval of the Minister, be extended for not more than one year.

6. (1.) The work of investigation or research in connection with a scholarship granted under these regulations shall be carried out at a University college or other institution or place approved for the purpose by the Council, and in accordance with such conditions as the Council may impose.

(2.) Except in special cases and with the consent of the Council the holder of a scholarship shall not engage in any work or occupation not associated with the investigation or research for the purposes of which the scholarship was granted.

7. The holder of the scholarship shall be required to furnish to the Council a quarterly report as to the progress of his investigation or research. Such report

shall be accompanied by a certificate from a Professor of the University or other approved person to the effect that the holder of the scholarship has worked to his satisfaction and in conformity with the terms of the scholarship.

8. (1.) The holder of a scholarship shall not be entitled to claim payment of the final instalment of the value of the scholarship unless and until he has furnish a detailed report in a form suitable for publication of the results of his investigation or research.

(2.) The bolder of the scholarship shall not publish or furnish for publication any report as to the nature, progress, or results of his investigation or research except with the consent of the Council.

SARAH ANNE RHODES FELLOWSHIP AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

[The funds for the purposes are derived from a bequest by Mrs. S. A. Rhodes.]

REGULATIONS FOR SARAH ANNE RHODES FELLOWSHIP IN HOME SCIENCE.

1. One "Sarah Anne Rhodes Research Fellowship in Home Science," may be offered by the Council of the Victoria University College.

2. The Fellowship shall be open to women graduates of the University of New Zealand or of any other university approved by the Council of Victoria University College.

3. The Fellowship shall be of the value of £400 per annum together with travelling expenses approved by the Council, and shall be tenable for two years. The emolument shall be paid monthly.

4. The Fellow shall undertake research work in some problem of Home Science connected with New Zealand and approved by the Victoria University College Council.

5. The Fellow shall forward to the Council of Victoria University College half-yearly reports on the progress of her research, and the final report on the subject of her research shall be presented in a form suitable for publication.

6. The Council of Victoria University College may require the Fellow to deliver short courses of lectures in one or more of the University Colleges in New Zealand.

7. The Council of Victoria University College may terminate a Fellowship if the Fellow is guilty of misconduct or of the neglect of the duties of the Fellowship.

8. A Fellow is required to devote herself wholly to the objects of the Fellowship and is forbidden to hold any position of emolument, except by the permission of the Victoria University College Council.

9. The date of application for a Fellowship shall be advertised by the Council of Victoria University College.

REGULATIONS FOR SARAH ANNE RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS IN HOME SCIENCE.

1. One or more "Sarah Anne Rhodes Scholarships in Home Science" may be offered, as the Council of the Victoria University College has directed.

2. Candidates for the Scholarships must be women who have been resident in New Zealand not less than twelve months and who have kept terms in two subjects at Victoria University College, preference being given to candidates who have kept terms in Botany or Zoology or Chemistry or Physics.

3. A Scholarship shall be tenable for two years, provided that a Scholarship may be withdrawn if the scholar fails to do satisfactory work.

4. A scholar must carry out a course of study in Home Science in a university approved by the Council of Victoria University College.

- 5. The emolument of the Scholarship shall be:f:25 per annum if the scholar pursues her
 - studies in New Zealand.
 - £250 per annum if the scholar pursues her studies in a country other than New Zealand.

6. Payments of the emolument shall be made

quarterly in advance, but the Council may reserve a portion of the last payment until a final satisfactory report is obtained.

7. A scholar is required to furnish half-yearly reports on her work, and such reports shall be accompanied by a certificate from the Professor or Director of the University Department in which the scholar has studied that the work has been done to his satisfaction.

8. A scholar is required to devote herself wholly to the objects of the Scholarship and is forbidden to hold any position of emolument, except by permission of the Council of the Victoria University College.

9. Applications for Scholarships must be in the hands of the Registrar of Victoria University College not later than 30th September in any year. With her application a candidate must forward an outline of her proposed course of study in Home Science and the name of the university in which she desires to pursue it.

10. Candidates shall be required to make a declaration that it is their intention to return to New Zealand at the termination of their Scholarships.

11. Under exceptional circumstances the Council may extend the term of any Scholarship or make a grant for any special expenses of a scholar.

FARMERS' UNION SCHOLARSHIP.

In 1924 a sum of $\pounds1,055$ was received from Sir James Wilson for the foundation of a Scholarship to be known as "The Farmers' Union Scholarship." On this foundation a Research Scholarship of $\pounds100$ is open for award annually under the following regulations: —

1. The Scholarship shall be tenable for the period of one year. The Council, however, shall have power to extend the tenancy in any case where it deems it advisable to do so.

2. The Scholarship shall be open to graduates of any University in the British Empire who are resident in New Zealand, and who have given satisfactory evidence of capacity to undertake original work.

Under special circumstances the Scholarship may, in the discretion of the Council, be granted to an undergraduate of the New Zealand University.

3. The Scholarship shall be held at the Massey Agricultural College.

4. The tenure of the Scholarship shall be subject to the following conditions.

- (i.) A scholar shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation bearing on Agriculture to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.
- (ii.) He shall submit to the Professorial Board a Thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that Thesis, and specifically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the

extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a copy of this Thesis for the Agricultural Section of the College Library.

5. Scholars shall receive payment in three equal instalments, the first on August 1st, the second on December 1st, and the third when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled, but the third instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award. Payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the scholar by the Professorial Board.

6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by March 15th.

7. The holding of another Scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Farmers' Union Scholarship.

8. In the absence of a suitable candidate, the total annual income accruing from the capital invested may, at the discretion of the Council of the College, be utilised for the purchase of apparatus or equipment, or to assist in any other way research work undertaken by the Staff of the School of Agriculture.

THE LISSIE RATHBONE SCHOLARSHIPS.

(The Lissie Rathbone Scholarships were established in 1925 by the Trustees of her will, she having bequeathed one half of her residuary estate for such Charitable, Educational or Religious objects as the Trustees should select. The Trustees have allotted £3,000 to Victoria University College, the income from which is to be applied to Scholarships.)

In pursuance of powers vested in the Council by the Trustees the following regulations are prescribed to govern the award and tenure of the Scholarships in this University College:

1. There shall be offered in each year one or more Lissie Rathbone Scholarships, as the funds will admit.

2. Election to the Scholarship shall be made by the Council of the Victoria University College.

3. The annual value of each Scholarship shall be not less than £50.

4. The tenure of each Scholarship shall be for three years, terminable however at any time if the Council, having received from the Professorial Board an unfavourable report of the conduct or progress of the scholar, shall so determine.

5. Candidates for each Scholarship

- (i.) Must be under nineteen years of age on the first day of December immediately preceding the date of the award of the Scholarship.
- (ii.) May be of either sex.
- (iii.) Must be resident for one year preceding the award in the Victoria University District.
- (iv.) Must state their willingness to pursue as internal students of Victoria University College a course for a degree within the award of the New Zealand University from time to time (subject to such regulations as

may be consistent with the object of the Scholarship) which may be selected by such scholar, his parents or guardians.

6. Each Scholarship shall be awarded upon examination for excellence in the subjects of English and History. Provided that the Council shall not be bound to award the Scholarship to the candidate obtaining the highest number of marks in such subjects, but may in its discretion take into account the financial circumstances of the scholar, his parents or guardians.

7. The examination in which the award shall be made shall be the examination presented by the University of New Zealand for the award of its Entrance Scholarships, the examination papers used being those set in English and History for that examination. If, however, there shall at any time cease to be an Entrance Scholarship examination, or if there shall cease to be examination papers set in either English or History for the Entrance Scholarships, the examination in which such award shall be made shall be such other examination in English and History as the Council may from time to time appoint.

8. This Scholarship shall not be tenable with a "University Entrance Scholarship. No candidate shall be awarded a Scholarship whose aggregate marks do not reach 50 per cent. of the possible total.

9. Candidates for the Lissie Rathbone Scholarships need not be candidates for an Entrance Scholarship to the University.

10. In the event of the accumulated earnings of the gift being in excess of the amount required for scholarships awarded under Clause I., the Council may either grant boarding allowance to any scholar needing it, or make a grant to any student, who, though he or she has not qualified in

the Entrance Examination in the subjects prescribed for the Scholarship, has obtained at the College examinations of his first year a high class in the two subjects, English and History. In the event of the accumulated earnings of the gift proving at any time insufficient for all or any of the purposes above set forth the Council may adjust the annual value of any scholarship or the tenure thereof as the Council shall see fit from time to time.

11. Every candidate for the Scholarship shall send notice of his or her candidature on the prescribed form not later than 1st October. Entries shall be made in duplicate, one copy, accompanied by entry fee 10/6d., to be sent to the Registrar of the University of New Zealand, and the other copy to the Registrar, Victoria University College.

Note.—Late entry allowed up to 22nd October on receipt of late fee of £2 2s. 0d.

Forms of entry may be obtained on application to the Registrar, Victoria University College.

12. Payments shall be made in two instalments, the first in the month of July and the second in the month of November. Payments shall be subject to the recommendation of the Professorial Board.

13. In cases approved by the Council scholars may be permitted to transfer to another University College.

4. The tenure of the scholarship shall be subject to the following conditions:

(i.) The scholarship will not be awarded to any student who, in the case of Arts and Science, has been matriculated for more than four years, and in the case of Law and Commerce has been matriculated for more than five years.

(ii.) The scholar shall proceed to a higher degree at Victoria University College and pursue a course of study to the satisfaction of the Board.

1. The Bursary shall be of the annual value of approximately £5.

2. The bursary shall be awarded annually in the month of October.

4. The Bursar shall be selected by the Professorial Board which shall have regard to (i.) qualities of leadership, (ii.) debating powers, (iii.) moral force of character, (iv.) fondness for and success in outdoor sports, (v.) literary and scholastic attainments.

5. The Bursar shall as a condition of holding the bursary undertake at Victoria University College in the year following the award a course of study approved by the Board, and prosecute her studies to the satisfaction of the Board.

6. The Bursary shall not be awarded more than once to the same person.

THE VICTORIA COLLEGE ACT, 1905.

[As amended by the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907, the Queen's Scholarship Act, 1906, the Victoria College Act Amendment Act, 1914, and the Victoria College Amendment Act, 1923.]

An Act to consolidate certain Enactments of the General Assembly relating to Victoria College.

[27th October, 1905.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The short Title of this Act is "The Victoria College Act, 1905."

THE COLLEGE.

2. There is hereby established in the City of Wellington a college connected with the New Zealand University, to be called "the Victoria College."

THE CORPORATION.

3. The Council of the College, its professors and lecturers, and the graduates and undergraduates of the New Zealand University, whose names are on the books, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate under the style of "the Victoria University College," by which style that corporation shall have perpetual succession and a common seal.

THE COUNCIL.

4. The corporation shall act by a governing body, to be called "the Victoria University College Council" (elsewhere throughout this Act referred to as "the Council.")

5. The Council shall be constituted as follows:---

(a) A group of two members appointed by the Governor:

- (b) A group of two members appointed by the Professorial Board of the College:
- (c) A group of four members elected by the District Court of Convocation of the Victoria University District as defined by the New Zealand University Act, 1908:
- (d) One member appointed by the Wellington City Council:
- (e) A group of two members elected by the members of the Education Boards of education districts wholly or partly within the Victoria University District:
- f) One member elected by the governing bodies of the secondary schools as defined by section eighty-nine of the Education Act, 1908, in the Victoria University District:
- (g) A group of two members elected by the teachers in public schools in the Victoria University District holding certificates of competency under section fifty-four of the Education Act, 1908:
- (h) One member elected by those teachers in secondary schools and in day technical schools, as defined respectively by section eighty-nine of the Education Act, 1908, and by section sixteen of the Education Amendment Act, 1910, in the Victoria University District who are graduates of any British chartered University, or are holders of certificates of competency under section fifty-four of the Education Act, 1908.

6. (1) Members appointed pursuant to paragraphs (b) and (d) of section five hereof shall be appointed by resolution passed at a meeting of the Board or Council making the appointment.

(2) Members elected pursuant to paragraphs (c), (e), (f), (g), and (h) of the same section shall be elected in manner hereinafter appearing.

(3) The first appointments and elections of members pursuant to the said section five shall be made within the first seven days of the month of June nineteen hundred and fifteen, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, and the members so appointed or elected shall come into office on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen:

Provided that no appointment or election shall be made under the provisions of paragraphs (a), (e), or (g) of the said section, save for the purpose of filling casual vacancies, until the month of June, nineteen hundred and seventeen.

7. (1) For the purpose of election of members pursuant to paragraphs (c), (e), (g), and (h) of section five hereof the following provisions shall apply:—

- (a) The Registrar of Victoria University College, or such other person as the Council appoints, shall be the Returning Officer who shall conduct all elections of those members.
- (b) The Returning Officer shall prepare separate rolls of the persons who are entitled to vote for a member or members pursuant to the said paragraphs (c), (e), (g), and (h), and shall enter in the respective rolls the name, occupation, and address of every person who possesses the necessary qualifications entitling him to vote; provided that no person shall be entered on more rolls than one.
- (c) Any person who possesses more qualifications than one shall be entitled to

have his name transferred from one roll to another roll on which he is qualified to be enrolled at any time before the closing of the rolls as hereinafter mentioned:

Provided that a person who has had his name so transferred from one roll to another roll shall not be entitled to have his name transferred from the lastmentioned roll until after two years have elapsed since the date of the transfer to that roll, unless he has ceased to be qualified to have his name thereon.

- (d) All rolls shall be closed at five o'clock in the afternoon of the fourteenth day immediately preceding the day on which an election is to be held and shall continue to be closed until the election is completed; and no name shall be entered on any roll while that roll is closed.
- (e) Claims for enrolment shall be made and disposed of in accordance with regulations made by the Council.
- (f) At every election the votes shall be given by sealed voting-papers, in the form prescribed by regulations made by the Council, delivered to the Returning Officer personally on or before the day fixed for the election, or forwarded to him by post or otherwise so as to reach him not later than that day.

(2) For the purpose of the election of a member pursuant to paragraph (f) of section five hereof the following provisions shall apply:—

(a) The governing body of each secondary school shall be entitled to one vote for every hundred or part of a hundred

pupils (exclusive of the pupils in any lower department) in average attendance for the year ending on the thirty-first day of December immediately preceding the election.

(b) The votes of each such governing body shall be by resolution passed at a meeting of that governing body.

(3) In any election to which this section refers the majority of votes shall decide the election, provided that if two candidates have an equal number of votes the Registrar shall (if necessary) determine the election by lot in the presence of the Chairman or other member of the Council.

8. (1) No member of the Professorial Board shall be a member of the Council unless he is appointed a member of that Board pursuant to paragraph (b) of section five hereof.

(2) A member of the Professorial Board so elected shall not be entitled to vote on any question before the Council affecting himself or directly affecting the salary of any member of the teaching staff of the College, or directly affecting any payment made by or due from the Council to any member of the teaching staff.

9. Subject to the provisions of the next succeeding section, the term of office of all members appointed or elected as provided by paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e), and (g), of section five hereof shall be four years, and of all other members shall be two years; but all members shall continue to hold office until the appointment or election of their successors

10. On the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen, of the members appointed under the provisions of the principal Act by the Governor in Council, the one who has been longest in office shall

retire, and the other two members so appointed shall be deemed to have been appointed by the Governor under this Act; in like manner, of the members elected under the principal Act by the graduates of the New Zealand University on the books of the College, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (c) of section five of this Act; in like manner, of the members elected under paragraph (d) of sub-section one of section five of the principal Act, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (g) of section five of this Act; and, in like manner, of the members elected under the provisions of the principal Act by Education Boards, the one who has been longest in office shall retire, and the other two members shall be deemed to have been elected in accordance with paragraph (e) of section five of this Act: and the member elected by the Professorial Board shall retire.

11. (1) Except as provided in the last preceding section, the members of the Council who are in office on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen, shall continue to hold office, subject as hereinafter in this section mentioned.

(2) On the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and on the same day in each second year thereafter, one-half of the members mentioned in paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (e) and (g) of section five hereof and the members mentioned in paragraphs (d), (f), and (h), of the said section shall retire from office.

(3) The members to retire from each of the groups mentioned in paragraphs (a), (c), (e), and (g) of section five hereof on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall be those who have been longest in office.

(4) The member to retire from the group mentioned in paragraph (b) of the said section five on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen, shall, on or before the first day of May in that year, be decided by lot amongst the members of that group.

(5) Of the members elected under paragraph (b) of section five of the principal Act, the one who has been longest in office shall retire on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifteen; and the remaining members shall retire on the first day of July, nineteen hundred and seventeen; and in no case shall any election be made hereafter of members under the said paragraph.

- 12. (1) If any member of the Council—
 - (a) Dies, or by writing addressed to the Council resigns his seat; or
 - (b) Becomes a bankrupt; or
 - (c) For a period of three consecutive months fails to attend any meeting of the Council without obtaining leave or absence; or
 - (d) Is absent from New Zealand for a period of six consecutive months without obtaining leave or absence.—

he shall cease to be a member, and the vacancy thereby created shall be deemed a casual vacancy.

(2) The member filling a casual vacancy shall hold office only for the residue of the term of the vacating member.

13. (1) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by appointment by the Governor it shall be the duty of the Council to forthwith report the fact to the Minister of Education.

(2) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to be filled by appoint-

ment by the Professorial Board, or by the Education Board, or by the Wellington City Council, it shall be the duty of the Council forthwith to report the fact to the Board or Council which appointed the vacating member.

(3) Whenever a vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, occurs that is to filled by election it shall be the duty of the Council to do all things necessary for the proper conduct of that election.

(4) Each vacancy, whether casual or otherwise, shall be filled by the same authority as that which appointed or elected the vacating member.

13a. [Section 12 of the Act of 1914.] (1) The appointment or election of a member to fill a vacancy caused by the expiry of the term of office of a vacating member shall be made within the first seven days of the month of June next preceding such expiry, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, but shall not take effect until such expiry.

(2) The appointment or election of a member to fill a casual vacancy shall be made not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs.

(3) Every retiring member shall be eligible for reappointment or re-election.

(4) If any vacancy is not filled within sixty days after the same occurs, the Governor shall forthwith fill the vacancy by appointing some fit person as a member in place of the vacating member.

14. The Council shall meet at least once a month at such time and place as the Council determines.

15. At its first meeting held in the month of July in each year the Council shall elect one of its members to be Chairman.

16. The Chairman shall hold office for one year and shall be eligible for re-election.

17. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Chairman or any two members, five days' previous notice of the place and time for such meeting being posted or telegraphed to all the members.

18. At all meetings of the Council—

- (a) The quorum shall be six;
- (b) All questions shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting;
- (c) The Chairman shall preside and have a deliberate vote, and, in the event of equality of voting, a casting vote;
- (d) In the absence of the Chairman from any meeting the members present shall elect one of their number to act as chairman at that meeting, and while so acting he shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

19. Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Council may from time to time make by-laws for the purpose of regulating its own procedure, the conduct of all elections under this Act, and the general administration of the affairs of the College:

Provided that such by-laws shall not come into operation until and unless they have been approved by the Governor-in-Council.

20. The Council may continue to act notwithstanding any vacancy in its body.

21. The Council shall cause exact minutes of an its proceedings to be kept and also full and accurate accounts of all its receipts, disbursements, liabilities and engagements.

22. The seal of the Council shall be in the custody of the Chairman, and shall not be affixed to any document except pursuant to a resolution of the Council.

23 (1) The Council shall have full power to appoint and remove all professors, lecturers, examiners, officers, and servants of the College, and to generally manage the affairs thereof:

(2) All persons appointed by the Council and holding office on the commencement of this Act shall be deemed to have been appointed under this Act.

THE PROFESSORIAL BOARD.

24. There shall be a Professorial Board of the College, consisting of all the professors of the College for the time being, and of such lecturers of the College for the time being as the Council may from time to time declare to be members of the Board.

25. The Board shall have power to make rules as to the time and place of its meetings and the procedure thereat:

Provided that all such rules shall, before coming into operation, be submitted to and approved by the Council.

26. At its annual meeting the Board shall elect one of its members, being a professor, to be Chairman, and if it fails so to do the Council may appoint a professor to be Chairman for the year.

27. The Chairman shall hold office for one year and be eligible for re-election.

28. At all meetings of the Board-

- (a) A quorum shall be such number as the Board with the consent of the Council from time to time determines.
- (b) The Chairman shall preside, and shall cause exact minutes of the proceedings to be kept.

- (c) He shall have a deliberate vote, and, in the case of equality of voting, a castingvote:
- (d) In his absence from any meeting the members present shall elect another professor to act as chairman of that meeting, and while so acting he shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

29. Subject in each instance to the approval of the Council, and to such modifications as the Council thinks fit to make therein, the Board may—

- (a) Fix the course of study, and the days and hours of lectures:
- (b) Make rules as to the attendance of the students.
- (c) Prescribe the subjects for examinations for scholarships, exhibitions, prizes, and other college distinctions and awards.

30. Subject to the right of appeal to the Council (whose decision shall be final) by any person who feels aggrieved, the Board may—

- (a) Deal with all questions relating to the discipline of the students:
- (b) Manage the College library:
- (c) Give instructions to the College servants as to the performance of their duties.

31. The Board shall be subject to the control of the Council, and shall furnish to it such reports and information as from time to time the Council requests or the Board deems necessary.

32. The Board may from time to time offer such suggestions for the consideration of the Council as the Board thinks advisable in the interests of the College.

LECTURE FEES.

33. There shall be payable by the students such reasonable fees for general tuition and for attendance on lectures as from time to time the Council prescribes.

34. For the purpose of procuring such approval, the Council shall forward each table of fees to the Minister of Education for submission to the Governor-in-Council; and the fees shall not be chargeable until such approval is signified.

(Clauses 35 and 36 repealed by the Education Act Amendment Act, 1907.

APPROPRIATION AND ENDOWMENT.

37. For the purpose of providing a fund for the maintenance of the College, and the payment of all expenses incurred by the Council in administering the affairs thereof, the Colonial Treasurer, without further appropriation than this Act, shall, out of the Consolidated Fund, pay to the Council each year ending the thirty-first day of March the sum of four thousand pounds, in such instalments during the year as he thinks fit.*

38. The parcel of land described in the First Schedule hereto is hereby set apart as an endowment for the College, but shall remain vested in His Majesty.

39. The said parcel of land shall be held and administered as Crown lands under such of the leasing provisions of "The Land Act, 1892," as the Minister of Lands from time to time thinks fit; and the net rents and other proceeds derived therefrom and remaining after payment thereout of all necessary expenses attendant on the management and administration of the said land (including the

*The total income of the College from the Government before the cuts made in the grant on January 1st, 1922 and July 1st, 1922, was £11,500 exclusive of the National Endowment Grant. expenses of survey and roading) shall, without further authority or appropriation than this Act, be paid over from time to time to the Council for the purposes of the College.

40. The parcel of land described in the Second Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be vested in the Council in trust as a site for University College buildings and as grounds appertaining thereto:

Provided that the said land shall be inalienable by sale, mortgage, lease, or otherwise.

41. The Council may grant leases of any land (other than the land described in the First and Second Schedules hereto) to which the corporation of the College at any time becomes entitled by way of purchase, grant, or otherwise, but may not without the previous consent of the Governor-in-Council sell or mortgage the same.

ACCOUNTS AND AUDIT.

42. The Audit Office shall be the auditor of the Council, and shall have the same duties and powers in respect of the moneys and accounts of the Council, and of persons dealing therewith, as if the Council were a local authority within the meaning of section six of "The Public Revenues Act, 1892."

43. Within ten days after the close of each financial year ending the thirty-first day of December, the Council shall cause to be prepared and submitted to the Audit Office a statement of accounts showing-

- (a) The total receipts and disbursements for the year; and
- (b) Such other particulars as the Governorin-Council from time to time prescribes by regulations under this Act.

44. Such statement shall be audited by the Audit Office within ten days after receipt thereof,

and shall, together with the certificate of the Audit Office and a general report as to the progress of the College, be forwarded by the Council to the Minister of Education within thirty days after the close of such year, to be by him laid before Parliament if sitting, or, if not, then within ten days after the commencement of the next session thereof.

GENERAL.

45. The Minister of Education shall be the Visitor of the College, and shall have all the powers and functions usually possessed by Visitors.

46. The Governor may from time to time, by Order-in-Council gazetted, make such regulations as he deems necessary in order to give full effect to the provisions of this Act relating to Queen's Scholarships.

47. The enactments mentioned in the Third Schedule hereto are hereby repealed.

SCHEDULES.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

All that piece or parcel of land situated in Blocks I. and V., Nukumaru Survey District, in the Wellington Provincial District, containing by admeasurement 4,000 acres, more or less: bounded towards the north by Blocks XIII., Momohaki Survey District, 14,500 links; towards the east by other part of Block I., Nukumaru Survey District. and by the Waitotara River, 38,600 links; towards the south-east by a Native reserve, 11,910 links; towards the south-west by a line, 3,500 links; and towards the west by Sections Nos. 13 and 11 in Block IX., and by Block IV., Wairoa Survey District, 33,073 links; be all the aforesaid linkages more or less: excepting therefrom the several roads which are included within the said area: as the same is delineated upon the plan deposited in the District Survey Office, Wellington.

SECOND SOHEDULE.

All that parcel of land in the City of Wellington, containing by admeasurement 5 acres 3 roods, more or less, being part of the Town Belt: bounded towards the east generally by Salamanca Road from Kelburne Parade to the northernmost corner of Hospital Reserve; thence by the said Hospital Reserve to a public road, 50 links wide, forming the northern boundary of the Roman Catholic Cemetery; thence by the said public road, 75 links; thence by a right line bearing south 22° 59' west, 460 links; thence towards the south generally by a right line bearing south 81° 40' west, 440 links, thence by a right line to the eastern side of Kelburne Parade; and thence towards the west by the said Kelburne Parade to Salamanca Road aforesaid.

Also all that parcel of land in the City of Wellington, containing by admeasurement 2 roods 23 perches, more or less, being Allotments Nos. 1, 2 and 3 shown on Plan No. 898 deposited in the Lands Registry Office at Wellington, and known as Hospital Reserve: bounded towards the north-east by Salamanca Road and Plantation Reserve; towards the south-east by a public road 50 links wide; and towards the south-west and north-west by the Town Belt.

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
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
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
