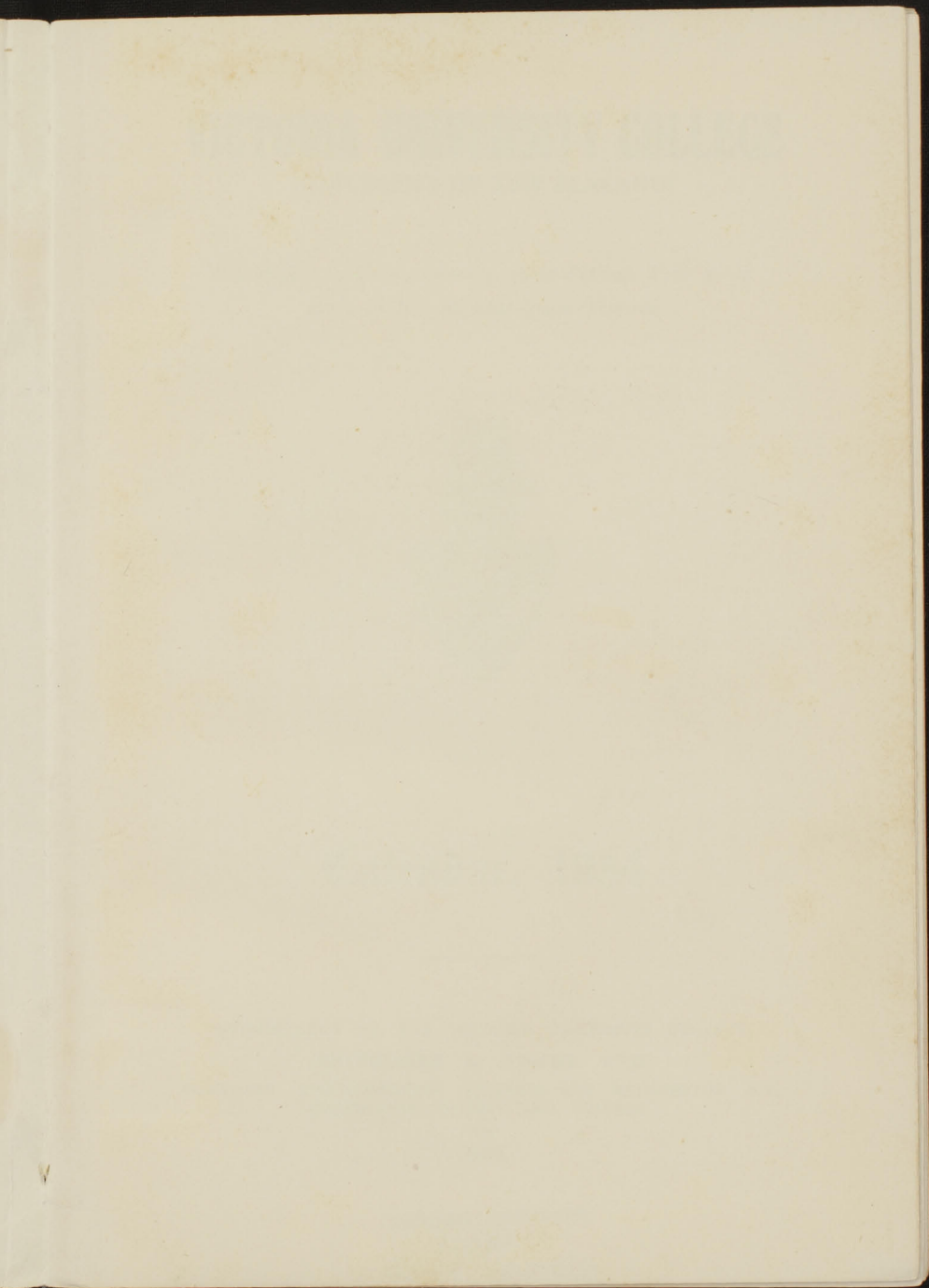


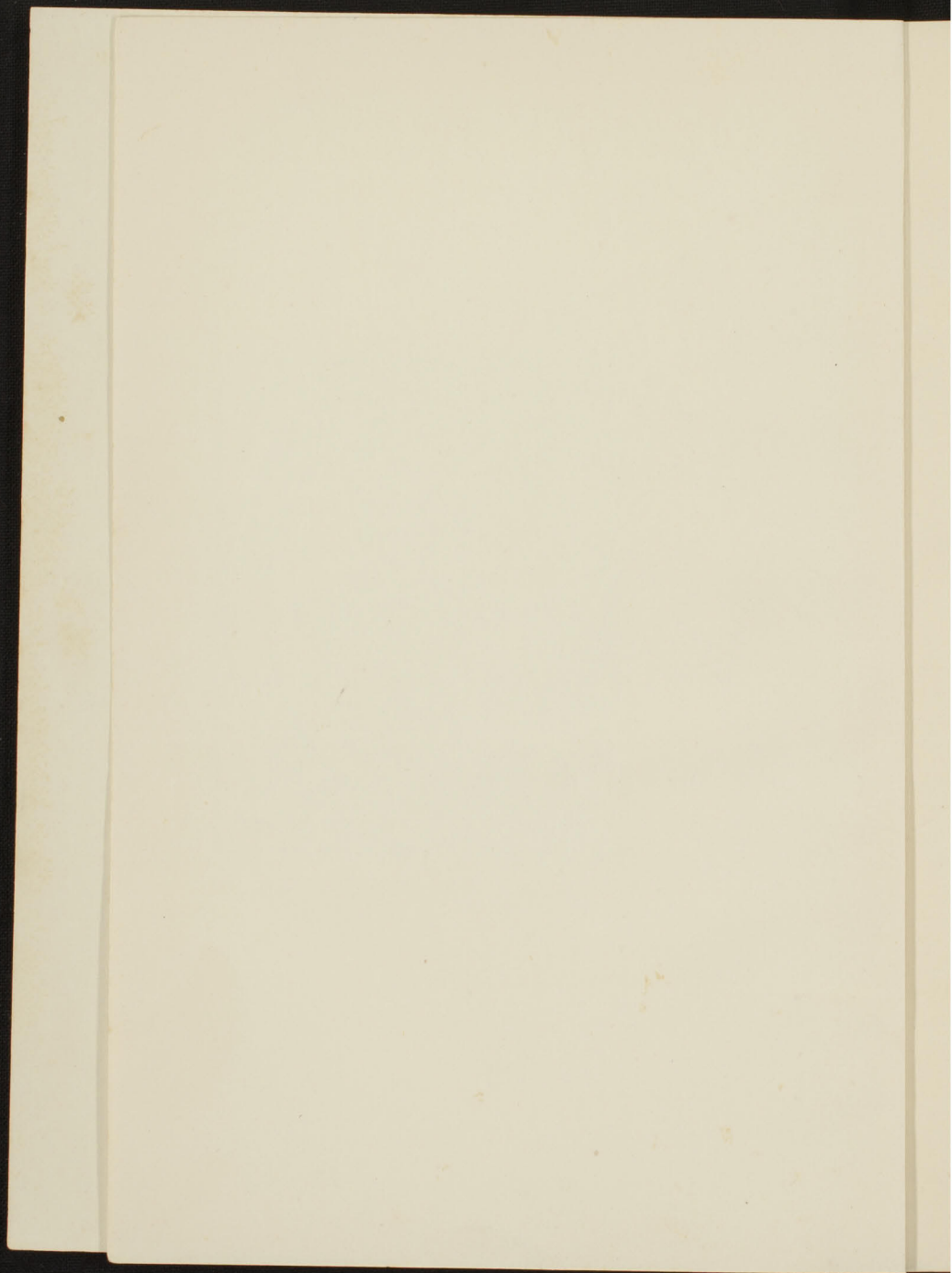

In 1931 by the will of the late Emily Lillias Johnston the sum of £2,000 was bequeathed to the College for the purpose of providing Scholarships to be shared equally by male and female students. The Professorial Board has drawn up regulations for the Scholarships which have been approved by the Council. It will, however, be some little time before the estate is realised and the money paid over. Till this is done no Scholarships will be awarded.

Under the will of the late Dr. Arnold Izard one half share of his residuary estate after termination of a certain life-interest is bequeathed to Victoria University College for scholarships and general purposes.

In 1933 the Carnegie Trustees paid the first year's instalment of \$5,000 for the College Library. The Trustees have granted \$15,000 for the purchase of Library books to be distributed over three years.

On the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and higher education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things, recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature to make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington.

For the maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and that the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate in-

come to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; that, if this were not practicable, the deficit in each case should be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand"; and provision was made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment. Certain members of the Council were appointed, but nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897, the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon, P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act, an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the 22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six scholarships each year, called "Queen's Scholarship," to persons of either sex under the age of 14 years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. In 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. By the Education Act Amendment

Act, 1907, the Queen's Scholarships were abolished. The Act of 1897 further set apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumaru Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appointment of four Professors for the Chairs of Classics, English Language and Literature, Chemistry and Physics, and Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and the following were appointed:—Classics, J. R. Brown, M.A., St. Andrews and Oxford; English Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A., St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A., Cambridge, Ph.D., Würzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D., Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun.

The Staff has since been increased by the foundation of Chairs in Modern Languages, Biology, Roman Law, etc., English and New Zealand Law, Mental and Moral Philosophy, Physics, Education, Economics, History, Geology and Agriculture.

Upon the foundation of the Massey College in 1927 the chair of Agriculture was discontinued.

The College was admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

SITE AND BUILDINGS.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, six acres in extent, and the Government provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings was erected, the foundation stone being laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904. They were opened by His Excellency Lord Plunket on the 30th March, 1906.

In March, 1910, a further portion of the buildings was completed, forming a wing at the rear of the Arts Building. This wing contains two large class-rooms, and in the basement a men's cloak room, and common rooms for students.

In 1919, the Government made the College a grant for the north wing. This wing provides accommodation for the Library and the School of Economics, a Women's Common Room and a Tea Room.

The library contains a handsome stained glass window erected in memory of the students who fell in the War, 1914-1918.

In 1921 the Government made a further grant for the erection of the South Wing. This wing provided accommodation for the Physics and Geology Departments and freed additional space for Chemistry and Biology in the old Science Wing.

In 1905, the College received from Parliament an additional annual grant of £2,000 for specialisation in Law and Science.

In 1914, the Victoria College Amendment Act was passed, by which it was enacted that the name of the College should in future be the Victoria University College. Changes were made in the constitution of the Council and of the Professorial Board. In the same year by an amendment to the New Zealand University Act an increase of £3,000 was made in the annual grant, and all the grants from the Government were consolidated into one annual grant of £9,000; further, the College was allotted a share of the National Endowment grant, part of which (amounting in 1933 to £1,267) comes direct from the Government, while a second part (amounting in 1933 to £633) is paid through the New Zealand University.

In 1923, a short amending Act was passed which gave the Council power to levy its own Class fees

without the previous approval of the Governor-in-Council. It also provided for a change in the date of the end of the Financial Year from March 31st to December 31st, and for a change in the date of the Annual Meeting of the Council from the May Meeting to the July Meeting.

In 1919, an amending Act to the New Zealand University Act was passed, in which it was enacted that from April 1st, 1920, the annual grant to this College should be increased by £2,500.

In 1915, the Trustees of the late T. G. Macarthy made a grant of £10,000, for the purpose of establishing a School of Economics, to be called "The T. G. Macarthy School of Economics." The foundation of the Chair was, however, delayed owing to the war. The Chair was founded in 1920 by the appointment of Professor B. E. Murphy.

In the same year, under the will of the late Sarah Anne Rhodes, the sum of £10,000 was left to the Council for the education of women.

In 1921 the Council arranged with the S. A. Rhodes Trustees to grant either a Sarah Anne Rhodes Fellowship, or a Sarah Anne Rhodes Scholarship, and alternative sets of regulations were drawn up. The first scholarship was awarded in 1921 to Miss Eleanor A. Pope, B.Sc.

The first Fellowship was awarded to Miss E. A. Pope in 1925.

In 1930 the regulations were altered with the approval of the surviving trustees to provide for the appointment of a Travelling Fellow and/or a Lecturing Fellow. The first Travelling Fellowship was awarded to Miss Violet A. M. Macmillan, B.H.Sc., in 1931.

In 1932 Miss Violet Macmillan, B.H.Sc., was appointed Lecturing Fellow and has taken up residence at Palmerston North, her office being at Massey College.

In 1923 Sir Walter Buchanan made a donation of £10,000 to found a Chair of Agriculture. The Chair was filled by the appointment of Professor G. S. Peren, B.S.A., Toronto.

Upon the establishment of the Massey Agricultural College in 1927 the Victoria University College Council agreed to hand over the income derived from the Buchanan Trust funds to that College, and Professor G. S. Peren resigned his Chair having been appointed Principal of the Massey College.

WEIR HOUSE.

In 1926, by the will of the late W. Weir, a sum estimated at £77,500 was left to the College to provide and maintain a hostel for men students.

In 1931 the destruction caused by the Hawke's Bay earthquake and the refusal of the Government to pay over the subsidy due under the bequest caused substantial alterations in the plans for the Weir House. After the earthquake the then Minister of Education (the Hon. Mr. Atmore) refused to approve the erection of a brick hostel, with the result that the Council decided upon ferro-concrete. When it was ascertained that the Government could not at present pay the statutory subsidy it was found impossible to continue with the erection of the building as at first designed. The work on the dining hall block was stopped and temporary dining accommodation and servants' quarters were provided in the main hostel building.

In 1928 by an amendment of the N.Z. University Act, the statutory grant was increased from £10,600 to £11,750.

In 1931 the statutory grant was reduced to £9,431 18s. 0d. and the special grant of £850 per annum for the Chair of Education was withdrawn.

In 1932 the statutory grant was reduced to £7,350.

Weir House was formally opened as a hostel for men students by His Excellency The Governor-General, Lord Bledisloe, on 6th March, 1933.

Some forty students enrolled immediately. This number gradually increased, till by the end of the year the House was full.

NOTE.—The House accommodates 78 students.

The first Warden was Dr. I. A. Henning, but on his relinquishing his appointment as Lecturer in Modern Languages and as Warden in order to return to Sydney, Dr. I. L. G. Sutherland, Lecturer in Philosophy, was appointed Warden. Miss Irvine (late of Scots College) was appointed Matron.

COLLEGE LIBRARY.

The College Library is maintained by an annual grant of £525 out of the College funds. At present it contains about 28,000 volumes, and subscribes for rather more than 100 periodicals.

ADULT EDUCATION.

In 1915, the Council, in co-operation with the Workers' Educational Association, established three tutorial classes in Wellington. The adult education movement grew steadily, though since the Government withdrew its grant in 1932 its activities have been somewhat restricted. In 1933, throughout this University District, twenty courses of lectures were given, eighteen Discussion Groups met, and thirty-two groups were formed in connection with the Canterbury College Box Scheme. Eighteen series of Talks were broadcast from station 2YA.

No funds are now available for this work, but it is proposed to continue it in a limited way on a voluntary basis.

Note.—Terms will be granted only in subjects mentioned above.

The College year shall consist of three Terms: the First Term to begin about the first week in March and to end about May 10th; the Second Term to begin about May 15th and to end about August 15th; the Third Term to begin about September 6th and to end about the end of October.

The College examinations begin about October 10th.

MATRICULATION.

To matriculate a student must pass the Matriculation Examination and make the following declaration:—"I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Statutes of the University, so far as they apply to me, and I hereby declare that I believe myself to have attained the age of sixteen years."

No examination passed by any student before he has made this declaration can count towards the keeping of terms or the qualifying for a Degree.

The last day for making the Declaration is June 1st, provided that upon payment of a late-fee of £1 1s. 0d. the declaration may be made not later than August 1st.

SUPERVISION OF COURSES.

The Professorial Board supervises the courses of all new students. Before enrolment in classes a record of the proposed course of study, signed by the Chairman of the Professorial Board, or by the Dean of one of the Faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce, or Law, must be in the hands of the Registrar. In the case of a student proceeding to one of the University degrees, this record shall state the complete course of study proposed for that degree; and subsequent departures (if any) from such proposed courses must be similarly recorded.

TERMS.

The subjects in which the keeping of terms is necessary are:—All subjects for B.A., B.Sc., and LL.B. Degrees, certain of the subjects for B.Com., all the subjects of the Engineering Entrance and of the Medical Intermediate.

No examination will be held nor terms granted except in subjects taught in the College (see list above).

INTERNAL STUDENTS.

To keep terms in any subject an internal student must

- (a) Have his name on the books of the College;
- (b) Do the Class work and Class examinations to the satisfaction of the Professor; provided that in exceptional circumstances the Professor may allow him to keep terms by passing the examination provided for external students.

For keeping Terms in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geology or Geography, the Practical

Examination or performance of a practical course to the satisfaction of the instructor shall be deemed to be a part of the College Examination; and, unless specially exempted by the Science Faculty, a student presenting himself for an Examination in any of these subjects for the purpose of keeping Terms must do the practical work in that subject in the year in which he so presents himself.

ATTENDANCE.

To fulfil the attendance requirement in a subject a student must, except in cases approved of by the Professorial Board, attend not less than 75% of the lectures in that subject.

REGULATIONS UNDER SECTION VII. OF STATUTE

“BACHELOR OF SCIENCE.”

Candidates shall be tested on translation of a passage written in a prescribed foreign language and dealing with the subject or subjects offered at the Advanced stage.

Candidates are required to present themselves for examination in the first term of the second year of the Advanced course. In case of failure a candidate may submit himself for re-examination in the second term of the second year of his Advanced course.

EXTERNAL (*Exempted*) STUDENTS.

Exemption from lectures is provided for under certain conditions (see Calendar, N.Z. University, 1933, p. 29).

To keep terms in any subject an external student must:—

(a) Obtain exemption from lectures and pay an exemption fee of £1 1s. not later than May 1st, except with late fee of £1 1s. up to September 30th.

(b) Pay examination fees (£1 1s per subject) not later than July 10th, except with late fee of £1 1s. up to September 30th.

Note.—Extra-mural students are warned that an application to sit for the College Terms Examinations does not constitute an entry for the Degree Examinations. To enter for an examination for a degree section they must communicate with the Registrar of the University of New Zealand, and obtain proper printed forms, returning same with appropriate fees by the due date (for dates and fees—see N.Z. University Calendar).

(c) Pass in the subject at the Annual College Examinations.

Note.—An additional fee of £1/1/- is required from exempted students who desire to be examined in Oral French.

Note.—No candidate shall communicate direct with the examiner. Communications with regard to examinations must be made through the Registrar.

ACADEMIC YEARS.

A student may sit for a section of a degree at the end of his first year but may not sit for his final examination until he has completed at least three years work to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.

DISCIPLINE.

Every student attending lectures at Victoria University College shall be required to sign the following declaration and no student shall have his or her name placed on the College books until this declaration is signed:

“I do solemnly promise that I will faithfully obey the Regulations of Victoria University College, so far as they apply to me.”

The Board has full disciplinary powers over the conduct of all students within the College, the Gymnasium, the College grounds and at all cere-

monies and meetings wherever held, conducted under the auspices of the College Council, the Professorial Board, the Students' Association, or any of the College Clubs or Societies, and in other cases when the Board considers that the interests of the College or of students are affected.

Students whose work or attendance is unsatisfactory may be excluded from College Classes for the remainder of the Session by the Professorial Board.

STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION FEE.

Every student attending lectures shall each year on enrolment pay to the Registrar the sum of £1/1/-, which sum shall be paid into a Consolidated Fund in the name of the Students' Association; provided that any student in whose case payment may involve hardship may appeal to the Professorial Board for exemption or for reduction of same; provided further that the Council may direct the Registrar to withhold any sum necessary to pay for damage done in the Students' Common Rooms or Cloak Rooms.

Upon payment of this sum the student shall *ipso facto* become a member of the Students' Association and shall also be entitled to become on written application and without any further payment a member of all College clubs and societies provided he agrees to abide by their constitutions and rules.

Note.—Students taking only one half-course shall not be required to pay the above fee.

Note.—For the purpose of the above regulation the following shall be deemed to be half-courses:—

Graduate students in Science, who are taking Laboratory work only, will be considered to be taking a half-course.

Students whose Students' Association fee is unpaid by the end of the First Term will be debarred from further attendance at classes.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS.

1. In the case of disorderly conduct or any breach of the regulations the Librarian may, and in serious cases shall, report the person so offending to the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Any person so reported, if found guilty of any breach of the Regulations, shall be reprimanded and may be excluded from the use of the Library or dealt with in such other way as the Professorial Board may direct.

HOURS.

2. During the Session the Library shall be open to readers from 9 a.m. to 9.30 p.m. with an interval of an hour at mid-day on all week days except Saturdays, when it shall be open from 9 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

3. The Library shall be closed on Sundays, on public holidays, and at such other times as the Professorial Board may direct.

4. Regulations will be issued from time to time for the use of the Library during recess.

ADMISSION FOR READING PURPOSES.

5. The following persons shall be entitled to use the Library for reading purposes:—

- (a) Members of the College Council.
- (b) Members of the Teaching Staff.
- (c) Students who have paid the College fee for the current year.
- (d) Graduates of the University of New Zealand who have taken their course at Victoria University College.
- (e) Graduates of any University, and persons engaged in Research work, and any other persons; provided that in every case permission shall have been granted by the Library Committee of the Professorial Board.

NOTE.—Persons using the Library under (c) must present to the Librarian a Library Card for current year, to be obtained from the Registrar. Persons using the Library under (d) and (e) must also present such a card, but may obtain this either from the Registrar or from the Chairman of the Library Committee.

CONDUCT OF READERS IN THE LIBRARY.

6. (a) The use of pens and ink in the Library is strictly prohibited except at tables provided for the purpose.
(b) Silence must be observed in the Library.
(c) Communications with other readers should be avoided: applications for information, etc., should be made to the Librarian.
7. No books are to be removed from the Library except as provided in Regulations 10, 11 and 12.
8. Books removed from the shelves by readers must be left on the tables in the reading rooms, except Periodicals, Dictionaries, Encyclopedias and Law reports, which shall be replaced in the shelves.
9. Readers are particularly cautioned against injuring books belonging to the Library by writing in the margin, marking or turning down the leaves, or otherwise disfiguring them.

BORROWING BOOKS.

10. Members of the College Council and the Professors and Lecturers of the College may borrow any volumes provided:
 - (a) That entry of each volume so borrowed be made, dated, and signed, by the borrower, in the Ledger provided for the purpose.

- (b) That volumes specified in Regulation 13 be retained by borrowers not longer than one week, and that no volume be retained for more than two months except during the long vacation.

11. Any other member of the Staff may borrow volumes except those volumes specified in Regulation 13, provided:

- (a) That entry be made as in Regulation 10.
- (b) That not more than 5 volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than one month except during the long vacation.

12. Any other person privileged under Regulation 5 for reading purposes may **on application to the Librarian** borrow books at hours notified on the Library notice-board, provided:

- (a) That a deposit of One Guinea be made with the Librarian which shall be returned to the depositor when he ceases to avail himself of the privilege of borrowing books provided he has returned undamaged all books borrowed by him.

This deposit may be excused on presentation of a written recommendation from a Professor which shall be valid only for the current year.

- (b) That not more than two volumes be in his possession at one time and that no volume be retained for more than 14 days: provided that on the written request of a Professor any Honours or Research student or student doing work at Stage III. may take out five volumes at one time, no volume to be retained for more than one month.

13. Save as provided in Regulation 10, encyclopædias, dictionaries, law reports, prose translations of the classics, books containing valuable engravings.

works with loose plates or maps, periodicals which have been less than a fortnight in the Library, may not be borrowed from the Library. Provided, always without prejudice to Regulation 10, that text-books prescribed for the current year, and books listed as specially in demand, may be withheld, lent, or recalled by the Librarian. A book so recalled must be returned within three days.

14. A Request Book shall be provided in which the names of those wishing to obtain books in circulation, the titles of the books and the date of request may be entered. Any book which has been entered in the request book shall be returned on the demand of the Librarian within three days.

15. The borrower shall be liable for any damage a book may have sustained whilst in his keeping.

16. **No book belonging to the Library shall be privately lent by any borrower, except those specified in Regulation 10.**

17. All books and publications of every kind shall be returned on or before December 14th in each year, and during the ten days immediately following the Library shall be closed; provided that members of the staff who desire to retain books in their possession during this period may do so on furnishing a list of such books to the Librarian on or before December 14th, and that members of the staff may also borrow books during the same period on application to the Librarian.

NOTE.—Reciprocal arrangements have been made with the Wellington Philosophical Society, whereby Students of the College can visit the library of that Society and consult books and periodicals, on production of a card from the College Librarian.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

ENGLISH I.

Hours of Meeting:—Mondays, Wednesdays,
Thursday and Saturday 9 to 10 a.m.

The work of the Class will cover the ground prescribed for Pass B.A., and LL.B. candidates taking English.

The Prescription:—

1. English I. (Two papers):—

(a) (1) The history and structure of the English language; elementary phonetics and *either* (i.) a knowledge of the elements of Anglo-Saxon, such as might be acquired by the use of Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, translation and explanation of easy sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose, and passages of early standard English, to test the candidate's knowledge of the history of forms and inflections; the sentences of Anglo-Saxon prose to be taken from Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Primer, and the passages of Early English to be taken from the following sections of Sisam's "Fourteenth Century Verse and Prose" (Edition with glossary I., III., IV.B., IV.C., VI., VIII.A., IX., X., XI.A. XII.B., XIII., XV., XVII.; or (ii.) additional selected works by one or more authors. (2) Selected portions of the works of one or more authors.

(b) (1) A short essay on some subject arising out of the works selected under (a) (2) An account of some period of literature and its connection with the general history of the period. In the period special attention must be paid to the authors indicated but the other authors in the period are not to be neglected. The literary movements and their leaders, the current types and forms of literature and their representatives, as well as the influence of the ancient classics and of the leading Continental literatures on the English literature of the period, must also be examined. Great importance is attached to composition. General outlines of English Litera-

ture including a knowledge and appreciation of the thought and style of standard English authors from Shakespeare to Tennyson.

1934. Shakespeare—Merchant of Venice, Julius Caesar; Gray—Poems; Goldsmith—Deserted Village; Johnston—Life of Swift; Gibbon—Autobiography.

Period: 1744 to 1798—Johnson, Burke, Gibbon, Goldsmith, Collins, Gray, Crabbe, Burns, and Cowper.

Additional selected works for Literary Option: Chaucer's Nun's Priest's Tale; Spenser's Faery Queen, Bk. I.; Milton's Paradise Lost, Bk. 1; Pope's Rape of the Lock; Cowper's Task, Bks. 1-3; Browning's Men and Women.

Period of Literature: "Age of Johnson."

General Outline: Saintsbury's First Book of English Literature.

For Historical Grammar: Classen's: "History of the English Language."

For Phonetics: "The Pronunciation of English." (Jones.) Skeat's Primer of Etymology.

GREEK HISTORY, ART AND LITERATURE.

(*b*) The economic history of Imperialism in the 19th and 20th centuries, with special reference to the British Empire, covering, in conjunction with class (*a*), the requirements of Honours in Arts and Commerce. One lecture per week, on Mondays, 5 to 6 p.m., or such other hour as may be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned. Reading will be prescribed as required.

COURSE C. (*Dr. Heine*).

ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY.—A general treatment, covering, but not necessarily confined to, the requirements of the B.Com. Degree and the Diploma in Banking. One lecture per week, on Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m.

One lecture per week, at an hour to be arranged to suit the convenience of those concerned. It is desirable, but not essential, that students attending this class should possess some preliminary knowledge of Logic.

PROFESSIONAL CLASSES.

BOOK-KEEPING AND ACCOUNTS I. (*Mr. Fountain*).

As defined in the N.Z. University Calendar.

This course has been designed to give students a thorough training in the principles and practice of elementary book-keeping, and will be covered in one session. Special attention will be given to fundamental principles, and instruction will be given in office routine and management. Lectures will occupy two hours a week, on Wednesdays, 6 to 8 p.m. Students will be advised at the commencement of the session as to the textbooks to be used. A series of typewritten notes, complementary to the ordinary textbook, and to the lectures, will be issued to students, as well as a set of practical questions to be worked by each student.

BOOK-KEEPING AND ACCOUNTS II. (*Mr. Fountain*).

As defined in the N.Z. University Calendar.

Students taking this course are presumed to have passed Book-keeping and Accounts I., and therefore to have a thorough knowledge of the principles of Double Entry Book-keeping, and its practical application. One lecture per week, on Tuesdays, 6 to 8 p.m. This stage is designed to cover the application of Double Entry Book-keeping to the more specialised classes of businesses, and deals in particular with the transactions involved in the preparation of annual accounts and alterations in the proprietorship of

business concerns. Students will be advised at the commencement of the session as to the textbooks required. A series of typewritten notes will be supplied to students during the year, to supplement the textbook, and a set of questions to be worked by students will also be distributed.

BOOK-KEEPING AND ACCOUNTS III. (*Mr. Fountain*).

As defined in the N.Z. University Calendar.

The third and last stage of Book-keeping and Accounts is designed to provide a preparation for the final examination for the professional course, or the degree of B.Com., and a full knowledge of the earlier stages is presumed in all cases. One lecture per week, on Mondays, 6 to 8 p.m. It is recommended that students should have either passed, or be taking in the same year, the subjects of Trustee Law and Bankruptcy Law. Students are required to pass certain test examinations on theoretical Physics, to complete the prescribed course of experiments and to pass a practical examination. Students are also required to keep neat and concise records of their experimental results, which will be marked each week.

BOTANY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. Every student should come to lectures with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary studies have not removed. It is part of the duty of the teachers to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

TEXT-BOOKS.—It is obligatory to have Parker's *Lessons in Elementary Biology* or Dendy's *Evolutionary Biology*; Johnson's *Note Book for Practical Botany*, or Bower and Vaughan's *Practical Botany for Beginners*; and one of the following:—Strasburger's *Text Book of Botany* (3rd or later English edition); Miss A. F. M. Johnson's *Text Book of Botany*; or Bower's *Botany of the Living Plant*. It is very desirable that students should have Cockayne's *New Zealand Plants and their Story*.

Instruments—All students must provide themselves with the following instruments at least, a razor for section-cutting, a pair of mounted needles and a pair of forceps with fine points. It is very desirable that every student should have a pocket lens. Students that have not Johnson's *Note Book* must have a laboratory drawing-book, with alternate pages ruled for notes.

ADVANCED AND HONOURS CLASSES—There will generally be two lectures a week and at least one discussions class a week. It is necessary that students attending these classes should have at least Strasburger's Botany and Dendy's Evolutionary Biology. Raber's Principles of Plant Physiology is of great value.

ZOOLOGY.

It is essential that students should provide themselves with text-books, and should read fully and carefully. Every student should come to lecture with some ideas, and with notes as to the difficulties that his preliminary studies have not removed. It is part of the duty of the teachers to help him with these difficulties.

In both lectures and laboratory work due regard will be had to the University syllabus, but work will not be confined to the syllabus.

Text Books.—It is obligatory to have Thomson, Outlines of Zoology, or Borradaile, Manual of Elementary Zoology, Marshall and Hurst's Practical Zoology and Marshall's Frog, or Whitehouse and Grove, Dissection of the Frog; Marshall is preferable. It is highly desirable that every student should have also Dendy's Evolutionary Biology.

ADVANCED AND HONOURS CLASSES—Honours Students must have Parker and Haswell's Zoology (3rd or later Edition), and should consult the Professor about other books.

REGULATIONS.

1. The Scholarship shall be open to students, whether graduates or undergraduates, who have pursued successfully a Science course of an advanced standard and who have not completed their fourth academic year on 1st October of the year in which the Scholarship is awarded.
2. The subjects of examination shall comprise not less than two nor more than three of those prescribed for the B.Sc. course, and at least one of such shall be taken at the advanced grade.
3. The Scholarship shall be awarded by the Professorial Board on the basis of the College examinations in conjunction with the practical work done by the candidates throughout their course.
4. The Scholar must attend a course of lectures and do practical work to the approval of the Professorial Board.
5. The Scholarship shall not be tenable with any other scholarship or exhibition.
6. The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable for one year.
7. Scholars shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first about August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have

been fulfilled. Payments shall be subject to a favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Dean of the Science Faculty.

8. Candidates must apply in writing to the Registrar not later than the 20th of September.

JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

The late Mr. Jacob Joseph bequeathed a sum of £3,000 to Victoria University College, in the year 1905, for the foundation of Scholarships. On this foundation two or more Scholarships, tenable for one year, are open for award annually. The Scholarships are of the value of £60, but the Council may, in its discretion and on the recommendation of the Professorial Board, increase the value of any Scholarship to £120 for the purpose of encouraging full-time research at Victoria University College.

1. The Scholarships shall be open to students (either men or women) :—

- (i.) Whose year of matriculation is not more than five years prior to the year of the award—except in the case of Law students, for whom the corresponding interval shall be seven years:
- (ii.) Who have studied at Victoria University College for at least two years, and have completed an honours course thereat to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.
- (iii.) Who have been certified by the University of New Zealand to have attained to the standard of Honours.

2. Preference, *ceteris paribus*, shall be shown to students of Law and Experimental Science (including Mental and Moral Philosophy, provided that evidence of sufficient Laboratory work be forthcoming.)

3. The Scholarships shall be awarded on evidence of capacity to undertake original work.

4. The tenure of the Scholarships shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (i.) (a) A scholar who has been awarded a Scholarship of the value of £60 shall undertake original work on a subject of investigation to be approved by the Professorial Board, and shall, during the year of tenure, carry on that work to the satisfaction of the Board.
- (b) A Scholar who has been awarded a Scholarship of the value of £120 shall comply with all the conditions set forth in 4 (i.) (a) and shall devote his full time to the pursuit of his investigation as directed by the Professorial Board.
- (ii.) Every scholar shall submit to the Professorial Board a thesis, or other prescribed written record of his work for the Scholarship; and shall state generally in the preface to that thesis, and specifically in notes, the main source from which his information is derived, and the extent to which he has availed himself of the work of others. He shall supply a copy of this thesis for the College Library.
- (iii.) The thesis to be typewritten in quarto size, on one side of the paper with ample spacing and margins, and bound, with the author's name and title of thesis on the cover.

5. (i.) A Scholar who has been awarded a Scholarship of the value of £60 shall receive payment in two equal instalments, the first on August 1st, and the second when the conditions of the Scholarship have been fulfilled. Both payments shall be subject to favourable report on the work of the Scholar by the Professorial Board, but the second instalment shall not be paid unless the conditions have been fulfilled within fifteen months of the award.

(ii.) A Scholar who has been awarded a Scholarship of the value of £120 shall receive payment in such instalments as the Council on the recommendation of the Professorial Board shall determine, provided that the final instalment shall not be paid before the Scholar has satisfactorily completed his thesis or other prescribed written record of his work, and provided further that such thesis or other prescribed written record shall be completed within fifteen months of the award of the Scholarship.

6. Applications, in which a statement may be made as to the nature of the original work proposed, shall be sent in to the Registrar by May 1st.

7. The holding of another scholarship shall not debar a student from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.

8. In the event of no scholarship or only one scholarship being awarded in any year, additional scholarships may be awarded in any subsequent year

NATIONAL RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS.

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the National Research Scholarship Regulations, 1927.

2. (1.) Not more than four National Research Scholarships may be awarded in any year in accordance with section 12 of the said Act and with these regulations.

(2.) Such scholarships shall be awarded only to graduates of the New Zealand University and to other suitable persons approved for the purpose by the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (hereinafter referred to as the Council).

3. (1.) Application for the award of a National Research Scholarship shall be made to the Council by writing addressed to the Permanent Secretary of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, at Wellington, not later in any year than the 14th day of February: Provided that the Council may, in its discretion and in special cases, receive any application after the said date in any year, and may award to the applicant a scholarship for that year.

(2.) Every application for a scholarship under these regulations shall specify with reasonable particularity the nature of the investigation or research proposed to be undertaken by the applicant in the event of a scholarship being awarded him.

(3.) Every application shall be supported by one or more certificates signed by a Professor of the University of New Zealand or some other suitable person, to the effect that in the opinion of the person by whom such certificate is given, the applicant is a fit and proper person to undertake the proposed investigation or research and to be holder of a scholarship under these regulations.

4. (1.) Every scholarship granted under these regulations shall be of the value of £180 per annum, to be paid by equal quarterly instalments.

(2.) In addition to the aforesaid amount, not more than £25 in the aggregate may be paid to the holder of a scholarship for the purchase of books or apparatus specially required for the purpose of carrying out any investigation or research, and towards the cost of locomotion while engaged thereon.

(3.) All books or apparatus purchased as aforesaid shall be and remain the property of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research.

5. (1.) Every scholarship granted under these regulations shall be tenable for one year, but may be withdrawn at any time if the Council is satisfied that the holder has failed to comply with the terms and conditions on which the same has been awarded.

(2.) Without limiting the number of new scholarships that may be awarded in any year, the term of any scholarship may, with the approval of the Minister, be extended for not more than one year.

6. (1.) The work of investigation or research in connection with a scholarship granted under these regulations shall be carried out at a University college or other institution or place approved for the purpose by the Council, and in accordance with such conditions as the Council may impose.

(2.) Except in special cases and with the consent of the Council the holder of a scholarship shall not engage in any work or occupation not associated with the investigation or research for the purposes of which the scholarship was granted.

7. The holder of the scholarship shall be required to furnish to the Council a quarterly report as to the progress of his investigation or research. Such report

shall be accompanied by a certificate from a Professor of the University or other approved person to the effect that the holder of the scholarship has worked to his satisfaction and in conformity with the terms of the scholarship.

8. (1.) The holder of a scholarship shall not be entitled to claim payment of the final instalment of the value of the scholarship unless and until he has furnished a detailed report in a form suitable for publication of the results of his investigation or research.

(2.) The holder of the scholarship shall not publish or furnish for publication any report as to the nature, progress, or results of his investigation or research except with the consent of the Council.

SARAH ANNE RHODES FELLOWSHIPS.

[The funds for the purposes are derived from a bequest by Mrs. Sarah Anne Rhodes.]

REGULATIONS FOR SARAH ANNE RHODES TRAVELLING FELLOWSHIP.

1. One "Sarah Anne Rhodes Travelling Fellowship" may be offered by the Council of the Victoria University College.

2. The Fellowship shall be open to women students of the University of New Zealand or of any other university approved by the Council of Victoria University College. Every candidate must be the

holder of a degree in Home Science or Home Arts or of a diploma deemed by the Council to be its equivalent. Candidates must have had previous successful experience both as students and as teachers in the sciences and arts relating to the home, and must be not less than 25 years of age.

3. The Fellowship shall be of the value of £500 per annum and shall be tenable for one year. The emolument shall be made available to the Fellow in instalments of which the first shall be payable when the course of investigation and the arrangements for pursuing it have been approved by the Council, and further instalments shall be paid at the end of each quarter or otherwise as may be agreed upon by the Council and the Fellow.

4. The Fellow shall undertake investigation in countries where in the opinion of the Council such investigation may be most profitable; the investigation shall be into the methods adopted to promote the knowledge and practice of the home sciences and arts among the women of the countries visited.

5. During the course of her investigation the Fellow shall forward to the Council quarterly interim reports on her work and shall at the close present a complete report in a form suitable for publication.

6. The Fellow shall undertake to return to New Zealand on the termination of her Fellowship, and if requested so to do by the Council shall deliver within six months of her arrival in New Zealand a short course not exceeding eight lectures in all at one or more of the University Colleges in New Zealand, the expenses incidental to such lectures to be defrayed by the Council.

7. The Council of Victoria University College may terminate a Fellowship if the Fellow is guilty of misconduct or of neglect of the duties of the Fellowship.

8. A Fellow is required to devote herself wholly to the objects of the Fellowship and is forbidden during its tenancy to hold any position of emolument, except by the permission of the Victoria University College Council.

9. The date of application for a Fellowship shall be advertised by the Council of Victoria University College.

REGULATIONS FOR SARAH ANNE RHODES LECTURING FELLOWSHIPS.

1. One or more "Sarah Anne Rhodes Lecturing Fellowships" may be offered by the Council of Victoria University College.

2. The Fellowship shall be open to women students of the University of New Zealand or of any other university or institution of university rank approved by the Council of Victoria University College. A candidate must be the holder of a degree in Home Science or Home Arts or of a diploma deemed by the Council to be its equivalent and must produce evidence of being a successful teacher of wide experience in the sciences and arts relating to the home. A candidate must be not less than 25 years of age.

3. The Fellowship shall be of the value of £500 per annum payable calendar monthly together with transport and other expenses approved by the Council, and shall be tenable in the first instance for one year, the engagement to be renewable annually at the option of the Council.

4. The Fellow will be required to give a course or courses of lectures and demonstrations in the Victoria University College District on subjects that will

promote among the women of New Zealand a sound knowledge and practice of the home sciences and arts. Such courses shall occupy not less than 30 nor more than 40 weeks annually as may be arranged by the Council. The syllabus of the course shall be submitted to the Council for approval in a form suitable for printing and distribution not less than two months before the commencement of the course.

5. The Council of Victoria University College may terminate a Fellowship if the Fellow is guilty of misconduct or of neglect of the duties of the Fellowship.

6. The Fellow is required to devote herself wholly to the objects of the Fellowship and is forbidden during its tenancy to hold any position of emolument, except by the permission of the Victoria University College Council.

7. The date of application for a Fellowship shall be advertised by the Council of Victoria University College.

THE LISSIE RATHBONE SCHOLARSHIPS.

(The Lissie Rathbone Scholarships were established in 1925 by the Trustees of her will, she having bequeathed one half of her residuary estate for such Charitable, Educational or Religious objects as the Trustees should select. The Trustees have allotted £3,000 to Victoria University College, the income from which is to be applied to Scholarships.)

In pursuance of powers vested in the Council by the Trustees the following regulations are prescribed to govern the award and tenure of the Scholarships in this University College:

1. There shall be offered in each year one or more Lissie Rathbone Scholarships, as the funds will admit.

2. Election to the Scholarship shall be made by the Council of the Victoria University College.

3. The annual value of each Scholarship shall be not less than £40.

4. The tenure of each Scholarship shall be for three years, terminable however at any time if the Council, having received from the Professorial Board an unfavourable report of the conduct or progress of the scholar, shall so determine.

5. Candidates for each Scholarship

(i.) Must be under nineteen years of age on the first day of December immediately preceding the date of the award of the Scholarship.

(ii.) May be of either sex.

(iii.) Must have been resident in the Victoria University College District for one year on the first day of December in the year in which they enter.

NOTE.—“Residence” for the purpose of this clause applies to the candidate’s home and does not apply to the school he is attending.

(iv.) Must state their willingness to pursue as internal students of Victoria University College a course for a degree within the award of the New Zealand University from time to time (subject to such regulations as may be consistent with the object of the Scholarship) which may be selected by such scholar, his parents or guardians.

6. Each Scholarship shall be awarded upon examination for excellence in the subjects of English and History. Provided that the Council shall not be bound to award the Scholarship to the candidate

obtaining the highest number of marks in such subjects, but may in its discretion take into account the financial circumstances of the scholar, his parents or guardians.

7. The examination in which the award shall be made shall be the examination presented by the University of New Zealand for the award of its Entrance Scholarships, the examination papers used being those set in English and History for that examination. If, however, there shall at any time cease to be an Entrance Scholarship examination, or if there shall cease to be examination papers set in either English or History for the Entrance Scholarships, the examination in which such award shall be made shall be such other examination in English and History as the Council may from time to time appoint.

8. This Scholarship shall not be tenable with a University Entrance Scholarship. No candidate shall be awarded a Scholarship whose aggregate marks do not reach 50 per cent. of the possible total.

9. Candidates for the Lissie Rathbone Scholarships need not be candidates for an Entrance Scholarship to the University.

10. In the event of the accumulated earnings of the gift being in excess of the amount required for scholarships awarded under Clause I., the Council may either grant boarding allowance to any scholar needing it, or make a grant to any student, who, though he or she has not qualified in the Entrance Examination in the subjects prescribed for the Scholarship, has obtained at the College examinations of his first year a high class in the two subjects, English and History. In the event of the accumulated earnings of the gift proving at any time insufficient for all or any of the purposes above set forth the Council may adjust the annual value of any scholarship or the tenure thereof as the Council shall see fit from time to time.

11. Every candidate for the Scholarship shall send notice of his or her candidature on the prescribed form not later than 1st October. Entries shall be made in duplicate, one copy, accompanied by entry fee 10/6, to be sent to the Registrar of the University of New Zealand, and the other copy to the Registrar, Victoria University College; provided that, if the candidate is also a candidate for a University Entrance Scholarship, the entry fee of 10/6 is not required.

NOTE: Late entry allowed up to 22nd October on receipt of late fee of £2 2s.

Forms of entry may be obtained on application to the Registrar, Victoria University College.

12. Payments shall be made in four equal instalments, which shall be payable towards the end of March, the end of May, the end of July, and the end of September. Payments shall be subject to the recommendation of the Professorial Board.

13. In cases approved by the Council scholars may be permitted to transfer to another University College.

JAMES MACINTOSH SCHOLARSHIP REGULATIONS.

1. The Scholarships to be awarded pursuant to these regulations shall be known as the "James Macintosh Scholarships."

2. The term "the Trustee" wherever used in these regulations shall mean the trustee or trustees for the time being of the estate of the late James Macintosh.

3. The Scholarship shall be of two kinds, namely:—

- (a) Local Scholarships, and
- (b) Travelling Scholarships.

4. The said Scholarships will be awarded on the recommendation of a Committee hereinafter referred to as "the Advisory Committee" consisting of the Chairman of the Professorial Board of Victoria University College, the Dean of the Faculty of Arts, and the Professor of Education in the said College, provided that, if the Professor of Education in any year happens to be the Chairman of the Professorial Board or Dean of the Faculty of Arts, the last Chairman of the Professorial Board or Dean of the Faculty of Arts (as the case may be) shall be a member of the Advisory Committee.

5. Local Scholarships shall be tenable for one year and shall be of the value of one hundred pounds (£100). The purpose of the award of such Scholarships shall be to assist graduate students in the pursuit of an Honours course at Victoria University College.

6. Travelling Scholarships shall be tenable for two years and shall be of an annual value of two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) provided that the Trustee may in his discretion in special circumstances and on the recommendation of the Advisory Committee extend the tenure for a further period not exceeding one year. The purpose of the award of such Scholarships shall be to assist students who have completed the undermentioned course in Education to proceed with post-graduate and/or research work at an approved University or other institution in Great Britain, Europe, or America.

7. Applicants for a Travelling Scholarship (in addition to the other qualifications hereinafter provided) must be a graduate of the University of New

Zealand and have completed at Victoria University College and to the satisfaction of the Advisory Committee a course in the subjects set out in the syllabus for Education in the Statute "Master of Arts and Honours in Arts."

8. One or more Scholarships of either kind may be awarded each year as the Trustee of the fund for the time being may in his discretion think fit having regard both to the moneys from time to time available and also to the number and qualifications of applicants for such Scholarships. If no suitable persons apply for either of such Scholarships in any year then no scholarships shall be awarded in that year.

9. Applicants for both kinds of Scholarships shall be male students who (i.) have attended lectures at Victoria University College for a period of at least two years prior to making application; (ii.) have not, and whose parents and guardians have not, the necessary means to enable such applicants to pursue further academic studies without the financial assistance provided by such Scholarships; (iii.) are loyal subjects of the British Empire and will undertake to use the knowledge acquired by them as the result of the award of such Scholarship for the well-being of their fellow citizens and to use their best endeavours at all times to maintain the British Empire intact and to assist in promoting the happiness and prosperity of the people of such Empire; (iv.) intend to adopt the profession of teaching.

10. Each applicant for a Scholarship shall apply in writing addressed to the Registrar of Victoria University College before the fifteenth (15th) day of October and in such application shall set out full particulars of his qualifications as required by paragraphs (7) and (9) hereof. Applicants for Traveling Scholarships shall in addition set out particulars of the course of study and/or research proposed to be followed by such applicant together with the name

of the University or other institution to be attended by the applicant in the event of a Scholarship being awarded to him.

11. Each applicant shall also forward together with his application an undertaking signed by him in the following form:—

“I.....being an applicant for a James Macintosh Scholarship hereby undertake that if such Scholarship be awarded to me I will as far as possible use and apply the knowledge acquired by me as the result of award of such Scholarship for the well-being of my fellow citizens of the British Empire and that I will at all times do my best to assist in maintaining that Empire intact and in promoting the happiness and prosperity of the people thereof.”

Signed.....

12. The Advisory Committee will as soon as practicable after the 15th day of October consider all applications received and will thereupon recommend to the Trustee whether any candidate or candidates should be awarded Scholarships of either kind. If more than one candidate be so recommended for any one kind of Scholarship, the said Committee shall set out in its recommendation the names of such candidates in order of merit. In its deliberation the Advisory Committee shall first take into consideration the applications for Travelling Scholarships and make its recommendation thereon before proceeding to deal with applications for Local Scholarships.

13. The amount of the Scholarships will be paid in equal quarterly payments in advance provided that in the case of holders of Travelling Scholarships the last quarterly payments shall be withheld until the satisfactory completion of the course of study and/or research.

14. The holder of a Scholarship shall devote the whole of his time to the pursuit of the purposes for which the Scholarship is granted and wherever practicable shall (unless for special reasons excused by the Trustee from so doing) reside in an approved hostel or hall of residence affiliated to the University or institution wherein he is pursuing his studies and/or research.

15. The Trustee may at any time refuse to make further payments to the holder of any Scholarship if such holder ceases to possess the necessary qualifications for an applicant for such Scholarship or if the Advisory Committee at any time reports to the Trustee that such holder is not pursuing his course of study and/or research to the satisfaction of such Committee.

3. The scholarship shall be awarded to the student who shall be adjudged by the Professorial Board to be the best student who has completed a pass degree in the previous academic year.
4. The tenure of the scholarship shall be subject to the following conditions:
 - (i.) The scholarship will not be awarded to any student who, in the case of Arts and Science,

has been matriculated for more than four years, and in the case of Law and Commerce has been matriculated for more than five years.

(ii.) The scholar shall proceed to a higher degree at Victoria University College and pursue a course of study to the satisfaction of the Board.

RECRUITMENT OF UNIVERSITY GRADUATES.

Arrangements have recently been made between His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and in New Zealand for facilitating recruitment for the British Colonial Services from the New Zealand University.

THE VICTORIA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE ACT, 1933.

AN ACT to consolidate and amend certain Enactments relating to the Victoria University College.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Victoria University College Act, 1933, and shall come into force on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and thirty-four.

2. In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,—

“The College” means the Victoria University College established under this Act:

“The Council” means the Victoria University College Council:

“The Principal” means the person for the time being holding office as Principal of the College:

“The Professorial Board” means the Professorial Board of the College:

The terms “education district,” “public school,” “intermediate school,” “intermediate department,” “secondary school,” “technical high school,” and “combined school” have the same meanings respectively as in the Education Act, 1914.

3. (1) There is hereby established in the City of Wellington a college of the University of New Zealand, to be called the Victoria University College.

(2) The College shall consist of the Council, the professors and lecturers of the College for the time

being in office, and the graduates and undergraduates of the University of New Zealand whose names are for the time being on the books of the College.

(3) The said College shall be a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall be capable of holding real and personal property and of doing and suffering all that bodies corporate may do and suffer.

(4) The College established under this Act is hereby declared to be the same College as that established under the Victoria College Act, 1905, and originally constituted a body corporate by the name of "The Victoria College" under the Victoria College Act, 1897; and the corporate identity of the College shall not be affected, notwithstanding any change in its name or constitution effected by this Act.

4. The Minister of Education shall be the Visitor of the College, and shall have all the powers and functions usually possessed by Visitors.

The Council.

5. (1) There shall be a Council of the College, to be called the Victoria University College Council.

(2) The Council shall consist of—

(a) Two members to be appointed by the Governor-General:

(b) Two members to be elected by the members of the Education Boards for the time being in office for education districts wholly or partly within the Victoria University District constituted under the New Zealand University Act, 1908:

(c) Two members to be elected by those teachers employed in public schools (including intermediate schools and intermediate departments) situated in education districts wholly or partly within the Victoria University

District whose names are registered in the Teachers' Register kept by the Director of Education:

- (d) Four members to be elected by the District Court of Convocation of the Victoria University District:
- (e) One member to be elected by the governing bodies of secondary schools or combined schools situated in the Victoria University District:
- (f) One member to be elected by those teachers employed in secondary schools, technical high schools, or combined schools (excluding any intermediate or lower departments) situated in the Victoria University District who are graduates of any British chartered University, or whose names are registered in the Teachers' Register:
- (g) One member to be appointed by the Wellington City Council:
- (h) One member, being a member of the Professorial Board, or if there is no Principal in office two such members, to be appointed by the Professorial Board:
- (i) The Principal.

(3) Whenever the office of Principal becomes vacant and the Council decides not to make any appointment thereto and notifies the Professorial Board of such decision, the vacancy thus caused in the Council shall be deemed to be a casual vacancy, and shall be filled by a member of the Professorial Board to be appointed by the Professorial Board, who shall hold office until the expiry of the term of office of the other member appointed by the Professorial Board, or until the appointment of a Principal, whichever happens first.

(4) Whenever a Principal is appointed while there are two other persons in office as members of the Council appointed by the Professorial Board, one of such members, to be determined by lot where neither of them was appointed under the last preceding subsection, shall retire from membership of the Council on the first day of the month next following the date of appointment of the Principal, and the Principal shall take office as a member of the Council on that day.

(5) The members of the Council in office on the coming into operation of this Act shall continue in office, and the current term of office of each member shall be computed from the actual date of its commencement.

6. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Act, the members of the Council appointed or elected under paragraphs (a), (b), (c), and (d) of subsection two of the last preceding section shall hold office for a term of four years, and all other members (except the Principal) shall hold office for a term of two years; but all members shall, unless disqualified as hereinafter provided, be entitled to continue in office until the appointment or election of their successors in office.

(2) In every alternate year, commencing in the year nineteen hundred and thirty-five, one of the members appointed or elected under each of the paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of the said subsection two of the last preceding section, two of the members elected under paragraph (d) thereof, and all the members appointed or elected under paragraphs (e), (f), (g), and (h) thereof, shall retire from office.

(3) Except in the case of appointments or elections to fill casual vacancies, members appointed or elected shall come into office on the first day of July

next following the date of their appointment or election hereunder, on which day their predecessors in office shall retire.

(4) The appointment of members of the Council to replace members due to retire in any year shall be made not later than the third Monday in June in such year.

(5) The election of members of the Council to replace members due to retire in any year shall be held on the first Monday in June in such year.

(6) Every retiring member shall be eligible for reappointment or re-election.

7. (1) No person in the employment of the Council shall be eligible for office as a member of the Council unless he is the Principal or a member appointed by the Professorial Board.

(2) A member of the Council who is in its employment shall not be entitled to vote on any question before the Council affecting himself, or directly affecting the salary of any member of the teaching staff of the College, or directly affecting any payment made by or due from the Council to any member of the teaching staff.

8. The powers of the Council shall not be affected by any vacancy in the membership thereof.

9. (1) If any member of the Council—

(a) Dies; or

(b) Resigns his office by writing under his hand delivered to the Chairman of the Council; or

(c) Becomes bankrupt or makes any composition with his creditors for less than twenty shillings in the pound, or makes an assignment of his estate for the benefit of his creditors; or

(d) Becomes of unsound mind; or

- (e) Is convicted on indictment, or is sentenced by the Supreme Court on a plea of "Guilty" to any charge of an indictable offence, or is sentenced for any offence to imprisonment without the option of a fine by any Court; or
- (f) Is absent without leave from three consecutive meetings of the Council; or
- (g) Being a member appointed by the Professorial Board, ceases to be a member of the Professorial Board; or
- (h) Being the Principal, ceases to hold the office of Principal,—

he shall thereupon cease to be a member, and the vacancy thereby created shall be deemed to be a casual vacancy.

(2) Subject to the provisions relating to a vacancy in the office of Principal, every casual vacancy shall, within forty-two days after the occurring thereof, be filled in the same manner as in the case of the vacating member, and the member appointed or elected to fill any casual vacancy shall hold office only for the residue of the term of the vacating member.

10. If at the times prescribed by this Act for the appointment or election of members no members or insufficient members are appointed or elected, or if a casual vacancy is not filled within the time herein-before prescribed, the Governor-General may appoint a suitable person in the place of the member who should have been appointed or elected.

11. (1) The Registrar of the College, or such other person as the Council appoints, shall be the Returning Officer for the purpose of conducting elections of members of the Council.

(2) The Returning Officer shall prepare a separate roll for each class of electors, and shall

enter in the respective rolls the name, address, and description, and if necessary the number of votes, of every person or body that possesses the necessary qualifications entitling him or it to be enrolled as an elector:

Provided that no person's name shall be entered in more than one roll:

Provided further that any person who possesses more than one qualification and whose name has been entered by the Returning Officer in a roll may at any time while the rolls are open have his name transferred to any other roll of electors for enrolment in which he has the necessary qualification.

(3) For the purposes of an election under paragraph (e) of subsection two of section five hereof the governing body of each school shall have one vote for every hundred or part of a hundred pupils (exclusive of the pupils in any intermediate or lower department) in average attendance at the school for the year ended on the thirty-first day of December next before the election. For the purposes of this subsection the certificate of the Secretary of the governing body of the school as to the number of such pupils shall be sufficient evidence thereof, until the contrary is proved.

(4) For the purpose of preparing the roll of electors under paragraph (c) of subsection two of section five hereof a certificate of the Secretary of any Education Board to the effect that any persons are all the teachers of the description specified in the said paragraph who are employed in schools under the control of such Board shall be sufficient evidence of that fact, until the contrary is proved, and a certificate of the Secretary of the governing body of any secondary school, technical high school, or combined school to the effect that any persons are all the teachers of the description specified in the said

paragraph who are employed in intermediate schools or intermediate departments under the control of such governing body shall be sufficient evidence of that fact, until the contrary is proved.

(5) For the purpose of preparing the roll of electors under paragraph (f) of subsection two of section five hereof a certificate of the Secretary of the governing body of any school to the effect that any persons are all the teachers of the description specified in the said paragraph who are employed in such school (excluding any intermediate or lower departments) shall be sufficient evidence of that fact, until the contrary is proved.

(6) All rolls shall be closed at five o'clock in the afternoon of the twenty-eighth day next before the day on which the election is to be held, and shall continue to be closed until the election is completed.

(7) No name shall be entered in any roll while such roll is closed.

(8) Claims for enrolment or transfer shall be made and disposed of in manner prescribed by by-laws made under the authority of this Act.

(9) At every election the votes shall be given by sealed voting-papers, or otherwise as prescribed by such by-laws.

(10) In the case of an equality of votes the election shall be determined by lot by the Returning Officer in the presence of the Chairman or some other member of the Council.

12. The Council shall meet at least once in each month, at such time and place as it determines:

Provided that if the Council so decides there shall be no meeting in the month of January in any year.

13. (1) At its first meeting held in the month of July in each year the Council shall elect one of its

members to be the Chairman for the ensuing year. The retiring Chairman shall be eligible for re-election.

(2) For the purposes of the election of the Chairman the Registrar of the College shall preside at the meeting, but shall not be entitled to vote. In the case of an equality of votes the election shall be determined by lot.

(3) The Council may from time to time appoint one of its members to be the Deputy Chairman of the Council. During any vacancy in the office of Chairman, or in the absence of the Chairman from the Wellington Provincial District, or while he is incapacitated by sickness or otherwise, the Deputy Chairman shall have and may exercise and perform all the powers and duties of the Chairman.

(4) The Chairman shall preside at every meeting of the Council at which he is present. In the absence of the Chairman and the Deputy Chairman from any meeting of the Council the members present shall select one of their number to be the Chairman for the purposes of that meeting.

(5) At any meeting of the Council the Chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and in the case of an equality of votes shall also have a casting vote. All questions before the Council shall be decided by a majority of the valid votes recorded thereon.

14. At any meeting of the Council six members shall form a quorum, and no business shall be transacted unless a quorum is present.

15. The Chairman may at any time, of his own motion, call a special meeting of the Council, and shall call a special meeting on the requisition in writing of any three members. Not less than three days' previous notice in writing of the place and time of any special meeting shall be given to all members of the Council.

16. (1) The Council may from time to time appoint standing or special committees, and may delegate any of the powers and duties of the Council to any such committee.

(2) Any committee to which any powers or duties are delegated as aforesaid may, without confirmation by the Council, exercise or perform such powers or duties in like manner and with the same effect as the Council could itself have exercised or performed them.

17. The Council shall be the governing body of the College through which the corporation of the College shall act, and shall have the entire management of and superintendence over the affairs, concerns, and property of the College, and, subject to the provisions of this Act, shall in respect of all such matters have authority to act in such manner as appears to it to be best calculated to promote the interests of the College or of any other institution controlled by the Council.

18. Subject to the provisions of section three of the New Zealand University Amendment Act, 1928 (relating to the establishment of new Chairs), the Council shall have full power to appoint and remove all professors, lecturers, teachers, examiners, officers, and servants of the College or of any other institution controlled by the Council.

19. The Seal of the College shall be in the custody of the Chairman of the Council, and shall not be affixed to any document except pursuant to a resolution of the Council.

20. Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Council may from time to time make such by-laws as may be considered necessary for the administration of the affairs of the College, including in particular (without limiting the generality of the foregoing provision) by-laws prescribing any matters

which by this Act are required or permitted to be prescribed, or with respect to which by-laws are necessary or convenient for giving effect to this Act:

Provided that such by-laws shall not come into force until and unless they have been approved by the Governor-General.

The Principal.

21. (1) The Council may from time to time appoint a member of the Professorial Board to be the Principal of the College. Every person so appointed shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council, and shall by virtue of his office be a member of the Council and the Chairman of the Professorial Board.

(2) The Council may from time to time define the duties of the Principal.

(3) The Principal may, during the intervals between meetings of the Professorial Board, exercise alone (but subject always to the control of the Council and to a right of appeal to the Professorial Board) such of the powers of the Professorial Board as to maintaining the discipline of the College as may be prescribed in that behalf by by-laws made under the authority of this Act.

The Professorial Board.

22. There shall be a Professorial Board of the College, consisting of all the professors of the College for the time being and of such lecturers of the College for the time being as the Council may from time to time appoint to be members of the Professorial Board.

23. (1) Whenever there is no Principal in office, the Professorial Board shall, at its first meeting held after such office becomes vacant, and at its annual meeting each year, elect one of its members, being

a professor, to be the Chairman; and if it fails to do so the Council may appoint a professor to be the Chairman.

(2) The Chairman, not being the Principal, shall hold office until the appointment of a Principal, or until the election or appointment of his successor under this section, whichever happens first, and shall be eligible for re-election or reappointment, but shall not hold office for more than two terms of office in succession.

24. The Professorial Board may from time to time appoint one of its members, being a professor, to be the Deputy Chairman of the Board. During any vacancy in the office of Chairman, or in the absence of the Chairman from the Wellington Provincial District, or while he is incapacitated by sickness or otherwise, the Deputy Chairman shall have and may exercise and perform all the powers and duties of the Chairman.

25. (1) The Chairman shall preside at every meeting of the Professorial Board at which he is present. In the absence of the Chairman and the Deputy Chairman from any meeting of the Board the members present shall select one of their number to be the Chairman for the purposes of that meeting.

(2) At any meeting of the Professorial Board the Chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and in the case of an equality of votes shall also have a casting vote. All questions before the Board shall be decided by a majority of the valid votes recorded thereon.

(3) At every meeting of the Professorial Board a quorum shall consist of such number of members as the Board with the consent of the Council from time to time determines, and no business shall be transacted unless a quorum is present.

(4) Save as expressly provided herein, the Professorial Board shall have power to make rules as to the time and place of its meetings and the procedure thereat.

26. (1) The Professorial Board shall be subject to the control of the Council, and shall have power of its own motion, or at the request of the Council, to make recommendations or reports to the Council in any matter affecting the College, and, in particular, may make recommendations or reports with respect to—

- (a) The courses of study at the College and the times of lectures:
- (b) Rules as to the attendance of students:
- (c) The subjects of examination for scholarships, exhibitions, prizes, and other College distinctions and awards.

(2) The Professorial Board shall have power to manage the College library, and also to deal with all matters relating to the maintenance of discipline amongst the students of the College, and shall have such powers of fining, suspending, and expelling students guilty of breaches of discipline, and such other powers of whatsoever kind, as may be conferred on it by by-laws made under the authority of this Act:

Provided that any person aggrieved by any action of the Professorial Board may appeal to the Council, whose decision shall be final.

Financial Provisions.

27. All benefactions at any time vested in or enjoyed by the College with a declaration of trust, or as an endowment for the promotion of any particular branch of science or learning, shall be strictly applied by the Council accordingly.

28. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Act and to the terms of any trust or endowment, the annual income of all real and personal property from time to time vested in or belonging to or enjoyed by the College shall be applied in such manner as the Council thinks fit towards all or any of the following purposes:—

- (a) The maintenance of the College and of every other institution controlled by the Council, and the payment of salaries and expenses connected therewith, and of prizes, exhibitions, scholarships, and other rewards for the students therein:
- (b) Generally in doing whatever the Council thinks expedient in order that the College may best accomplish the purpose for which it is established.

(2) Notwithstanding anything in the *last preceding* subsection, the Council may from time to time set apart such portion of the annual income as it thinks fit, and may either add such portion to the capital fund or set it aside as a reserve fund to meet extraordinary expenses and in the meantime to accumulate at interest.

(3) Except with the precedent consent of the Minister of Education, the Council shall not apply for the purposes of any residence, hostel, or boarding-house for professors, lecturers, or students, or of any institution other than the College, any portion of the income or capital moneys of the College that is not required by some Act other than this Act or the terms of a trust or endowment to be so applied.

29. Subject to the terms of any trust or endowment, any moneys belonging to the College and available for investment may be invested in accordance with the provisions of the Trustee Act, 1908, as to

the investment of trust funds, or in such other manner as the Governor-General from time to time approves.

30. The Council may, out of the general fund of the College, pay and reimburse to members of the Council the reasonable travelling-expenses incurred by them in respect of their attendance at meetings of the Council or of any committee of the Council or otherwise in transacting the business of the Council.

31. The Council may in any year expend out of the general fund of the College for purposes not authorized by any law for the time being in force any sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate *one hundred* pounds.

32. There shall be payable by the students of the College such fees as the Council from time to time prescribes.

Endowments.

33. (1) The land described in the First Schedule hereto shall continue to be vested in His Majesty as an endowment for the College.

(2) The said land shall be held and administered as Crown land under such of the leasing provisions of the Land Act, 1924, as the Minister of Lands from time to time thinks fit; and the net rents and other proceeds derived therefrom and remaining after payment thereof of all necessary expenses attendant on the management and administration of the said land (including the expenses of survey and roading) shall, without further authority or appropriation than this Act, be paid over from time to time to the Council for the purposes of the College.

34. (1) The land described in the Second Schedule hereto shall continue to be vested in the College in trust as a site for the College buildings and as grounds appertaining thereto.

(2) The said land shall be inalienable by sale, mortgage, lease, or otherwise.

Purchase and Disposal of Land.

35. The Council may from time to time, with the sanction of the Governor-General, purchase or otherwise acquire on behalf of the College and for the purposes of the College or of any other institution controlled by the Council any piece or parcel of land.

36. (1) The Council may grant leases of the lands of the College (other than the land described in the First and Second Schedules hereto), and for that purpose is hereby declared to be a leasing authority within the meaning of the Public Bodies' Leases Act, 1908.

(2) Save as authorised by the last preceding subsection, the Council shall not, without the previous consent of the Governor-General, sell, mortgage, or otherwise alienate such lands, or any part thereof.

Repeals and Savings.

37. (1) The enactments mentioned in the *Third* Schedule hereto are hereby repealed.

(2) All Orders in Council, by-laws, rules, appointments, applications, rolls, notices, diplomas, scholarships, exhibitions, leases, and generally all acts of authority which originated under any of the enactments hereby repealed and are subsisting or in force on the commencement of this Act shall enure for the purposes of this Act as fully and effectually as if they had originated under the corresponding provisions of this Act, and accordingly shall, where necessary, be deemed to have so originated.

(3) All matters and proceedings commenced under any such enactment and pending or in progress on the commencement of this Act may be continued, completed, and enforced under this Act.

(4) Section forty-two of the Finance Act, 1925, is hereby amended by omitting from subsection two the words "Councils of the Auckland and Victoria University Colleges," and substituting the words "Council of the Auckland University College."

WOMEN STUDENTS' HOSTEL SOCIETY
(INCORPORATED).

For many years past this Society has maintained two Hostels, the one at No. 282 The Terrace, and the other at Kelburn, in which both University and Training College Students have resided. The closing of the Training College has compelled the Society to restrict itself to receiving University Students at No. 282 The Terrace, which will henceforth be known as VICTORIA HOUSE, and which will, provided that sufficient students are offering, be re-opened next year with improved accommodation.

Applications for reservation of rooms should be sent at once to the Warden, Victoria House, 282 The Terrace, who will furnish full information.

WEIR HOUSE.

Weir House was established by a benefaction under the Will of the late Mr. William Weir.

The accommodation provided is of two types: (1) study bedroom for single students; (2) a bedroom, with study adjoining, to be shared between two students. It has been decided that the charge shall be 25s. per week for all rooms, students having choice of rooms from those made available in order of application. Students desirous of keeping their rooms during absence on vacation will be charged 5s. per week, with a maximum of £2.

Students wishing to apply for residence should do so to the Registrar, Victoria University College, on the proper form not later than 15th February, 1934. Forms may be obtained on application to the Registrar.

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
